



Go (Green Zone)
TAKE THESE CONTROLLER MEDICINE(S) EVERY DAY EVEN IF YOU FEEL OKAY
 • Good breathing • No cough or wheeze • Can go to school, work or play • Able to sleep well
Controller Medications
 cetirizine (ZYRTEC) 5 mg chewable tablet Take 5 mg by mouth every day as needed (nasal congestion/nasal allergies)
 Before exercising, take: Albuterol 2-4 puffs 15 minutes before exercise.

Caution (Yellow Zone)
TAKE THESE MEDICINE(S) AT THE START OF A COLD OR FIRST SIGN OF ASTHMA WARNING SIGNALS 'BE SURE TO CONTINUE YOUR EVERYDAY CONTROLLER MEDICATIONS'
 • Chest tightness • Cough or wheeze • Working hard to breathe
 • Shortness of breath • Need rescue medicine more often • Difficulty with sleep, activity or exercise
Rescue Medications
 albuterol HFA 90 mcg/actuation inhaler Inhale 4 Puffs into lungs every 4 hours as needed for wheezing, shortness of breath or cough
 If at any time the rescue medicines are not helpful call 404-785-5437 right away. It may be time to begin an oral steroid. Please call your doctor or the doctor on call before using oral steroids.

Symptoms Better? → Continue with plan for 2 days or until back to Green Zone
Symptoms Not Better or Worse? → Take rescue medicine every 20 minutes for 3 treatments and call us at 404-785-5437.

Danger (Red Zone)
IF SYMPTOMS ARE LIFE THREATENING OR IF SKIN, FINGERS OR LIPS ARE BLUE AT ANY TIME, CALL 911
 • Breathing rate is fast • Severe breathing • Continual cough



There are two LPOC views available:

- **Happy Together**- standard view that is available for all patients and gives an overview of a patient's overall health summary.
- **Care Coordinator**- used primarily by care coordinators on the medically complex and CP teams to manage patient care.

LONGITUDINAL PLAN OF CARE

Happy Together is standard for all patients and gives an in-depth overview of a patient's overall health summary.

Happy Together View
