

The Masks We Wear

Christos Anesti! Alithos Anesti! – Christ is Risen! Truly He is Risen!

I pray you all had a blessed Holy Week and Pascha - in spite of the unprecedented way in which we celebrated this year. We have been struggling to stay connected in any way we can, primarily through technology and I am grateful we have such tools to communicate. We received positive feedback from many who said they were able to attend more services than they might normally have, because they were available online and everyone is home. I participated in virtual meetings and "visits," and tuned into prayer services across the country. As I said, I was grateful to have these options, but nothing replaces the in-person for me. And there's one communication aspect in particular that has stuck in my mind as I witness everyone wearing masks. Of course we should all be wearing them when we venture out for essential reasons at this time, to protect ourselves and others, but in doing so, we cover up the most important communication tool we have – our face.



Recently, on a trip to the grocery store (mask in place), as I navigated the aisles, I instinctively smiled at other shoppers, but quickly realized they couldn't see my face as they kept going as if I had not even looked at them. It seemed like such a small gesture, but what a great poignant example of how much is communicated with a look, or an expression. Our faces communicate so much without words. This is also evident in our relationship with God.

Why is the concept of "faces" so important?

In the Old Testament, to see God's face meant death (Exodus 33:20), but in the New Testament it takes on a new form in the face of Jesus Christ. We are connected to Him in the most unprecedented way in history – we can look upon His face! In spite of this, we still find people falling on their face or hiding their face when they encounter Him, but they are able to look at the perfection of God with their own eyes. Those that see clearly recognize His glory immediately. It is also interesting that when He sent his disciples into a Samaritan town He sent them, not before Himself, but "before His face!" [...] And they did not receive Him, because "His face was set for the journey to Jerusalem." (Luke 9:51-53) Not only that, but at His transfiguration to the disciples, "the appearance of His face was altered" first. There is connection to Christ through his face.

St Paul tells us "Now the Lord is the Spirit; and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty. But we all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord."

As we look forward to returning to a life where we can physically be together again and are able to remove the masks that protect us from the coronavirus, will we also live with that unveiled face St. Paul talks about, being transformed into His image and showing forth to each other and all those we meet, the glory of Our Lord?

Christ clearly wants us to look at each other face to face, both literally and figuratively, in communing with one another. We have received true life through His resurrection, how will we transmit that life to all of our brothers and sisters? As we emerge from this pandemic, I pray it is with renewed yearning and purpose in the mission Jesus Christ has laid out for all of His children.

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President's Message

Christos Anesti,

I hope each of you had a blessed Pascha and were able to see and hear our services online. We thank Fr Photios and Fr Daniel for providing us the opportunity to participate in a Holy Week unlike any we have known and one which we will not soon forget. I also want to thank Athan and Vasili for chanting throughout the many services during the week. Thank you to Deacon Perry as well for his service. Our Epitaphion was beautiful – many thanks to the small group of women who decorated it for us. It is hard to not be present physically in the Church, especially for the holiest week of the year, but I am grateful, as I know many of you are, for the ability to at least see the services online.



As we now approach almost 2 months of 'shelter in place' and continue to have uncertainty about our future, it is indeed difficult to face each day. I am hopeful that prayer and participation in services sustains you through this time.

As many of you know, Fr Photios will be continuing the mid-day Prayer service. If you have not had a chance to participate, I hope you will. It provides great comfort and also ends with the Jesus Prayer. See the Church calendar for details.

As noted in the April President's message, the Parish Council did authorize expenditures for improving our technology, within the Church proper, to support streaming our services. A new camera had been ordered and arrived prior to Holy Week and was installed for the services. The approximate cost for the improvements to date is \$12,000, which included equipment, labor, and enhancements to our network infrastructure. As we are cautious about new expenditures, we were also aware we needed to assure the provision of services through streaming now and in the future.

In the Stewardship message that follows in this edition, I ask for your thoughtful consideration of how to support giving to our parish during this difficult time. While we all desperately want to be back in Church with one another, we also want to assure the health and safety of our parishioners. When we return it will likely look different than we have known in terms of how to do social distancing in church among other practices. In the meantime, we continue to provide as many functions and services as we can, we continue to employ our staff and our priests and we continue the upkeep of the facilities. Our auction and festival represent 40%+ of our annual income. We will need to find ways this year to manage without this income or significantly less from these activities.

I am currently reading The Prologue of Ohrid by St Nikolai Velimirovic. It includes daily readings of the lives of the saints, hymns, reflections, and homilies. I share this with you from April 26, contemplate on "How His Resurrection is a great light that illuminates the path on which we must travel in this world to arrive at the other world."

Parish Council

Our Parish Council continues to meet virtually in order to conduct the business of the Church. In our April meeting we authorized the Treasurer to submit an application for the Federal Payroll Protection Program. This program was shared with all parishes by the Metropolis and Archdiocese and we were encouraged to apply. St Demetrios did apply. The Paycheck Protection Program is a loan designed to provide a direct incentive for small businesses to keep their workers on the payroll. The Small Business Association will forgive loans if all employees are kept on the payroll for eight weeks and the money is used for payroll, rent, mortgage interest, or utilities. We have not yet been approved nor received any funds however we will keep you informed.

Additionally, we began discussions about our September festival. Festival Chair Jim Kost, discussed the need to consider options to how we operate our current festival. As you can imagine, our primary consideration is for the health and safety of the many volunteers and those who may attend. We will make a decision in late May or early June about our plan.

The Parish Council also made a decision to reach out to our members via phone and email to simply connect and see how people were doing. Each PC member had 30-40 members to contact. We received great feedback and thank those of you we were able to speak with PC members. We hope to do this a couple times each year.

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The Metropolis has sponsored two calls for PC Presidents and clergy. They are useful and share information about the extensive resources offered by the Metropolis during this time. These references on managing during the Covid-19 pandemic are online and I invite you to view them. On our call on April 29 we discussed steps to take in opening our churches when that time comes. There is much to discuss and many protocols to put in place. His Eminence has joined both calls and offered comforting messages of hope and gratitude for the work of the parishes. He shared the Lord has given us a “spiritual diet” with the pandemic to help make us more aware and sensitive to our faith. He has encouraged us to act in love and unity throughout this time as we navigate in uncharted territory.

Strategic Planning

Continuing our Strategic Planning process, we met virtually on March 31, completing our effort to identify parish priorities. While it is challenging to do this work virtually, our team worked diligently to narrow dozens of possible priorities to the top seven. Next we will vet these with the planning team prior to more broadly sharing, but will do so once we have gone through this process.

Once we share these priorities, each area will transition to a ‘vision’ team. Each vision team would be led or co-led by members from the Strategic Planning team and would include other members of the parish. So, for example, if ‘creating a welcoming environment for our parish’ was identified as a priority, we would establish a vision team to flush out what this means. They would determine what criteria we use to define a welcoming environment, how to appropriately measure that to determine if the parish as a whole is truly welcoming.

In addition, we hope to have a parish survey developed to obtain more information from as many of our parishioners as possible. So please be on the lookout for this survey as your participation is vital to our success.

Thank you for your continued support of our parish. Please feel free to reach out to me or others on Parish Council with suggestions, questions or advice. We pray we will be together to worship soon.

Dear Saint Demetrios Parishioners,

We are experiencing a period of time in our country’s history that many of us could not possibly imagine yet, we are in fact living it. Thoughts never entered our minds such that we would be asked to not leave our homes; not be able to invite people into our homes; not be able to shop for groceries in the manner in which we are accustomed; wear masks when we do venture out – and advised that for our own health and well-being – to stay away from group settings - including our Church. And yet here we are.

The immense toll this pandemic is taking on people - parents, children, the elderly, the health care providers and first responders, the now unemployed and under employed, let alone the sick, is causing vastly increased stress levels for far too many. In addition, organizations that exist to provide critical services to our society such as food banks, child care centers, shelters and yes – our churches - are experiencing dramatic declines in financial support when it is needed most, adding to the overall anxieties and suffering of people.

It is times such as these that we are reminded to be thankful we have a Church that is a spiritual beacon of strength and hope and reminds us that despite this temporary setback we are experiencing, God is with us and watching over us.

However, our Parish (and many throughout America) finds itself financially strained at this point in the year. Lack of donations usually offered at Sunday Liturgies, Holy Week and Pascha Services as well as personal financial difficulties resulting in an inability to fulfill monthly stewardship contribution, have all affected our treasury.

While many are suffering, including some of our own parishioners who have experienced illness, loss of wages, and shuttered businesses, fortunately most of us have only been inconvenienced, yes severely inconvenienced, but nonetheless we are struggling through – and still have much to be thankful for.

Through technology Sunday Liturgy is brought into our homes, our clergy are calling on parishioners in need of support, our office staff is keeping the operation of the parish on-going all while practicing safe distancing methods. Our Philoptochos continues to meet (on line) and continues its work by contacting parishioners via phone, making masks available to parishioners and helping those in need of assistance. In short – the work of the Parish continues. As do the operating expenses.

Where possible - I would ask you to not only continue your committed stewardship Pledge in support of our St Demetrios parish but also urge you to offer an additional meaningful contribution. With diminished giving, a cancelled Auction and at minimum a drastically reduced Festival – if one at all – your Church needs your assistance. The Church has been there and will again be there to support us with Sunday Liturgies; weekday services, a spiritual place for weddings, baptisms and funerals – as well as for all Ministry activities. But right now, the Church needs your support. Although understandably some are not in a position to respond, many of us are. Please consider helping - at this most unusual of times.

While we pray for the health and safety of our parish, we recognize that the uncertainty surrounding the pandemic is taking an ongoing toll on our families. We are here to help with both financial assistance and emotional support.

Financial Assistance

Philoptochos has created a special application for COVID-19 Emergency Assistance. Please note the policies and procedures regarding this assistance:

- Assistance is limited to Orthodox Christian individuals and families regardless of immigration status.
- Information is CONFIDENTIAL and will not be shared without your permission
- Direct cash cannot be made directly to applicants. We pay bills directly to the provider/vendor, e.g. landlord, mortgage holder, utilities, medical provider, etc. Additionally, we can provide gift cards for grocery stores.
- Cases are reviewed by the Social Services committee of St. Demetrios Philoptochos. This is a small group of three women who make a recommendation for funding. If the need is beyond our scope to help, we will tap into the Metropolis and/or National Philoptochos.
- As our resources are limited, we cannot provide ongoing financial assistance.

If you have a Facebook account, you may have seen that we have offered items up on Facebook to raise money to benefit Philoptochos. Despina Read made and donated five beautiful wreaths, which brought in \$580. She and Bob are also now making beautiful crosses, with all proceeds going to Philoptochos. They have been inundated with requests, and the crosses are now on back order. Thank you all!!!

In addition, the raffle for the icon of Glykoflousa is on hold until we are able to sell tickets again. Please know if you have already purchased raffle tickets, we are hanging on to them and they will be in the drawing.



We are worried and concerned about our families, our health, our loss of community, our financial security and more. We must always be reminded that Christ will see us through this storm and we will once again be together to worship. The Resurrection reminds us He is always with us.

We want to thank our parishioners for their generosity in continuing to remember the church in their giving despite these difficult days. Please know that we truly understand for many of our Parishioners, these are hard times financially as well as physically and emotionally. We know many are owners of small businesses and those businesses are not open. We know many are retired and seeing their savings decline. And we know that like the Church there are household expenses that have not gone away.

As we approach approximately six weeks of not being together to worship in our Church, we also are mindful of the changes in our overall income from stewardship. While many continue their annual pledge, we are not experiencing our regular income from both Stewardship and Trays and Candles. Holy Week also is another time with greater numbers worshiping and more services. Additionally the loss of income from our auction and potentially from the festival places us in a challenging financial situation.

For those who are able, we ask that you look within your heart and within your resources to give to our Parish. Consider giving what you may have given for the auction through ticket purchases or donation. Consider giving what you may have given for the festival, again in donation of time and resources. Any additional amount helps during this time.





3. Forgiveness from Metropolis for 3rd and 4th Quarter Allocation of \$725/quarter
4. Continuing review of non-essential expenses

St. Demetrios Parishioners "Come Together" During Covid-19 Outbreak to Feed Our Neighbors in Need

Though we have been apart from our friends and away from our church community, our parish has been busy taking care of our low income sisters at Jubilee Women's Center on Capitol Hill.

Through the combined efforts of Philoptochos, St. Philaret and private parishioners, Saint Demetrios provided much needed food, paper products, gift cards and monetary funding.

The residents at JWC are recently homeless or poverty stricken and are working or back in school as they move towards stable, independent living. Due to the Corona Virus outbreak, many have lost their jobs in the restaurant or beauty business. To add to that stress, JWC closed its doors to the public serving home cooked meals, so St. Demetrios had to get clever as to how to help.



In April, Philoptochos sponsored a canned and packaged food drive and St. Demetrios delivered over 15 bags of groceries to Jubilee's doorstep. In addition to that effort, Philoptochos provided 35 grocery gift cards to QFC. Also, numerous parishioners sent in monetary donations either to Philoptochos for future meals, or directly to Jubilee to use where most needed.

Lastly and the most fun of all- St. Philaret commissioned Theo's Gyros to provide individual dinners to each of the residents, again dropping off to Jubilee's front door.

THANK YOU!!!! To everyone who helped and supported Jubilee during this critical time, the residents are so appreciative. But we're not done yet- Stay tuned to hear about May's work.
