

Mission Statement: Loving God and One Another in Spirit and in Truth

Preparing the Family for the Nativity of Christ: Living the Advent Fast in the Orthodox Home

The season of the Nativity Fast—known in the Orthodox Church as the "Advent Fast"—is a sacred gift, an invitation for every family to re-enter the mystery of Christ's coming into the world. Far more than a countdown to December 25, this period is a forty-day pilgrimage into humility, repentance, and joyful expectation. For Orthodox Christians, the Fast is not meant to be merely dietary or external; it is a spiritual workshop in the home, a time for parents and children alike to prepare a dwelling place in their hearts for the incarnate Lord. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us, "The home is a little Church," and thus the entire household is called to participate in the journey toward Bethlehem.

Scripture continually urges believers to prepare themselves inwardly for the Lord's coming. The prophet Isaiah cries, "Prepare the way of the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God" (Isaiah 40:3). Though originally spoken in anticipation of the Messiah's arrival, these words are lived anew each



The Nativity Fast begins each year on November 15 and continues until the Feast of the Nativity. While its prescriptions are milder than the Great Fast, it is nonetheless a holy season of restraint, watchfulness, and deliberate detachment from excess. Families are encouraged to understand fasting not as deprivation but as preparation. As St. Basil the Great teaches, "Fasting gives birth to prophets and strengthens the powerful; fasting makes lawgivers wise." The Father's insight reveals fasting as a gift capable of forming virtue, wisdom, and spiritual clarity.

For young children, fasting must always be approached with gentleness and discernment. The goal is never legalism, but formation. Parents may explain that we fast because fasting "makes room" in our hearts for Christ by loosening our attachment to foods, habits, and comforts that often distract us. St. John Climacus offers guidance: "Do not think that the fast consists only in eating rarely; no, the true fast is the removal of evil deeds." Thus, families are invited to emphasize fasting of the tongue—avoiding anger, gossip, and harsh words—as well as fasting of the heart from resentments and selfishness.

When practiced with peace and consistency, fasting unites the home. Shared meals, simple menus, and intentional choices cultivate solidarity and mindfulness. Each member becomes aware that the whole household is walking toward the cave in Bethlehem together.

The Nativity Fast is also a call to deepen prayer within the family. In the Gospel of Luke, the Lord says, "Be dressed ready for service and keep your lamps burning" (Luke 12:35). Prayer becomes the oil that keeps the lamps of faith bright as we await the coming of the Light of the world.

Families may set aside an evening each week for special prayer—lighting a candle before the icon of the Nativity, reading the daily Scripture readings from the Psalter or the Prophets, and chanting or singing the hymn "Christ is Born! Glorify Him!" Children often treasure these moments of beauty, and they form memories that will anchor their faith for years to come.

The Fathers emphasize that prayer is not merely words but a disposition of the heart. St. Theophan the Recluse writes, "Stand with the mind in the heart before God, and remain there constantly." Even brief prayers spoken throughout the day—"Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me"—help transform the home into a place of continual remembrance of God. As December 25 approaches, these prayers weave a thread of anticipation through the daily life of the family.

Fasting and prayer are incomplete without almsgiving. The Apostle Paul exhorts, "Let all that you do be done in love" (1 Corinthians 16:14). The Nativity Fast is a time for families to practice generosity in Christ's name—giving to the poor, visiting the sick, helping neighbors, and performing acts of service quietly and joyfully.

St. John Chrysostom insists, "If you wish to honor the Body of Christ, do not despise Him when He is naked. Do not honor Him here with silken garments while neglecting Him outside, suffering cold and nakedness." The Nativity Fast provides a concrete opportunity for families to teach children that the celebration of Christ's birth must always be linked to compassion for those in need. Setting aside toys, clothing, or food to donate, or volunteering together as a family, becomes a living icon of God's love entering the world.

Participation in the liturgical life of the Church is at the heart of Advent preparation. The services of the season—especially the forefeast hymns and the Royal Hours—immerse families in the theology of the Incarnation. The Church's hymnography reveals the mystery: "Make ready, O Bethlehem, for Eden has been opened for all! Prepare yourself, O Ephratha, for the Tree of Life blossoms forth from the Virgin in the cave!"

In the home, families may prepare an Advent wreath or set up an icon corner featuring the icon of the Nativity. As the fast progresses, parents can share stories of the saints commemorated during this season—St. Nicholas the Wonderworker, St. Spyridon, St. Herman of Alaska—showing children how holiness radiates Christ's light.

Orthodox tradition is profoundly incarnational; physical actions teach spiritual truths. The baking of prosphora, the making of kolyva, or even the crafting of homemade Christmas ornaments all help children understand that the faith is lived and embodied.

It enables translators to study original Greek texts, compare translations, and develop translation strategies. 




Bookstore News

Your St. Demetrios Bookstore's Christmas Shop is open and receiving new items each week. Please stop by to visit us and browse the selection.

There are beautiful Christmas ornaments including red jeweled and wood ornaments with Nativity icons. New wool prayer ropes are available, including in 50-knot and 100-knot lengths, each containing different bead accents. Hand beaded bracelets, in white and pink, make loving gifts for moms and yiayias.



There is also a large assortment of books, by and about our saints and elders. New titles include Saint Evmenios: The Disciple of Saint Nikoforos the Leper and Sermons from the Life of St. John Chrysostom. The bookstore also has Meditations for Advent: Preparing for Christ's Birth by the author of the popular book Meditations for Great Lent. This book takes the reader through the hymnography, scripture readings, and iconography for the forty days leading up to the Nativity of Christ.

For children we have the Potamitis titles **The Gifts of the Magi** and **The Nativity of Christ** in addition to over half of the "Paterikon for Kids" collection. These little books make great stocking stuffers! Also in stock is **Saint Nicholas and the Nine Gold Coins** which invites readers to rediscover the real Saint Nicholas, a compassionate defender of the poor, an almsgiver, and a bold witness to Christ. For babies and toddlers we have board books to help familiarize them with the Nativity and their Orthodox faith while also helping them to learn their ABCs and counting!

The bookstore works with a number of the Greek Orthodox Monasteries to make their handmade items available in the bookstore. One monastery, known for their hand-painted icons, reproduces them and then applies them to colorful agate pieces or embellishes them with embroidery. Come see these gorgeous agate icons that are truly unique. The larger agates can be displayed in stands and the smaller agates are available as magnets or ornaments.



Give the Gift of Greek Cooking

In 1980, Parish Council President, Jim Katsandres, approached Board Member, Alice Plumis Panagakis, to suggest creating a new St. Demetrios cookbook. Alice accepted the challenge and gathered a committee together consisting of her mother Theodora Plumis, sister Frances Barnecut, Presbytera Artemis Demopulos, Maria Kaltsounis, Jean Katsandres, Anita Leonidas, and Evie Rigas. With an initial \$6,000 investment from the Parish Council, the committee began its work, meeting every week, and often twice a week, to test and retest each recipe. At the end of two years the book was ready to launch and was presented at a Cookbook Luncheon in the Church Hall. Today Greek Cooking in an American Kitchen is in its 9th printing. It has been featured in Bon Appetit magazine and sold in Greek Orthodox churches around the country. Locally, it has been available in book stores as well as here at the Saint Demetrios Festival and in our own book store.

Its success has allowed the committee to generously give back (over twentyfold the initial investment) to our church and community in the following ways:

Citizens of the Year

Congratulations to **Christina Bayouk, Lena LaMarche,** and **Brian Koceski** for receiving this years Citizens of the Year Award.



<u>Christina Bayouk:</u> There are few aspects in the church in which Christina Bayouk is not actively involved in, if not, outright leading.

Here are just a few of Christina's contributions to our parish life:

- She has faithfully and consistently taught Sunday School for several years. This is a volunteer position.
- She lends her voice to the church choir and was one of the first to sign on when the choir was "reformed" under the direction of Chris Kouldukis.
- She is involved in leadership in YAL at the local, metropolis, and national levels. She helped put on the metropolis YAL conference this past Labor Day weekend.
- In that capacity as YAL leader, she has organized and led several outreach programs to feed the hungry locally and send assistance to Orthodox ministries abroad.
- While a college student at the UW, she helped organize and lead the college's Orthodox Christian Fellowship (OCF) chapter.
- Along with her sister, Noreen, Christina organized and ran the most successful Youth Booth in festival history last month. With the addition of the bouncy house, face painting, balloon sculptures, and other activities, the booth grossed over \$10,000—at least three times the amount generated in previous festivals.
- Christina's faith in unshakeable and she lives that faith in her worship and her actions to serve others.

There may be more that Christina has accomplished in her young life; these are just a few areas of her contributions of which I am aware. I am sure there are more. Because of her humility and sweet nature, however, Christina would never "toot her own horn." Despite her youth, or maybe, because of it, she deserves to be recognized and honored with this recognition. She is an example that you don't have to be "of a certain age" to live a life of service to our Church and to others in the greater community.



<u>Lena LaMarche's</u> unwavering commitment, selflessness, and tireless service have made her an invaluable member of our parish community, embodying the spirit of Christian stewardship and love. Lena's dedication is evident in her willingness to take on any task, no matter how challenging, with a joyful heart. Here's a partial list of the many ways Lena has and continues to contribute to our community:

For 12 years, she has been a cornerstone of the St. Martin DePorres homeless cooking team, often volunteering for





Ultimately, the Nativity Fast teaches every family that Christ seeks to be born not only in Bethlehem, but in the depths of the heart. St. Ephraim the Syrian prays, "O Lord, make my heart a manger for Your birth." This remarkable image captures the essence of Advent preparation: the heart becomes the cave, humility the straw, repentance the cleansing, and love the warmth into which Christ descends.

In a world that encourages frantic holiday consumerism, the Orthodox family is invited into a different rhythm—quiet, prayerful, joyful, expectant. The fast forms a sacred threshold; by passing through it, the household enters the Feast of the Nativity with deeper gratitude and spiritual clarity.



The preparation for Christmas in the Greek Orthodox Tradition is not a burden but a blessing. Through fasting, prayer, almsgiving, participation in worship, and the sanctification of daily life, the family becomes a living icon of the Church journeying toward the birth of the Savior. As we walk these forty days, we echo the hymn of the Church: "Christ is coming from heaven—meet Him!" And when the star shines over the cave and the angels proclaim peace, the family that has prepared faithfully will greet the newborn King with hearts ready, joyful, and filled with the light of the Incarnation.

I wish you and your family a most blessed Advent!
