Your name and families have become familiar to me, and I will continue to pray for you as we move on to our new assignment. Thank you for allowing us to serve and join this family.

Stewardship Letter

"For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given; and the government will be upon His shoulder. And His name will be called Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6 NKJV)



As 2023 draws to a close, we are grateful for God's goodness working in our midst and empowering us to do His work. This could not have happened without the generosity of our faithful parishioners, many of whom sacrificially gave of their time and talent in addition to their finances throughout the year. Our church ministries continue to thrive with the help of volunteers who help make things happen.

In 2023:

- An increasing number of volunteers spent countless hours using their talents to help where needed.
- We saw a 10% increase in stewardship giving compared to five years ago.
- The median pledge rose to \$600 from \$520 last year.
- 5% (21 households) increased their yearly giving from the \$500 level to the \$1000 level.
- 63% (276 Households) give 22% of total giving while 3% (11 Households) give 20% of total giving.
- We invested 7% in our church ministries, 3% over last year's amount.





Stephanie Deliganis passed from this life on June 20, 2023. In her short 43 years on this earth, Stephanie's life exemplified true, unwavering Christian love. Despite years of personal



pain and suffering due to unknown causes and a variety of medical misdiagnoses, she turned repeatedly to her faith and love of Christ to strengthen her. She served St. Demetrios as a Sunday School teacher and a Book Store volunteer as a young woman. It was in her last year of life, after finally receiving a devasting diagnosis of extremely advanced and aggressive appendiceal cancer, that she re-dedicated herself to our Church in earnest. St. Demetrios had been without a chanter and without a choir for several months in late 2022 and the first part of 2023. Our two priests had to tag team serving in the altar and chanting. It was less than ideal situation for them as well as for the worshippers. What did Stephanie do? As compromised as her health was, she nevertheless stepped forward to organize a choir and selflessly led others to raise their

voices in praise to our Lord. No self pity for Stephanie. She led the choir until she could no longer do so. Her example of service is truly an inspiration to all of us. May her memory be eternal.





On Raft Island, the Peninsula's last summer camp carries on, with updates

As a child growing up across the water within eye-sight of All Saints Camp - Ted Kenney was always enthralled by the peaceful setting of our beloved Camp facility. Having recently watched the reconstruction of our dock, Ted's curiosity - now as a journalist for the local on-line paper "Gig Harbor Now (www.gigharbornow.org) reflected on those long-ago days and decided an article on the Camp for the Gig Harbor community would shed additional light on this true gem we so proudly own. Below is Ted's reflections include a bit of history as well as commentary on our great All Saints Camping program and outreach uses including Camp Agape."

Residents on the east side of Lay Inlet enjoy looking across the bay at All Saints Camp and Retreat Center, a heavily forested stretch of Raft Island shoreline that provides a home to wildlife and brilliant fall colors. The view hasn't changed in decades.

Neighbors might have worried earlier this month, when barges and heavy equipment pulled up at the 17-acre site. But when the vessels and gear shipped out a few days later, the only visible change was a spiffy new dock that replaced a dilapidated wooden one dating back more than 50 years.

All Saints Camp and Retreat, which is owned by the Greek Orthodox Church, is making some changes — but small ones. The Pierce County Planning & Public Works website describes the intended work at All Saints as "Non-profit camp master plan expansion and re-development."





What's planned

But Paul Plumis, an advisor to the camp's board of directors, said the description sounds bigger than it is. The camp wants to replace its main lodge (which is not visible from the water) and a few cabins, and the county requires a new master plan first, he said.

The current lodge, which was there when the church acquired the camp in 1980, has "outlived some of its structural integrity and its functionality can be enhanced with a more updated model," Plumis said.

"Currently the 'lodge' serves as a dining area and multi-use space simultaneously, which can prove challenging. Ideally, we can separate the dining space from the multi- use space in a future design. We also want to provide a facility for camper usage and youth gatherings far into the future," he said.

Plans for the new lodge are expected to be completed within a year, he said.

The county's planning department website placed a \$400,000 project value on All Saints Camp and Retreat Center's new dock and adjacent shoreside deck.

All Saints, the last of a breed

Gig Harborites may be surprised to learn a sleepaway camp still exists on the peninsula. There used to be several, including Camp Colman at the mouth of Horsehead Bay and Camp Ta-Ha-Do-Wa on Tanglewood Island (next to Fox Island).

They are long gone, but All Saints Camp and Retreat Center carries on the tradition.

Before 1980, the site at 205 Camp Road NW on Raft Island was Camp Blanchet, owned and operated for 30 years by the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Washington's Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). During this time, the camp maintained a higher profile on Lay Inlet than its Greek Orthodox successor would. Hundreds of young people from around Puget Sound descended on it every summer, arriving and departing by boat in the years before Raft Island's bridge opened in 1957.

In one notorious incident in 1963, Camp Blanchet's vessel, a 33-foot converted U.S. military landing craft called the Walrus, fell apart and sank in Henderson Bay while packed with campers en route from a sleepover on the Key Peninsula. Everyone onboard survived by holding onto a rope together, swimming to Cutts Island and then hollering until rescuers heard them.

A private island, for a time

Before Camp Blanchet, the property was a private estate. In July 1928, a Tacoma Daily Ledger article headlined "California Man Buys Island Here" announced that George O. Noble, a wealthy mining engineer, had acquired Raft Island's entire 200 acres. The Californian planned a personal estate with "a private wharf, stables for riding horses, roads, trails and terrace landscaping," the newspaper said.

The History of Raft Island, a booklet published by island resident Andy Buffington in 1998, explains that after Noble built his estate on site of the future Catholic and Greek Orthodox camp, he spent little time there and "by 1932 he had left the island for good." (Noble did, however, bring electricity to Raft Island.)

In 1942, Jess Kuhns bought Raft Island for \$30,000 and moved into Noble's house, Buffington's history says. The CYO bought the house and surrounding land from him and opened its facility — later named after the first Catholic bishop in the Pacific Northwest — in 1950.

By the late 1970s, the CYO decided to sell Camp Blanchet and invest the proceeds in its other camp properties. The island had by then become a "residential neighborhood," the camp's executive director told the Catholic Northwest Progress. The increasingly busy waters around the camp made it the CYO's "least desirable unit."

One church to another

When word leaked of Camp Blanchet's possible sale, some neighbors contemplated buying it, as an investment but also to prevent its development. Many were relieved when the Greek Orthodox Church stepped up as a buyer, with a plan to keep it a camp.

Today, All Saints Camp and Retreat Center is a quiet neighbor, especially since the COVID pandemic cut attendance numbers. It is used for four or five weeklong camp sessions during the summer, Plumis said. Its capacity — with one cabin currently out of service — is 132 campers, but a typical session brings only about 50 kids and staff, he said.

The menu for campers "incorporates some Greek food — and it is enjoyed — along with traditional 'camp' style food," Plumis said. Other aspects that differ from typical Boy Scout or YMCA camps are cabins named after Greek Orthodox saints, icon-making workshops, prayer service in the chapel and group discussions on the Orthodox faith. This is alongside "a regular camp program with arts and

crafts, swimming, athletics" and more, Plumis said.

The camp is technically owned by the two Greek Orthodox churches in Seattle, but it is available to students in the area from all Greek and other Orthodox Christian churches, including Russian, Serbian, Antiochan (Syrian) and more, Plumis said. Some of these groups, like the Romanian Orthodox, can fill an entire camp session with their kids, while others send theirs to join the largely Greek Orthodox sessions.

"Unfortunately, it's not used nearly as much as we would like to," Plumis said of the camp. Its 501(c)(3) non-profit status limits its rentals to groups outside the Orthodox faith to 50 days per year, he said.

The challenge in filling the camp with Orthodox kids all summer is that there are simply not that many to draw from. "The pool of Orthodox kids in the churches, simply is not there," Plumis said.

"Boy Scouts have used our camp in days when dollars were more plentiful for outdoor education, especially from Tacoma-area schools," he said. "We just to need to encourage even more usage for such a great facility."

Other groups using All Saints

One longstanding user besides the Orthodox youth camps is Camp Agape Northwest, an annual sleepaway camp for children with cancer from all faiths, and their families. It has operated at All Saints Camp and Retreat Center since 1997.

Camp Agape is one week per summer, during which neighbors of the camp can hear and feel its energy. Usually between 15 and 20 families participate, including parents, siblings and sometimes even grandparents. It is entirely volunteer-run, and can bring together as many as 100 staff members, including a one-one-one buddy for every child with cancer and their siblings.

"With the waterfront, accessible cabins, trails in the woods, sports courts, large green space, the chapel, and the kitchen, we have everything we need to give families experiencing cancer an amazing week," said Christina Bradic, interim director of Camp Agape.

Another user of All Saints Camp and Retreat Center is Natural Spirit International (NSI), a martial arts school in Tacoma. Grand Master Kelly S. Worden has held NSI's Water and Steel Three Day Martial Arts Training Camp at the All Saints facility every summer for the past 25 years, teaching the Worden Defense System, a "reality-based, non-sport martial art," to as many as 85 students per session, he said.

The Raft Island site is natural and far enough from other people that attendees feel they're "out there in the middle of the bush," Worden said. The camp attracts martial arts practitioners from around the world, he said. "They just love the setting, the fact that the deer are right there, the otters are down at the dock."

Chris Pallis Invested as an Archon in New York Ceremony AXIOS! AXIOS! AXIOS!



Congratulations to St. Demetrios parishioner Chris G. Pallis who was invested as an Archon of the Ecumenical Patriarchate on Sunday October 22 in a ceremony at the Archdiocesan Cathedral of the Holy Trinity in New York. He was given the offikion (title) of "Laosynaktis," a position from Byzantine times for someone who helps keep order during church services. His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros of America officiated at a special service after the Divine Liturgy blessing the 39 members of the Archon Class of 2023.

Each new Archon then was presented with the Cross of St. Andrew. Chris received it from His Eminence Metropolitan Gerasimos of San Francisco.

While the honor is indeed recognition of past involvement and service to the Church, Archons are pledged going forward to be "Protecting the Future of Faith," especially promoting religious freedom and human rights for the Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople, the Mother Church of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America There are currently over 750 Archons in the U.S. who engage in education, political lobbying, fund raising and other actions mainly in support of our much-persecuted Patriarch Bartholomew who resides in a hostile environment in Turkey. Chris will be serving on two Archon committees, "Metropolis and Parish Education" and "Youth Participation Activities."



A life-long member of St. Demetrios coming from a strong Orthodox faith-based family environment Chris Pallis has been involved, supportive and a dedicated leader in many ways in the life of the parish as well as the metropolis, and national/international church organizations.

While in junior high school and serving as president of GOYA, he organized a parish youth basketball team and arranged for a place to practice and participation in a Catholic league. He later became president of YAL, and served as co-chair of the 1985 National YAL Conference in Seattle. Chris and his wife Vicki taught Sunday School for two years. He also served on the Parish Council for a total of 19 years, including two as president, and founded and chaired the OPA Ball which raised funds for the parish and Fred Hutch Cancer Center.

Chris was and is a problem-solver, getting things done that long needed attention. He raised funds and oversaw the design and complete reconstruction of the patio and front entrance of the church. Using a bequest from a departed parishioner, along with additional funds he raised, Chris solved the need for a permanent home of the parish bookstore by developing a design to extend a portion of the building

and made sure the construction was completed properly.

Chris served as treasurer of the Metropolis of San Francisco and on the board of the St. John the Forerunner Monastery in Goldendale, WA. He also helped raise funds for the Agia Anna Skete on Mount Athos. He and Vicki are members of the Archdiocese Leadership 100.

More recently, Chris raised \$400,000 to begin the placement of new mosaic icons on the walls with stained glass windows of the four Evangelists. An additional

\$400,000 is needed to complete the work. In 2022, he was chair of the gala celebration of our parish centennial which included a visit of Archbishop Elpidophoros.

Chris and his extended family have established the George and Venetia Pallis Scholarship in honor of his parents which provides funds for young people to attend the Ionian Village summer camp in Greece.

Chris and Vicki are the parents of twin adult sons, Themio and George. Chris has devoted endless hours to church matters while at the same time being president of a successful commercial real estate development company, Pallis Properties, Inc. Works include apartment buildings, self-storage facilities, and anchored retail projects.

Chris becomes the fifth current Archon at St. Demetrios along with Paul Plumis, John John, Theo Angelis and Cliff Argue. All four joined in nominating Chris to receive this high honor of the church. The nomination was warmly endorsed by our proistamenos Fr. Photios Dumont, Pacific Northwest Archon Regional Commander Isidoros Garifalakis of Portland, and Metropolitan Gerasimos of San Francisco.

As noted on the website (<u>www.archons.org</u>) "An Archon is an honoree by His All Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew for his outstanding service to the Church, and a well-known distinguished, and well-respected leader of the Orthodox Christian community.

It is by the grace of God that the Archon has been able to offer his good works and deeds of faith. Further, it is the sworn oath of the Archon to defend and promote the Orthodox Christian faith and tradition. His special concern and interest is to serve as a bulwark to protect and promote the Sacred See of St. Andrew the Apostle and its mission. He is also concerned with the human race's inalienable rights wherever and whenever they are violated - and the well-being and general welfare of the Christian Church.

This honor extended by the Ecumenical Patriarchate carries with it grave responsibilities, deep commitments, and sincere dedication. Consequently, it is of utmost importance that this honor of obligation be bestowed upon individuals of proven Orthodox Christian character, who conform faithfully to the teachings of Christ and the doctrines, canons, worship, discipline, and encyclicals of the Church.

Those selected to serve as Archons have demonstrated a commitment greater than average toward the stewardship of time, talent and treasure for the betterment of the Church, Parish, Diocese/Metropolis, Archdiocese and the community as a whole. An Archon must truly be deserving of the proclamation:
