CATCHING UP WITH ALUMNUS DAVID SIRACUSA CLASS OF 1985



David retired early at age 51 from owning two successful insurance companies in order to pursue his dreams of acting and screen writing. He recently wrote the movie *The Uncivil War—America Divided*, which begins principal production on October 17th right here in Clearwater.

What inspired you to pursue a career in producing and acting?

Actually, it's kind of funny. I retired from owning my insurance companies and my wife, Fran (Veysrk) Siracusa, looked at me and said, "You're not just going to sit around all day not doing anything, right?" So, I thought about it for a bit and wondered what sounded like the most "fun" job out there. Writing and acting seemed like the perfect job that I could enjoy without having to pressure myself much.

What does an average work day look like for you?

For a while, it looked great! I would wake up and go exercise, play basketball, and work out at Rock Solid Fitness, Orangetheory or a boot camp. Then I would sit on my back porch relaxing as I looked through the casting sites, looking for acting jobs to apply for. Then I would either work on preparing for my upcoming roles or perhaps look for clothes for potential wardrobe needs. But then I blew it. I decided to produce one of my own movies. Now, I'm actually busy. *The Uncivil War – America Divided* takes a lot of my time. I am acting as executive producer, producer, actor and writer on this film. Therefore, I am working on attracting and hiring talent, acquiring contracts for my actors, securing locations, promoting the film, and more! It has become a 24/7 job all of a sudden. I have future movies that I have written in my pipeline, but I may take a short vacation after this movie is completed.

What is the best part of your job?

My favorite part is without a doubt when the director yells for quiet on the set! The tingle that I feel right before the action begins is difficult to explain. It's like right before the tip off of a big game. Your competitive nerves are stretched tight, and your desire to nail the scene is at its breaking point. You feel nervous and excited at the same time. It's an incredible experience!

What is your proudest work related achievement to date?

I was in a music video with Carlos Vives and Camilo. They are two huge stars in the Latino world that are not as well known in the states, although Carlos Vives gained a lot of notoriety stateside recently when he released "Columbia, Mi Encanto" for the movie *Encanto*. His music video that I was a part of, *Baloncito Viejo*, has received over 14 million views on YouTube since it was released 6 months ago. I was the bald headed goal keeper extraordinaire. I have been in a number of small movies as well that I am very proud of, but I am quite certain that producing my own movie, starring some amazing Hollywood actors like Jeremy London (*Mallrats*, *Gods and Generals*), Corin Nemec (*Stargate SG-1*, *Parker Lewis Can't Lose*, *Beverly Hills, 90210*), Musetta Vander (*Oh Brother*, *Where Art Thou*), Christiana Leucas (*The Last Stand*), Tanya Christiansen and more will absolutely be my most exciting moment yet in my very short career.

What was your favorite SCS tradition?

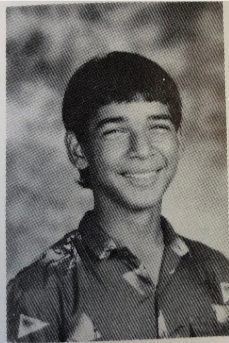

ALUMNUS CONOR O'BRIEN '11 NAMED CO-WINNER OF JOE CONCANNON AWARD

Endicott men's ice hockey senior goaltender Conor O'Brien has been selected as the co-winner of the 21st Joe Concannon Award, presented annually to the best American-born NCAA Division II/III college hockey student-athlete in New England.

The Joe Concannon Award was established in 2001 shortly after the passing of the longtime writer for *The Boston Globe* who had a great passion for the game of college hockey while always advocating strongly for amateur athletics.

O'Brien is the first student-athlete in Endicott men's ice hockey program history to receive the award. Additionally, he is only the third goalie ever to win the Joe Concannon Award.

"From day one, Conor has made our program and community a better place," said Endicott men's ice hockey head coach R.J. Tolan.

"He's the most self-confident and competitive person I have coached. He is so committed to his craft, and he has made it almost impossible not to play him in every game, not only over the last season, but for his entire career here at Endicott. Conor always raises the bar and wills himself to be the very best goaltender, captain, and teammate. He has been the backbone of our team, has been a great leader, and has been a huge contributor to our success as a program."

O'Brien currently ranks No. 1 in Division III in save percentage, No. 2 in GAA, and No. 15 in goalie winning percentage (.750).

For his efforts this season, O'Brien became the first goaltender in CCC men's ice hockey history to receive conference Player of the Year and Goaltender of the Year accolades, respectively. The Goaltender of the Year award marked his second career honor, while his All-CCC First Team selection also was a second-time achievement for his storied career.

Alumnus Gregory Limardi, II class 2012 is currently in term two at St. George University. On Saturday September 10, 2022, he received his white coat.

The white coat ceremony is a rite of passage for medical students and was created by the Arnold P. Gold Foundation in 1993. During the ceremony, a white coat is placed on each student's shoulders and often the Hippocratic oath is recited, signifying their entrance into the medical profession. Often seen as a symbol of authority and professionalism, SGU was one of the first medical schools to honor this tradition.
