Welcome to St. Luke's Cathedral!

We are a faith community with ancient worship and modern thought, catholic traditions and progressive theology. We proclaim a Biblical perspective for thinking people, a respect for reason, science, and a diversity of perspective. This empowers compassion and care for both the wider community and one another. Our commitment to welcome and inclusion is central to our mission modeled on the Kingdom of God and proclaimed by Jesus Christ.

St. Luke's Territorial Acknowledgement

St Luke's acknowledges that we are worshiping on "unceded territory taken by force and previously occupied by the **Wabanaki people**." (Amended City Charter, Portland, Maine). Some of the resources that built this cathedral came from industry related to the slave trade in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries. We join our fellow residents in honoring the Wabanaki knowledge and culture that continues to thrive in the Tribal Nations. We ask for Blessing and Peace upon all indigenous peoples that have called, and always will call, this place—"The Dawnland"—HOME.

Adult Christian Formation Opportunities are offered throughout the academic year at 9:00AM on Sunday and occasional evenings.

Child Care: There will not be Sunday School today, however the nursery will be open. The nursery is open every Sunday from 9:45–11:30AM. Families are always welcome!

Music in our Worship Service: Please note that music with organ and full choir is part of the liturgy at the 10:00AM service. At 7:30AM, we offer a spoken, more meditative, worship experience in the Emmanuel Chapel at the west end of the cathedral.

Communion Practices in Accordance with Diocesan Instructions: Beginning on the Day of Pentecost, St. Luke's will modify its communion practices slightly to fully align with the most recent diocesan teaching. This calls for communion in "both kinds" (bread and wine) and a return to the "common cup" (to be administered in the traditional manner—NOT intinction OR placement upon the tongue). For a number of people this will mean a change in how we receive—and will be more difficult for some than for others. Remember that communion in "one kind" (the bread alone) is considered "full communion"—as it has done for centuries. Celebrants at the Holy Eucharist will continue to sanitize their hands, and then use the "lavabo bowl" to wash further. If you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to speak with any member of the cathedral clergy.

Hearing Assistance Devices Available: The Cathedral has new devices for anyone who needs hearing assistance during our worship services. Please ask an usher for help getting started, and let us know how they worked for you. 





The First Lesson

Numbers 11: 24-30

The Second Lesson

Acts 2: 1-21

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes,


Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabsin our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine." Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'"


