\$75 per day. Fee includes lunch, a certificate of completion, and two Choices Program curriculum units in print format and in Digital Editions with a one-year individual license.

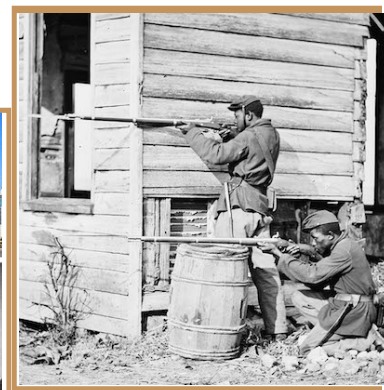
Who Should Attend
