MAYOR'S 2019 MEMORIAL DAY MESSAGE



Born out of the human toll that all armed conflict produces, the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific accepted its first interment on January 4, 1949 after a serviceman who was killed during the attack on Pearl Harbor was laid to rest.

Thousands who gave their last full measure of devotion would follow, bringing the number of patriots buried at Puowaina, or the “Hill of Sacrifice,” to more than 53,000.

As we reflect on all that was lost by so many, let us also remember the loved ones who were left behind – mothers, fathers, spouses and children - for they also sacrificed so much.

Memorial Day is a time for us to pause and remember all of those who are buried here at Puowaina and the shared future they were willing to relinquish to be a part of something greater than themselves. However, it is also a day when we recommit ourselves to the ideals of liberty and freedom they fought for so valiantly, principles that continue to illuminate our nation as a beacon of hope for the rest of the world.

CNO ADM JOHN M. RICHARDSON



Admiral John Richardson graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1982 with a Bachelor of Science in Physics. He holds master's degrees in electrical engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, and National Security Strategy from the National War College.

At sea, Richardson served on USS Parche (SSN 683), USS George C. Marshall (SSBN 654) and USS Salt Lake City (SSN 716). He commanded USS Honolulu (SSN 718) in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Richardson also served as commodore of Submarine Development Squadron (DEVRON) 12; commander, Submarine Group 8; commander, Submarine Allied Naval Forces South; deputy commander, U.S. 6th Fleet; chief of staff, U.S. Naval Forces Europe and U.S. Naval Forces Africa; commander, Naval Submarine Forces, and director of Naval Reactors.

His staff assignments include duty in the attack submarine division on the Chief of Naval Operations staff; naval aide to the President; prospective commanding officer instructor for Commander, Submarine Forces, U.S. Pacific Fleet; assistant deputy director for Regional Operations on the Joint Staff; and director of Strategy and Policy at U.S. Joint Forces Command.

Richardson served on teams that have been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation, the Joint Meritorious Unit Award, the Navy Unit Commendation, and the Navy "E" Ribbon. He was awarded the Vice Admiral Stockdale Award for his time in command of USS Honolulu.

Richardson began serving as the 31st Chief of Naval Operations September 18, 2015.





AT THE NATIONAL CEMETERY OF THE PACIFIC

The National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, locally known as "Punchbowl" for its naturally formed bowl-shape was constructed in 1948 following the end of World War II and officially opened to the public on July 18, 1948 with services for five war dead, an unknown serviceman, two Marines, an Army Lieutenant and one civilian – noted war correspondent Erna Pyle. Eventually, over 13,000 soldiers and sailors who died during World War II would be laid to rest in the Punchbowl. The Punchbowl has become one of the area's most popular tourist destination, drawing more than 100,000 visitors each year who come to pay their respects to the dead and to enjoy the panoramic view from the Punchbowl.

The City and County of Honolulu has coordinated the annual Memorial Day Ceremony as well as the collection of leis for each gravesite at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific since the cemetery opened its gates in 1948. Along with the lei, an American flag is also placed by each grave by the Scouts of America prior to the Memorial Day Ceremony. This same honored tradition is our unique local display of gratitude for those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

To help the Department of Parks and Recreation gather more 20,000 leis to accomplish this goal, the poster contest is organized so our talented students can be a part of spreading the word about the annual endeavor. This year's "Sew A Lei for Memorial Day" poster contest also commemorates the 70th Anniversary of the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific. This year's contest winners are:
