**Minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting
of the Church of the Ascension
Held on Sunday, January 31, 2021**

The Annual Meeting was called to order following the 11 am service. Voting had been done in advance by paper ballots or on line.

Opening Collect and Call to Order: Immediately following the 11 AM service, Mother Liz called the meeting to order with an opening collect at 12:50 PM.

More than 60 parishioners were in attendance via Zoom.

Appointment of Secretary: Mother Liz asked for a motion to appoint David Lehmann as secretary and was unanimously approved.

Minutes of meeting of January 26, 2020: Unanimously approved after being moved by Isabel Spencer and seconded by Susi Braden.

Mother Liz then turned the meeting over to Mary Gaillard, Treasurer, and John Grimes, Chair of the Finance Committee.

Report of Treasurer and Finance Committee: John Grimes, Chair of the Finance Committee, and Mary Gaillard, Treasurer, gave their report, the details of which can be found on pg 11-14. Mary reported that though this has been a challenging and unusual year the parish is in “pretty good shape” financially. A deficit of \$248,000 is projected after a deficit of \$333,000 last year. The Finance Committee worked closely with the Rector and the part-time bookkeeper Laurie Ross. The federal PPP loan allowed the parish to pay staff and utilities. John is hopeful that we might be eligible for a second draw loan if we can show that our income is down by 25%. Other notes made regarding the budget included how important pledges are in this time, and pledgers who have not yet submitted their pledges for 2021 should consider doing so. Abundant Giving has made it possible to make up on some shortfalls. It has been a good year for our endowments, with an 11% increase. We will continue to draw down only 5% from the endowments which are not restricted. Another plus is that our diocesan assessment was reduced by 25%. John’s suggestion for moving into the new year is that we divide the year into periods (Jan. – Sept. and Oct. – Dec.) with the hope that services may be able to resume in the fall. No questions were posed for the committee.

Mother Liz expressed her gratitude for the Finance Committee's hard work and dedication.

Report of Nominating Committee: Mother Liz announced the names of the following candidates running for Vestry: Vin Knight and John Thompson are running for re-election. Other candidates are Elizabeth Adams, Garrett Dangler, Gale Lynch and Rachel Sedor. Warden: Isabel Spencer is running for a second term of two years.

Wardens Report: Isabel thanked the building staff and pledgers. She challenged us to recall how a decade ago we were out of the sanctuary, holding services in the parish hall. We moved forward then, and she suggests we continue as a religion of the Word and consider how we will go forward from here as a better, stronger parish. Maurice referred to today’s Psalm “holy and awesome is

your name.” God is in control. And to remember the heritage expressed in *The Unknown Worshipper* (1964): “Church of the Ascension has always stood for something.” In 2020 we stood for justice, democracy and compassion and against the pandemic.

Planned Giving: Liz Hill reminded us that there is no minimum for a planned gift. Include Ascension because you want to. It is not a debt.

The year in images: John Thompson who compiled this section of the meeting encapsulated it in the words: *Quite a Year!!* Images were shown of last year’s Twelfth Night celebration (A huge shout out to Mother Liz’s lively rendition of *The Twelve Days of Christmas*). Choir performances, scenes from the Harvest Dinner and images from parishioners own years in pictures captured the spirit of a very unusual year.

Small Group Conversations and Report back: The meeting broke into 5 small groups, led by clergy and Wardens. Questions were posed as to how do we move forward with services after a year of Zoom and where should we go with social justice and pastoral care issues. Very helpful suggestions were reported back and will be discussed and carried forward by parish leadership.

Announcement of Election Results: Mother Liz announced the election results as follows: Vin Knight and John Thompson were reelected to second terms. Gale Lynch and Rachel Sedor will join the Vestry as new members. They will be commissioned Sunday, February 7, 2021.

Necrology: Only one memorial service was held at the church this year, that of Julian Sands, husband of our dear Judith Sands. Mother Liz asked all in attendance to bow our heads in prayer remembering all those associated with our parish who passed away in 2020.

Announcements: Mother Liz announced the appointment of Ascension’s first Chancellor, a person who will advise the Parish on legal matters. Charles Schmidt has accepted the position. Mother Liz thanked Mary Gaillard and David Lehmann for their service on the Vestry. She also thanked the Nominating Committee and Vestry candidates. Thank you also to Derek Baker for making on-line voting possible.

Questions and Answers: No further questions were forthcoming from the floor.

Benediction: Mother Liz led all present in the Benediction.

Adjournment: Mother Liz asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. The motion was moved by Isabel Spencer, seconded by Kyle Cheseborough and unanimously approved.

After a closing prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 1:30 PM.

Parish Statistics

As of 31 December 2021

This includes a few categories that were not in last year's report. We have begun to keep better track of those who participate in our services via livestream (both on zoom and Local Live) but we probably missed some early on.

When we were completely online, the attendance was not quite as high as it was earlier in the pandemic. Easter was down from 2020. This may reflect people having more options in the spring and summer of 2021, or may be due to zoom fatigue, or something else. I do note with interest that our Christmas numbers for hybrid but mostly online services were significantly higher than last year (for Christmas Eve attendance was more than twice that in 2020). This may be due to the livestreamed music, or to the sudden shutdown due to the omicron surge.

It's also worth noting that although we recorded 4 burials/memorials in our register, none of them were for church members. The only parishioner we lost to death in 2021, our dear Liz Hill, has not yet had a service as her family is awaiting a safer time for in person gathering.

Despite all the challenges of the pandemic, we had two baptisms (Leonardo Bruce Cappello and Liam Udonna Staudenmeier) and one confirmation (Taylor Catalana) during 2021. It's a blessing to welcome new members to our community!

Rector's Report

The second year of Covid has been hybrid. By that I mean that we have transitioned to hybrid worship, of course, meeting both in person and online. But it has also, to a surprising extent, been different than I could have imagined: more complex, often two steps forward and one back, hopeful and demoralizing, disappointing but filled with significant accomplishments. Never the straight line of progress that I had imagined it would be, with us finishing the year once again closing the church due to a viral surge. But most important, 2021 was marked by our care for one another; by deep searching and steadfast faith; by hard work, struggles, tears and lots of laughter; by beautiful music, art and poetry and the grace of God in our midst. Here are some of the important events of this year that was, once again, like no other.

Worship – Our 11 am zoom services continued through Labor Day, marked by an intimacy that for many of us was one of the surprising and sustaining gifts of the pandemic. I cannot thank John Thompson, our zoom wizard, too many times for the gift of his time, skill and care in making those services happen. We gradually began to open the church for smaller services throughout the spring and summer: Wednesday evening Eucharists, and then Sundays at 9 am. We returned to in person worship, masked and distanced, with choir and hymn singing and Eucharist in one kind, on Sunday, September 12. With great joy too. This seems like a good place to say how grateful I am to Dr. Keene and our wonderful singers for their wonderful music both recorded for zoom and live with masks on. Thank you for lifting our hearts, stirring our souls and helping us pray.

We engaged a service called Local Live for streaming the liturgy and are still working out some of the kinks with sound and cameras. Nonetheless, we have been able to develop a community that is both in person and online, and I am moved by the faithfulness of those who attend. Special thanks are due to all who have helped host the online services this fall and winter: Jacob Scott, Zennie Trieu, Vin Knight, Steve Hubbard, Derek Baker and Eve Beglarian. Andrew Jones, our intrepid parish administrator, has led this effort and embraced the challenge with huge goodwill, formidable dedication, and willingness to learn. We could not have managed without him.

This year included 2 worship experiences that deserve special mention. We celebrated All Souls Day, Dia de los Muertos, at our Wednesday service. We were graced by a special Day of the Dead quilt made by Mother Posey, and an altar for our beloved dead. We intended to focus on those lost to Covid, but many of our other saints seemed to come crowding in memory, mourning and celebration. It might be the beginning of a parish tradition of remembrance. And, day in and day out, week in and week out, around 12 faithful souls gather for Evening Prayer online. The clergy usually lead, but there are other participants who are fully able to step in as needed. Throughout the pandemic a wonderful community has grown, including people from across the country and even the world as well as right here in NYC. I know we are upheld by this daily prayer, and I am grateful.

Reopening Committee – This very hard-working group not only planned our return to in person worship and our online presence; they have worked on reopening the garden and the church for visitors, protocols for groups that use our space, and questions of how to gather outside for coffee hour as the weather turns chilly. We have a tent and outdoor heaters, and we hope to keep using them through the winter months! They have also offered wise counsel as we have needed to respond, sometimes quickly, to news about Covid surges and risks in our city. I am grateful to

them all: Fr. Ed Chinery, John Grimes, Steve Hubbard, Andrew Jones, Dennis Keene, Tom Rice, Kate Rutherford, Isabel Spencer, John Thompson, Matt Vermedahl. Special thanks to Madonna Stack-Barker, a fountain of public health experience and wisdom.

Spiritual Development Programs – One of the gratifying developments of Covid time has been the large number of engaging programs offered for our learning and growth in faith. Our Sunday forums this year included a Lenten series on Justice and Reconciliation; reading Stephanie Spellers' *The Church Split Open* together; seminarian Linda Brandt guiding us through developing a rule of life; considerations of faith through poetry and art; conversations about sermons and current events; discussions of what this time of Covid has taught us and more. We had a Lenten Quiet day about Forgiveness (led by Mtr. Posey). Once again parishioners contributed to a Lenten devotional (thank you, Elizabeth Adams and Matthew Snow) and an online Advent calendar of photos.

We welcomed several guest preachers this year and being online made it easier to extend our reach geographically. We heard Dr Claudio Carvalhaes of Union Seminary on Earth Day; Fr. Sam Owen returned to talk with us about the ministry of the NY-Haiti Project; Bishop Mary Glasspool was with us for LGBTQ Pride and our own Stacey Carpenter preached from Austin, sharing her perspective and progress as a seminarian. We look forward to her ordination, God willing, as both deacon and priest in 2022.

Our Racial Justice Group deserves special mention as we continue to reckon with racism in our hearts, in our church and in our country. In a year of reading theology, listening, looking at art and considering reparations perhaps a highlight was our exploration of *How the Word is Passed* by Clint Smith. We usually meet on the third Thursday of the month, and welcome everyone to join us.

A new *Women's Spirituality Group*, convened by Shana Kaplanov, launched at the end of 2021. All parishioners who identify as women are welcome to participate on the second Thursday of each month.

Community Engagement/Social Justice – In March of 2021, before we opened to any other groups, we were honored to host hunger strikers from the Campaign for Excluded Workers. For several days and nights, participants in this campaign for relief for workers who had not been included in the state budget- undocumented workers, vendors, domestic workers, farmworkers and others (many of them also deemed "essential")- slept in our parish hall and rectory parlor and held teach-ins and press conferences in our space. "Is this not the fast that I choose?," read our Lenten sign in front of the church. Yes, it was, and praise God, the strikers won their cause in the final NYS budget.

In the late fall we served as the downtown reception center for a coat drive sponsored by the Interfaith Center of New York and other partners for Afghan Refugees housed at Ft. Dix. It was a delight to be the conduit for many boxes of coats from parishioners and neighbors, Jews, Hindus, Muslims and others, for these newcomers to our country.

Staff Developments – 2021 saw some significant staff changes at Ascension. Our long-time, beloved Sexton, Len Bowman, retired at the end of June. Assistant Sexton Ravi Gayadin followed in early

September. Well before that, stimulated in part by Vince Amodei's retirement in 2019, the vestry had begun a conversation about the kind of senior staff member we need to manage the financial and other business of the church. Thus, this spring and summer search committees for the new position of Business Manager and for a new Sexton were hard at work developing job descriptions and interviewing candidates. We are delighted to welcome to Ascension Kelli Long, our Business Manager, and Dwight Roberts, our new Sexton, as well as Luis Ortiz, Assistant Sexton. They have all jumped into myriad challenges with energy and competence, and I am very grateful to have them on board. I am also delighted that Sajia Choudhury has joined us as our part-time bookkeeper. Many thanks to all who served on the search committees!

Throughout much of the pandemic, we were blessed to have Mtr. Meredith Ward at Ascension as she began her ordained ministry. In the late spring of 2021 Meredith was called to St. Bartholomew's, Manhattan as Associate Rector for Pastoral Care, and we bid her a fond farewell in May. Meanwhile, my clergy colleagues, Fr. Ed and Mtr. Posey, continue to be a great blessing both to me and to our congregation. I am deeply grateful for their friendship and their particular, complementary ministries, and never more than during these challenging times.

Lay Leaders – As the city gradually began to open up, the vestry returned to work on projects that had to be suspended in the height of the pandemic. Both our finances and our buildings have required a lot of attention this year, with work still to be done. We owe a special debt of gratitude to Mary Gaillard and Madonna Stack-Barker for all their labor to get our finances in order.

I am grateful to all who have worked so hard to help hold the community together as well as manage the business of the church and its old, beautiful and in some cases fragile properties. Thanks especially to those vestry members whose terms expire this year: Barbara Burns, Janet Fisher, Rusty Moore and Madonna Stack-Barker. Each in their own way has brought significant gifts to leadership; we will miss them on the vestry but trust that they will find other ways to serve!

At this annual meeting, Maurice Seaton steps down after six years as warden of Ascension. He has brought enormous energy and dedication to his role, and his faith and vision are contagious. I am especially grateful for his work to raise our rental income and develop our staff, as well as his commitment to our witness for social justice. Maurice, thank you! I trust that you and Gus will have some opportunities for fun and relaxation in the coming months.

Meanwhile, Isabel Spencer continues as warden, and her wit, intellect, flair and devotion to Ascension (to say nothing of her exhaustive knowledge of its building restorations) are gifts to us all.

Moving Forward – As 2022 begins, there is much to be done. I look forward to a time when we can gather in person more freely and know that we need to enhance our capacity for hybrid programs and community building beyond our worship services. It has been a pleasure to rediscover the pleasures of online coffee hours during the closures of omicron.

We experienced new intimacy and insight during the pandemic, as well as unique challenges; I hope we can continue to bring the gifts of this time with us into the coming year.

Our buildings need some significant attention- from repair of the tower brownstone to flood remediation in the rectory basement and ground floor. After some months and a lot of work on the gas lines, heat has been restored in the rectory, for which I give thanks these frigid January days. We need to plan for greening our buildings- an important priority which sometimes gets lost in the urgency of immediate crises.

I serve as chair of the Creation Care Committee for the Diocese of New York, and attention to our imperiled earth and her creatures is always in my mind and heart. The world around us is rife with injustice and pain, as well as with opportunities to love, serve and create. As I frequently say, we must discern what is ours to do and do it with all our hearts. I sense a real desire at Ascension to expand our witness and our outreach.

Fr. Ed and I are both due for sabbaticals (three months for rest and renewal granted to priests in our diocese every six years) and intend to take them on a staggered schedule over the next two years. We are planning with the vestry, each other and Mtr Posey for coverage while each of us is away. I know that there is important business that must continue, but also hope we will all have time to breathe and imagine, heal and listen for how God is calling us. I know that I need this time after the past 2 years, especially, and hope that the spaciousness for reflection, rest and new experiences it offers will be a blessing both to me and to Ascension. I am grateful.

And I am grateful for all of you. These are uncertain and challenging times, and your immense good will, commitment, humor and thoughtful faith are a tremendous gift to me. This community is resilient in part because we are willing to change and genuinely love each other. I don't know what lies ahead in 2022 and beyond, but I do believe with Julian of Norwich that all shall be well. As a favorite spiritual sings, "I don't believe you brought me this far to leave me."

May God bless you richly, dear people of Ascension.

Nominating Committee Report

The nominating committee is charged with presenting a slate of qualified and capable candidates to serve on the Vestry of the Church of the Ascension. Vestry members are elected to three-year terms, with each limited to two consecutive three-year terms.

Three-year terms ended for Madonna Stack-Barker, Rusty Moore, Barbara Burns and Janet Fisher. Janet was not eligible to run again due to term limits and her voice will be missed. Barbara and Rusty chose not to run for reelection, and the vestry respects their decision and thanks them for their service.

These are the nominees, who are eligible under Ascension by-laws for election or reelection: Madonna Stack-Barker, Elizabeth Adams, John Grimes, Steve Hubbard, and Shana Kaplanov.

In addition, the vestry has nominated David Cholcher for a two-year term as warden. Eligible voters are asked to select four candidates for vestry and to cast a "yes" or "no" vote for warden.

Serving on this year's nominating committee were Joan Castagnone, Steve Hubbard, Rachel Sedor and Shep Skiff, with Isabel Spencer as chair. Isabel Spencer, Chair

Finance Committee and Treasurer's Report

2021 was another challenging and unusual year for the Finance Committee as the impact of the pandemic continued.

Highlights of our financial picture during 2021 are:

- PPP: We applied for and received a second "loan" in the amount of \$163,000 from the SBA's Paycheck Protection Program (PPP). The first loan, also of \$163,000, was "forgiven" in 2021 and became a grant to the church. The application showed that the funds were used for salaries and utilities according to the rules of the program. That allowed us include the \$163,000 into the income line for 2021. We will be applying for forgiveness of the second loan this year and have therefore included it as a budget item in 2022.
- Manton Covid Relief Fund: We were delighted to receive an unsolicited grant of \$250,000 from the Manton Foundation for "covid relief." The Manton Covid Relief Fund was opened as a separate account at Fiduciary Trust, and \$150,000 was placed in it. Of the remaining \$100,000, \$25,000 was used to pay down the principal of the loan we have at Fiduciary (replacing rental income that we would otherwise have used to pay the loan), and \$21,000 has been spent to date on streaming technology in order to provide remote access to our in-church Sunday services.
- Outside Contributions: Meetings such as 12 step programs, rent for groups using our space, weddings, and income from other organizations using our space for a one-time project were down again this year compared with 2019, as meeting in person continued to be difficult as a result of the pandemic. However, we were encouraged to receive income of \$14,000 related to movie and television shoots using our facilities at the end of 2021.
- Pledge Income: Parishioners continued to pay their pledges during this time of uncertainty, and we give a big thanks for their generosity. Our pledge total for 2021 came in under budget, mainly as a result of the loss of a few large pledging units. The loss of these parishioners also impacts the expected pledge total for 2022.
- Endowment Income: Our endowments continued to be strong over the course of the year.
- Diocesan Assessment: The Diocese of New York permitted parishes a reduction of up to 25% on their 2021 diocesan assessment. We applied for and received a 25% reduction for each quarter in 2021. This resulted in a saving of \$56,300.

The operating results for 2021, which are still being finalized, ended the year with a deficit of \$344,721. This was \$26,797 more favorable than budgeted. The deficit is reduced to \$181,721 when the PPP income of \$163,000 is included. Income was \$14,105 less than expected, primarily due to the reduction in pledges and rent and outside contributions. Expenses were less than budget by \$40,902, as a result of the church and its programs being closed longer than expected due to the pandemic.

The budget for 2022 anticipates an operating deficit of \$456,343, or \$160,343 after the application of PPP and ERTC (described below). We expect the deficit to be reduced by \$163,000 when we receive forgiveness of the second PPP loan. We will also be applying for payroll tax credit through the federal Employee Retention Tax Credit (ERTC) program, a program which Congress created during the covid pandemic to provide payroll tax relief to organizations who kept employees on their payroll (retroactive to 2020). The budget includes a credit to expenses of \$133,000 which will further reduce the projected deficit.

The 2022 expense budget includes a 3% raise for full-time employees, partially reflecting the recent increase in inflation. The Diocesan assessment is returning to the pre-covid levels in 2022. In total, expenses are expected to be \$1,401,842, or \$1,268,842 including the ERTC credit.

On the income side, the amount we receive is projected to be \$945,499, or \$1,108,499 including the second PPP. The budget includes 2022 pledge income of \$365,000, which, as mentioned previously, is lower than the amount received in 2021. We are expecting to continue to receive a lower amount from outside organizations until we return to “normal” later in the year. Pledge income represents only about 26% of our budgeted operating expenses, slightly lower than the last few years. It is difficult to cover our operating costs and we rely too much on our endowment income.

Over the past number of years, we have been working on reducing the deficit, thereby reducing the amount of endowment income which is needed to pay the shortfall. This will be difficult until we return to a time when we can expect more income from outside organizations who use our space and can be there in person.

The Finance Committee is continually looking for ways to increase income and decrease costs, and we are open to discussions with parishioners on this topic. We have a large challenge for 2023, when the covid related relief programs will no longer be in effect.

The members of the Finance Committee during 2021 were Mother Elizabeth Maxwell, Wardens Isabel Spencer and Maurice Seaton, Finance Chair John Grimes, Treasurer Mary Gaillard, Business Manager Kelli Long, Charlie Schmidt, Madonna Stack-Barker, and Rachel Matthai.

The Finance Committee generally meets monthly during the year or more frequently, as required, to monitor the current year's budget, comparing it with actual income and expenses and working closely with the bookkeeper. The Committee prepared the 2022 operating budget, which was approved by the Vestry at its January meeting. Thanks to zoom we were able to keep this schedule.

We were delighted that Kelli Long was hired in the fall to fill the newly created position of Business Manager. Kelli comes with a financial and bookkeeping expertise and will be an asset for improving our finances, working on obtaining more income sources and controlling our expenses. Sajia Choudhury joined us in 2021 as our part time bookkeeper.

The Committee works with the Endowment and Investments Committee to review the results of our endowment funds. The Endowment and Investments Committee meets with our investment managers periodically to monitor, discuss, and direct the investment strategies.

We obtained a line of credit of \$2.5 million from Fiduciary Trust Company International in 2008. This allowed us to manage our cash flow in 2009 and to the present, as we completed the restoration of the Church and the renovation of the Rectory. The loan was structured so that we only drew down from it the cash that was needed at the time to pay our invoices, paying a low interest rate on a quarterly basis. We have paid back some of the loan with funds from our previous and current capital campaigns, as well as from some of the accrued income from some of our endowment funds. A large portion of the income we receive from La Petite Ecole is being used to pay down the loan as well. We still have the task of paying back the amount outstanding, which is currently approximately \$1.0 million, and in the meantime, we are paying interest of approximately \$35,000 per year.

Fiduciary Trust Company International manages the first eleven endowment funds listed below, and the Bank of New York Mellon manages the Maintenance Fund Addition. A number of smaller funds are invested in the Diocesan Investment Trust, maintained by the Diocese of New York.

Most of these funds are restricted as to their use, and others are available to be applied towards the operating expenses of the Church.

Associate Rector's Report

While the parish continued to move with grace across a landscape made shifty by covid, Ascension Outreach Inc. continued to serve a population of pantry visitors that steadily grew throughout 2021 – yet we still haven't missed a single food distribution date. We're glad to restate how we'd received a significant number of donations in 2020 – an apparent outpouring of compassion, mostly from our regular donors – but, in all honesty, 2021 did a fair amount of depleting our coffers. As you're likely aware, our service population is vast majority AAPI, and insofar as Food Bank NYC doesn't offer many culturally competent food choices, we've had to supplement with wholesale purchase of things like fresh produce and cooking oil. This cut out finances in half. Nonetheless, we proceed undaunted, our hopes and spirits held high. We continue with organization of a fund-development team as part of program operations, so if you feel moved to assist in this regard, please contact Fr. Ed at fatherchinery@ascensionnyc.org. We're also very happy to share that, while several parishioners regularly serve at pantry, as many or more young pantry volunteers with helpful language skills (bilingual in English and Chinese) continue to find their way into our midst. With the initiating assistance of Br. Andrew Jones, our Parish Administrator, the program continued to refine our method of serving the local deaf and deaf-blind community. We do so in partnership with the first Episcopal Church established exclusively for the deaf, St. Ann's Church on nearby 18th Street. And finally, we're blessed that parishioners comprise the majority of our board membership. This is especially noteworthy as, in 2021, a number of measures were taken to strengthen ties between the program and the governing body of the parish. Please keep us in your prayers as that process continues to gain new vitality.

Ascension Outreach's collaboration with local program Resistance Cinema continued to serve during 2021 as well. The program offered 8 different screenings of socially relevant documentary films, as well as a variety of TED talks and even news clips with informative and discussion-enhancing content. We regularly host an average of 30 viewers – many are loyal and regular attendees – who offer immensely insightful observations in our post screening talk-back sessions. Priest Associate's Report

Because of the ongoing pandemic, I have not been able to restart my teaching ministry this past year. But I remain hopeful that 2022 will bring the kinds of changes we have all been longing for and that I will be able to lead retreats and workshops again.

The Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission has continued to meet virtually. As part of the larger commission's work, a trio from the Episcopal/Jewish Dialogue subcommittee (Susan Auchincloss of St Gregory's in Woodstock, Meredith Ward of St Bart's, and I) worked with Matthew Meade (Christ Church Pelham) to craft a resolution addressing antisemitism in our lectionary. We presented it for a vote at our diocesan convention. It passed! We are now hoping that our resolution will go on to inform a national resolution on the same topic for General Convention this summer.

I have continued to write for The Resistance Prays (as I have since shortly after it started publishing its faithful Christian responses to Trump-ism daily, early in 2017). While TRP is only published once a week now, it continues to speak truth to power, regardless of the party that is in power. (<https://bit.ly/3g7H9QU>).

The Needlework Ministry at Ascension also continues virtually, and it is a joy to be part of that work. Please take a look at our write up in this annual report.

Speaking of needlework, I have been doing quite a bit of it here at home. And that is always a blessing and a grounding practice for me.

Philippe and I are so happy to be settled in the neighborhood, and we are so glad we moved downtown (how happy I was to be so nearby when I broke my foot this year!) Our young adult children are both still in Queens, which means we get to see them frequently. Blessings abound.

I want to finish with a shout out to my two clergy colleagues, without whom I could not have remained so steadfast and grounded in this pandemic time. We are a wonderful synergistic team, and the level of mutual support fills me with gratitude.

Thank you to this whole community for being who you are. Thank you for your faithfulness and kindness. It remains a joy to serve with you.

Wardens' Report

Incredibly, 2021 has been a year of great accomplishment at the Church of the Ascension, despite the continuing Covid-19 pandemic. Mother Liz (along with the staff and lay team) has done an excellent job to keep us going through three-quarters of the year with meaningful remote worship; and when in-person services restarted in September, at least half of that congregation remained on-line. Participating in the Eucharist and hearing our beloved choir in person may have been the

major reasons for returning to church, but Father Ed's coffee hour tents added to the much-needed feeling of restored community.

An important milestone was achieved with the hiring of our first (or at least first in a half-century) business manager, Kelli Long in September. Kelli directs day-to-day activities of both our bookkeeper and our resident sexton. Her presence makes it possible for Mother Liz to focus her energies more fully on worship, programming and pastoring rather than day-to-day operational management. Kelli is one of three hires at Ascension in 2021. Our long-time sexton, Len Bowman, retired after years of service to Ascension and other Episcopal churches. Sandra Bowman also retired from the position as Sunday childcare provider. After a wide search, Dwight Roberts was selected as our new resident sexton and assumed duty in October. Luis Ortiz also replaced Ravi Gayadin as assistant sexton in November. The leadership of every member of the Personnel, Finance and Buildings and Grounds committees, and in particular Kyle Cheseborough's contribution, was essential to finding the most suitable candidates for these positions. We warmly welcome Kelli, Dwight and Luis to the Ascension family.

Our ever-needy buildings received some important upgrades in 2021 and not having anyone in the space helped move some projects forward. The fire alarm system was installed with minimal visual disruption and (so far) sonic disruption. Thanks are due to many people, especially Garrett Dangler, Tom Rice and Dr Dennis Keene. Stained glass got TLC in two areas: the narthex doors and the chapel. The third-floor kitchen in the Parish House was remodeled, and new carpeting was also added in the rear of the Nave. Plans for new office space on the Parish Hall balcony were devised by parishioner and interior designer Christopher Boshears, and this space will serve as the business manager's office.

Backing up for a moment: Ascension for many years did not present services online, and the pandemic gave us the impetus needed to move us forward! John Thompson is due an incredible thank-you for introducing and then monitoring the technology that allowed us to have interactive Zoom services, with support from Vin Knight. Because we could not celebrate the Eucharist, participation in online evening prayer on weeknights, as well as intercessory prayer became to a large extent the backbone of services, providing opportunity to ask God's grace, help and mercy, but also giving the headlines of people's ongoing concerns. Mother Liz set up a rotating schedule of preachers, and we were continually challenged by the insights and scholarship of herself and Father Ed, along with Mother Posey Krakowski and Mother Meredith Ward. Further enriching those services was the return of semi-live music. Maestro Keene brought his intrepid (masked) singers back on Sunday afternoons to record music for the following Sundays. Even those with untrained ears could immediately appreciate the difference between tracks laid down at home and mixed online, and the full-bodied voices singing together with a conductor. The racial justice study group and the crafters guild continued to meet online via Zoom, continuing the work of outreach and being together as community.

The return of in-person worship provided the occasion for moving to streaming technology that could show the full range of our services: the celebrants, preachers, choir, organist, acolytes and readers. This did not just happen. It required the expertise, patience, flexibility, and pride of at least a half-dozen people. We are particularly indebted to Andrew Jones, our Parish Administrator, for exhibiting all those qualities while piloting the program.

We are indebted to The Reopening Taskforce for providing their best thinking on how to keep us all safe by employing all of the necessary Covid protocols to prevent the spread of Covid-19.

On the financial side, problems were identified that necessitated a change of bookkeepers supplied by our temp agency. Our new bookkeeper, Sajia Choudhury, has stepped up with great good humor and the required expertise to affect the transition, with significant help from Madonna Stack-Barker and our Treasurer, Mary Gaillard. Mary has moved her permanent home to Albany, NY which makes Kelli Long's role as business manager critical for the future management of the church's finances in collaboration with Mary and the Finance Committee. Mary promises to remain with us as Treasurer, whole hopefully getting a chance to enjoy many activities in retirement. This is probably a good chance to point out Mary's importance to the financial health of the Church of the Ascension. Mary has served several terms as warden, in addition to time as finance committee chair and now, as Treasurer. It is hard for us as wardens to describe Mary's importance to us: she is basically the keeper of Ascension's financial health. She is very conscious and protective of the long-term health of our church. When it comes time for spending proposals, Mary's presence is like having a gigantic hammock under you. One feels safe in the knowledge that she's not going to let you do something, shall we say, profligate.

We have been blessed with two low interest loans from the federal government's Payroll Protection Program (PPP) that have replaced lost rental income and allowed us to afford to continue to pay our dedicated staff. A special financial gift from the Manton Foundation intended for Covid relief was also received and has paid for the technology innovations and upgrades that have made our online presence possible.

In welcome news, to both the parish and the school, La Petite École (LPE) renewed its lease with Ascension for a further five years, up till 2026. Not only is there a confluence of mission between the two organizations but the rental income the school provides offers an essential and sustainable revenue stream to help repay the loan the church has.

These are some highlights from this year. Please read the other reports for a full picture of them.

We would be remiss at this point the very significant challenges that face us. Our old buildings require constant, expensive care and maintenance. (In recent months the lack of heat in the Rectory as a result of unexpected gas line and boiler issues was an unexpected, time consuming challenge and expense.)

Our pledges are down, mostly due to the deaths of stalwart givers. Our leaders, clergy and lay, must find creative ways to serve both an online and in-person congregation. And Mother Liz and Father Ed will not be with us for a significant part of 2022, due to deferred vacations and sabbaticals. We must work to rebuild our service groups, particularly our flower and hospitality guilds.

Further, we need to develop a strong vision that re-imagines our outreach priorities and programs for service of our members and the community, and this needs to be done in collaboration with Ascension Outreach's ministries.

While those challenges are daunting, the blessings of our beautiful landmark structures, our strong history of volunteer participation and service are sources of strength and inspiration. The revitalization that has come through technology, that opens up our services to people wherever they are in the world, and the opportunity for our hard-pressed pastors to find rest and renewal in the days ahead are matters that require our collective prayers and our time, talent and treasure as we seek to build God's kingdom in this place. We give thanks for the dedication of Rusty Moore, Janet Fisher and Barbara Burns who are retiring from Vestry. A word of thanks is due also to our ever-faithful Chancellor, Charlie Schmidt, for his many hours of legal advice freely and generously given.

Isabel would also like to add that the parish owes a debt of gratitude to Maurice Seaton whose generous leadership and service has brought light to our footsteps over the past six years of his tenure as warden. May God continue to bless our beloved Ascension community. Amen

Archives Report

Historical records of the Church of the Ascension are housed in the Diocesan Archives at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. They are preserved and stored in a climate-controlled environment in acid-free archival files and boxes. Ascension retains ownership of the materials.

Buildings and Grounds Committee

The most significant event for the Buildings and Grounds Committee in 2021 was the retirement of our sexton, Lenford Bowman, after decades of work in the Episcopal Church. His knowledge of church protocols and his insistence on the pristine upkeep of our buildings will be sorely missed.

After a wide search, Ascension hired a new resident sexton, Dwight Roberts. Dwight, who did some work here when we prepared the Parish Hall for services during our church renovation, has strong skills developed as an independent contractor. He put those skills to use immediately, renovating the fourth-floor sexton apartment for himself and his family. His transition was complicated by the resignation of our first assistant sexton, Ravi Gayadin, for reasons of health. William Gordon, who joined the sexton staff full-time in February, was a great help as Dwight learned the nooks and crannies of our properties. In late fall, Dwight hired Luis Ortiz as a second assistant. Luis comes with experience at St. John's in the Village.

With the arrival of our new business manager, Kelli Long, the sexton's responsibilities have shifted slightly. Kelli is taking on some of the tracking of inspections and violations, along with helping create a more robust list of service providers. Dwight will be taking on some projects for which we might previously have hired outside contractors.

As is unfortunately the norm for 150-year-old buildings, emergencies struck as we hoped to focus on exciting new projects. This year, the primary problem was the rectory hot water heater, followed quickly by trouble with the gas lines to rectory boiler and stove. After fruitless attempts to restart the heater, a new one was purchased. ConEd repaired the gas line from the street to the building, and our contractor ran new lines to the boiler and stove. The endlessly complicated process is being sorted out with the invaluable assistance of Chancellor Charlie Schmidt, and we are awaiting some fixes around the boiler and then the process of obtaining city and ConEd approvals to restart. Mother Liz has suffered through 1) lack of hot water and 2) lack of heat in the coldest months. The heat problems also affect our tenant and partner, La Petite Ecole. The lack of heat in the building is thought to have been a contributing factor when a number of pipes in the walls and ceiling of the large classroom burst. Those repairs are ongoing.

On the plus side of the ledger, our fire alarm system was at last installed and (so far) has not caused disruptions. This long-anticipated project took on new life at the time of the Notre Dame fire and was continually stymied by red tape and then Covid protocols. Many thanks to Garrett Dangler for honchoing this work from start to finish.

While there are several repair and restoration ideas on our agenda, none is more important than the emergency work that must be done to safeguard the church tower. Barbara Burns has been a creative chair of our brownstone subcommittee. While we have had studies that tell us our brownstone is deteriorating, Mother Liz asked for an assessment of what work is truly urgent. After considering several proposals, Barbara urged us to hire Vertical Access, whose workers swarmed the tower and façade like spiders, supported by harnesses, tapping away to determine weak spots. The subsequent report identified two areas that pose potential safety hazards. The vestry approved hiring an architect, who is now drawing up specifications to send to potential contractors.

There have been other stops and starts during the year, other ideas tested and awaiting attention. One of the most delightful was the stained-glass repair undertaken for the narthex doors and the columbarium chapel. IF you haven't looked, focus your attention the next time you pass through the chapel on the window opposite the altar. The repaired window is gemlike...small, with its colors clear and sparkling. It's a great reminder of why it's a privilege to serve on this committee at this beautiful church.

Music Program

The Pandemic continued. And at the beginning of 2021, and all through the Spring and Summer, we continued recording anthems and hymns in the church with 10 singers on Sunday afternoons. The singers wore “singer masks” and were spread 15 feet apart, front to back, and 8 feet apart to their sides. To keep everyone together I conducted from the center aisle and had an organ accompanist. I recorded an organ prelude each week on Saturdays. The music we recorded was played on subsequent Sunday Zoom services and also for Holy Week. Jeffrey Johnson continued to prepare Introit chants of incredible inventiveness, which he would do live each week.

On September 12, after a year and a half, we returned to in-person services at the 11am service with full choir. Everyone wore masks at all times, except readers and preachers. The choir only gathered in the choir stalls when singing an anthem. Otherwise, they were more safely scattered in the Nave. These services began to be streamed live via Local Live company so that people could either choose to come in person or watch the service remotely. As I write this report in January 2022, we are still working out glitches in these streaming services.

When the surge of cases of the Omicron variant came in December, it was decided it wasn't safe to have in person attendance at services. So, the only people in the church were priests, acolytes, readers, and musicians. This started with the Christmas Eve service 2021 and remained that way until February 6, 2022. I myself tested positive right before Christmas and had to replace myself for all Christmas services! The first time in my life I missed Christmas Eve.

I am so grateful for the incredible hard work and unfailingly dedicated spirit of our wonderful choir members. God bless you!

Voices of Ascension

The calendar year 2021 started with no concerts scheduled at all. Like all musical organizations we were in a wait and see position. But some important virtual projects occurred.

In January came the virtual premiere of *Astronautica – Women in Space*, an exceptional multimedia piece of art with a libretto Hai-Ting Chinn created from interviews of women astronauts, commissioned music from 9 women composers (including our own Bora Yoon!), and recorded performances by Trio Triumphatrix. This was the first project under the new umbrella of Voices of Ascension called *Voices of the New*. It was a sensation.

But the first choral music making occurred in late May when 14 singers – all fully vaccinated – were able to make a video recording of some favorite choral pieces at the DiMenna Center which was later broadcast via streaming. Then a couple of weeks later, the group sang for a live audience outdoors at the Untermyer Gardens in Yonkers, New York. Curiously, this was at a time before Omicron when doubly vaccinated people could actually be together without masks. And that's how we and the audience were at that joyous concert.

In the Fall *Astronautica* had its live in person premiere at Symphony Space's Thalia theater. The large audience stood en masse at the end!

The Voices of Ascension made their first full return to live concerts with the Candlelight Christmas concerts in December. Everyone was masked. And, fortunately, the concerts occurred early enough in the month to avoid shutdowns due to the Omicron variant. At the end of each concert, the audiences stood and clapped, seemingly forever, clearly expressing their gratitude in hearing live music again.

Personnel Committee

Despite the continuing pandemic, the Personnel Committee continued to meet virtually and had a very productive year. In addition, we developed a Conflicts of Interest policy which was approved by the Vestry and implemented in early Fall 2021. It was signed by all key employees and committee volunteers at Ascension, who are responsible for recommending or hiring vendors; signing contracts; or the purchasing of supplies and materials using Ascension funds.

We presented and discussed the 2021 revised Employee Handbook to the Vestry. Based on issues identified during the interview process for the three new employees, we decided to revise the

employee handbook in regards to vacation, sick time and holiday policies. We expect to implement a new handbook in early 2022.

We presented to the Vestry the recommendation to identify Juneteenth as a holiday for the staff and to change the wording of Columbus Day to Columbus Day (Indigenous People Day) in the handbook. When the Columbus Day holiday name change is approved by federal, and state governments, we will switch to the new title for this holiday. This recommendation was approved by the Vestry in December 2021.
