Welcome to St. Luke's Cathedral!

We are a community of faith with ancient worship and modern thought, catholic traditions and progressive theology. We proclaim a Biblical perspective for thinking people, a respect for reason, science, and a diversity of perspective. This empowers compassion and care for both the wider community and one another. Our commitment to welcome and inclusion is central to our mission modeled on the Kingdom of God and proclaimed by Jesus Christ.

St. Luke's Territorial Acknowledgement

St Luke's acknowledges that we are worshiping on "unceded territory taken by force and previously occupied by the **Wabanaki people**." (Amended City Charter, Portland, Maine). Some of the resources that built this cathedral came from industry related to the slave trade in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries. We join our fellow residents in honoring the Wabanaki knowledge and culture that continues to thrive in the Tribal Nations. We ask for Blessing and Peace upon all indigenous peoples that have called, and always will call, this place—"The Dawnland"—HOME.

Adult Christian Formation Opportunities are offered throughout the academic year at 9:00AM on Sunday and occasional evenings.

Children's Christian Formation (Sunday School) and Child Care: Our Sunday school and nursery are both open today. Sunday school begins in the Upper Parish Hall at 9:45AM, with children returning to their families at the Peace. The nursery is open every Sunday from 9:45-11:30AM. Families are always welcome!

Music in our Worship Service: Please note that music with organ and full choir is part of the liturgy at the 10:00AM service. At 7:30AM, we offer a spoken, more meditative, worship experience in the Emmanuel Chapel at the west end of the cathedral.

Please speak to any usher (or member of the parish) if you have any questions, or if we may be of additional service. Thank you for coming today and we hope you will make the Cathedral your spiritual home!

Communion Practices in Accordance with Diocesan Instructions: Beginning on the Day of Pentecost, St. Luke's will modify its communion practices slightly to fully align with the most recent diocesan teaching. This calls for communion in "both kinds" (bread and wine) and a return to the "common cup" (to be administered in the traditional manner—NOT intinction OR placement upon the tongue). For a number of people this will mean a change in how we receive—and will be more difficult for some than for others. Remember that communion in "one kind" (the bread alone) is considered "full communion"—as it has done for centuries. Celebrants at the Holy Eucharist will continue to sanitize their hands, and then use the "lavabo bowl" to wash further. If you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to speak with any member of the cathedral clergy.





Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he died.

The Second Lesson


1 Peter 2:2-10

Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation—if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good. Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture: "See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame." To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe, "The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner", and "A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall." They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do. But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

The Gospel

John 14: 1-14

Jesus said, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going." Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it."



An Invitation





Renaissance Voices Concert "Eternal Light" to be held May 13th at 7:30PM

The singers of Renaissance Voices and maestro Harold Stover,look forward to welcoming you to "Eternal Light", their spring concert at St. Luke's on Saturday, May 13, at 7:30pm. Renaissance Voices will bring you a program of profound music that deals with last things, and offers the consolation and hope that is expressed in the vision of eternal light. That vision is part of the ancient text of the Requiem Mass that will be heard in settings by the Renaissance master Tomás Luis de Victoria and the 21st-Century composers Carlotta Ferrari and Maine's John Newell.
