What can your church do?

Worship and teaching

- Make caring for our common home a regular focus of intercessions.
- Stress that climate change and social justice around the world are inseparable.
- Use outdoor activities to open people’s eyes to the glories of the natural world.
- Help your local schools to make the link between faith and care for the earth.
- Create prayer stations about the natural world.
- Display children’s art/craft work about creation, the seasons and the natural world.
- Display information for visitors about nature in the church garden

Community and global outreach

- “Green” contributions in church magazine/local press.
- Support actions to build more sustainable local communities.
- Encourage the re-homing of unwanted household items.
- Write to your MP / MEP to highlight environmental issues.
- Plan a “Green Christmas Fair” using home-made, locally sourced materials.
- Support Fairtrade / Christian Aid etc.

Practical action in your church

- Carry out an energy audit.
- Switch to a “renewable” electricity.
- Plant pollinator-friendly flowers.
- Change to low energy lighting.
- Leave some unmown space for wild flowers and other wild life.
- Improve thermal insulation – draught excluders, curtain linings, secondary double glazing.
- Consider solar panels to generate electricity.
- Turn off appliances when not in use; avoid leaving equipment on stand-by.
- Enrol on the “Eco-church” scheme.



Personal actions

- Include caring for our common home as a regular part of your prayers.
- Seek local, seasonal foods.
- Improve home insulation and ensure you are using low energy lighting.
- Car share where you can, walk or cycle if possible.
- Consider the impact of holidays on the environment.
- Estimate a carbon footprint of your home, and see how you could reduce it (*see resources section*).
- Care for wildlife in your garden.
