***From our Priest, The Rev. Jon M. Richardson***



Dear Friends,

The month of November, with the Thanksgiving holiday looming toward the end, it's not uncommon for people's minds to begin to turn to the *idea* of thanksgiving – giving thanks; gratitude. During this month each year, my social media feeds tend to be overrun with people engaged in disciplines of expressing something each day that they are thankful for. It's nice to see something positive online for a change, even if it can come across a little bit saccharin sometimes.

While it is a part of our national culture to consider what we're thankful for once each year, as Christians we would benefit from considering thankfulness more often. But if you've been seeing the news lately, it may be hard to consider "gratitude" these days. In just the week before this writing, our nation has been on edge as more than a dozen bombs have been delivered through the mail to citizens, and leaders of this country. This past Saturday, as they were engaged in worship, a gunman walked into a synagogue in Pittsburgh and killed nearly a dozen people – all while proclaiming that all Jews should die. Not by coincidence, this is all happening in the wider stew of the election season, with its hyper-polarity and anxiety.

For me, it calls to mind the opening words of Psalm 137: <sup>1</sup>By the rivers of Babylon — there we sat down and there we wept when we remembered Zion. <sup>2</sup>On the willows there we hung up our harps. <sup>3</sup>For there our captors asked us for songs, and our tormentors asked for mirth, saying, 'Sing us one of the songs of Zion!' <sup>4</sup>How could we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?"

Expressing "gratitude" these days could sometimes feel like a foreign concept. How can we find the words to give thanks when there's so much hurt and suffering in the world?

The truth is, there is no easy answer. There is no magic pill that will make us feel grateful when it's hard to feel that way. The only advice I can give is to suggest that the best way recognize gratitude is to practice it. Not just once a year, but as often as you can.

One of the things I'm grateful for in our ministry together at St. David's is that your leadership takes gratitude seriously. At the Vestry meeting each month, we set aside time in the agenda to express our thanks for the specific things that people do to keep this church working – and there's never a month with nothing to give thanks for! In my own life, I try to begin each week by giving thanks. I look for opportunities to thank people for their ministries, and in doing so, to thank God for bringing us together. And each week in worship, there are chances to express the things for which we're thankful – both in the prayers and in the sharing of joys and concerns.

What I've found is, the more I train myself to give thanks, the more naturally it comes. The more I practice the discipline of expressing thanks, the easier it becomes to see all that there is to be thankful for.

November is a good time to work on this discipline. There is support for it in our wider culture. But don't let it pass next month. Hold on to your gratitude and watch it bloom.

# HOW TO BE A HOLIDAY HELPER

## North Porch

North Porch is a year-round ministry and we will be supporting them through our voucher program, providing funds for diapers and formula. Help fill the boxes and cradle in the narthex with the following needs—wipes; baby food (jars, toddler finger snacks, cereal); toiletries (shampoo, body wash, lotion, diaper rash cream).



## Diocesan Prison Ministry

This program is where children visit their incarcerated parents for a Christmas party. The children vary in age from toddler through 17. **DO NOT WRAP!!** You MUST use gift bags only, since everything coming into the facility is inspected. Each bag should have a large tag on it stating the age and gender of the child—for example, “preschool girl/boy, toddler boy or girl.”

## **Vestry Meeting Highlights October 17, 2018**

Irene Williams led the opening prayer and Mike Roehrer spoke about taking the time to focus on what's really important in life.

We discussed matters brought to us by parishioners – posting Jon's sermons online, missing citations in the skylight room, 'multiplying furniture' in the skylight room, missing minutes and reports on the parish website, and the declining numbers at the 10:00 AM service.

Stewardship reported on ticket sales for the Beefsteak Dinner, the \$45 net profit from the Yard Sale, the present status of the Financial Commitment Program, the importance of using the outdoor sign to promote parish events (ideally 3 weeks in advance), the reception and performance of Dickens' A Christmas Carol on November 24 – and that Stewardship is confident that we will exceed the budgeted fundraising amount for 2018.

Outreach reported that so far this year we've donated \$4,000 to 5 local food pantries, that we have received information on the Prison Ministry gifts for inmates' children's program, that North Porch is seeking a volunteer driver and would welcome our providing them with vouchers to use at the Food Bank, where they get \$10 worth of food and supplies for every dollar they receive, that Michael Kidney is arranging a knitters group to make items for Seamen's Institute, and that we are planning to hold a public blessing when the Kinnelon Animal Shelter reopens,

We voted to include North Porch in our outreach voucher program, bringing a total to 6 recipients, each receiving \$200 whenever we reach \$1,200 in donations.

We gave thanks for Mary Harbinsky and Nancy Moody for their work on the parish yard sale, Rich Dobson (driving and serving) and Michael Kidney (cooking) for the Men's Shelter, Jeanette Meyer and Rich Dobson for the beautiful bulletin boards, Marty Stanton for his technical expertise, Jeannette and Tony for the pet treat bags at St. Francis Day, and the K-Fest crew (Irene, Julie, Jenn, Mike, Rich, Mary and Marty).

We reviewed the September Quickbooks reports and voted to accept them.

We discussed and agreed on a Financial Stewardship follow-up procedure.

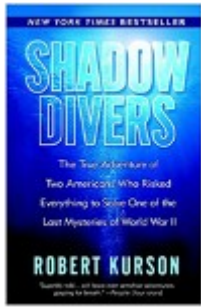
We discussed and noted the present status of the wardens and vestry.

The Property Committee reported that they are seeking to remedy the dampness problem in the sacristy, that they will start working on making the driveway more visible, that an electrician has made recommendations for improving the sanctuary lighting and the controls for same, and that they are in the process of getting quotes on a garbage disposal for the kitchen and air conditioning for the large skylight room, both to be paid for by private donors.

We amended and approved the November calendar.

**SHADOW DIVERS, Robert Kurson**

Robert Kurson's **SHADOW DIVERS** is a true story in the tradition of Jon Krakauer's **Into Thin Air** and Sebastian Junger's **The Perfect Storm**. It is a tale of riveting adventure in which two weekend scuba divers risk everything to solve a great historical mystery and make history themselves. Testing themselves against treacherous currents, braving depths that induced hallucinatory effects, navigating through wreckage as perilous as a minefield, they pushed themselves to their limits and beyond, brushing against death more than once in the rusting hulks of sunken ships.

Not even these courageous divers were prepared for what they found 230 feet below the surface, in the frigid Atlantic waters sixty miles off the coast of New Jersey: a World War II German U-boat, its ruined interior a macabre wasteland of twisted metal, tangled wires, and human bones—all buried under decades of accumulated sediment. No identifying marks were visible on the submarine or the few artifacts brought to the surface.

No historian, expert, or government had a clue as to which U-boat the men had found. In fact, the official records all agreed that there simply could not be a sunken U-boat and crew at that location.

Over the next six years, their dives grew more daring, and each realized that he was hunting more than the identities of a lost U-boat and its nameless crew.
