

MYP SUMMER READING CHOICE BOARD

Summer homework for the required book per grade level:

6th- *A Long Walk to Water*, 7th- *Red Kayak*, 8th – *The Testing*

Choose 1 item to complete. Turn into your Language and Literature teacher by Aug 10. When you return to school, you will be given a follow-up IB Reflection to complete. Be prepared to explain the work you have done. Use 12 pt. font for typed paragraph assignments.

<p>Choose three character traits to describe a main character from the required book. Make sure to use text evidence to support the traits you have chosen.</p> <p>Consider his/her thoughts, feelings, actions, and his words. Type a paragraph (6-7 sentences per paragraph) for each of the three character traits. Remember, provide a reference from the book to support your claim.</p> <p>On a separate piece of white 8 1/2" x 11" piece of paper draw a picture of the main character, identify that character, and in a fun way write one word that sums up each of the three traits for a total of 3 words surrounding the character. (Ex. Strong, Funny, Curious)</p>	<p>Write an original <u>one-page script</u> for your favorite scene from the book.</p> <p>The script must consist of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <u>Scene Heading</u> (the name of your scene) • <u>Action</u> – Describes the details of the setting and what is happening when the scene begins. It is what can be seen and heard. Sound effects should be noted in all caps. • <u>Characters and Dialogue</u> – each character has his/her own words/lines to speak. The scene must have at least 2 characters and be one full typed page 12 pt. font. • <u>Parentheticals</u> – use sparingly, but these can give more information and instruction for the dialogue. Typed within parentheses. 	<p>Type a newspaper article about the events of the novel.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Give your newspaper a name that corresponds to the main setting of the novel. • Remember to include the 5 W's (who, what, when, where, and why) 1 H (how). • Include character quotes – either actual quotes or ones you create to add interest to the story. • Add a photo (either hand drawn, clip art, or real photo). The photo must have a caption. • The newspaper article should consist of at least 3 paragraphs.
<p>Create a Quote Quilt. Fold your paper in half once, then fold it again. You should now have a paper with 4 rectangles on it.</p> <p>In each section, write an important quote from the novel with the page number of the book. If a character said the quote, note the character's name.</p> <p>Be sure to add color and a little design around the quotes.</p> <p>On the back, write a paragraph for each quote explaining the importance of each quote for a total of 4 paragraphs.</p> <p>The ink from the paragraphs on the back should not be seen on the front side.</p>	<p>Write an acrostic poem using the title of your required book.</p> <p>This acrostic poem must focus on a theme that is in the book.</p> <p>Each line of this acrostic poem must be a phrase (4 words or more) or a full sentence. It does not have to rhyme.</p> <p>The acrostic poem may be typed or handwritten, but must take up a full 8 1/2 x 11 size of paper.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Example:</p> <p>R_____</p> <p>E_____</p> <p>D_____</p> <p>K_____</p> <p>A_____</p> <p>Y_____</p> <p>A_____</p> <p>K_____</p> <p>On a separate piece of paper, type one paragraph explaining how the theme in your acrostic poem is evident in the book.</p>	<p>Create an original movie poster for the required book.</p> <p>The poster may be as small as 8" 1/2 x 11", but may be as large as a regular sized poster board.</p> <p>The poster must include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Title of the book/movie • The Stars of the Movie (famous people that you feel reflect the characters) • The Director (The Author) • Release Date (Due date – Aug 10, 2022) • Catchy quote or slogan <p>The artwork must reflect at least one of the following parts of a plot:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Exposition - time, place, introduction of main characters • Rising action – include conflict(s) • Climax – turning point of the story • Falling action – the conflicts begin to resolve • Resolution – the ending to the plot <p>On the back explain the artwork in 1 paragraph.</p>
