**Maui Response:** The Committee also discussed the best way to respond to the incredible needs on the ground following the wildfires that engulfed Maui. Volunteers from the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance has been deployed; however Hunger funds have to be allocated for Feeding ministries and/or infrastructure related to food distribution needs. The committee decided to allocate \$3,000 from the committee’s international funds to World Central Kitchen who is feeding people on the ground.

This \$3,000 does not by any means encumber meeting the Committee’s financial obligations to international partners in Kenya and the Congo in 2024. Committee members are also talking about organizing a Salem Presbytery mission trip to Maui in the Spring if there is enough interest. The goal of this trip would be to assist with whatever needs are on the ground (which could be but is not limited to): to help with re-building, food related, ministering to people, etc. Please let Leigh Wisner or Rev.
