Augustine, Bishop of Hippo and Theologian +430 (August 28)

Augustine, perhaps the greatest theologian in the history of Western Christianity, was born in 354 at Tagaste in North Africa. In his restless search for truth, he was attracted to the Manichaeans who had attempted to solve the problem of evil by positing the existence of an independent agency eternally opposed to God [in our words, the Devil]). He was constantly engaged in an inner struggle with his personal morals. Under is influence of his mother, Monnica, he was baptized on Easter eve by Ambrose, the Bishop of Milan in 386. After returning to North Africa in 391, and found himself unexpectedly chosen by the people of Hippo to be a presbyter (priest) and four years later was chosen as their bishop. He wrote his autobiography shortly before 400 in the form of an extended prayer, and is still read today and one of the classics of Western spirituality. His letters, treatises, and sermons have provided a rich source of new and fresh insights into Christian truth. In refuting the Manichaeans, Augustine affirmed that all creation was essentially good, having been created by God; and that evil is the privation of good, not an act of an evil deity. After the persecution of the Church by Diocletian in the early 4th C. Augustine wrote against the Donatists, a 4th C heresy, asserting that the Church was "holy". not because its members could be proven holy, but because holiness was the purpose of the Church. Augustine refuted the teaching of Pelagius, who said that humans could save themselves by their good works, by stressing the unconditional love and grace of God if humans would love God in return and embody that love. God saves us, not our works. Martin Luther was an Augustinian monk, greatly influenced by these teachings. Of the Eucharist, Augustine said: "When you receive the bread, the body of Christ, behold what you are; become what you receive." When Alaric the Visgoth sacked Rome in 410, Augustine wrote his greatest work, The City of God. He died on August 28, 430, as the Vandals were besieging his own earthly city of Hippo. (Holy Women, Holy Men)

Faith is given through time and the circumstances of life. The living God shapes us in our time and place. Look for the footprints of God around you wherever you are this week. Pray for peace and safety in our time from war of weather. Our world needs it.

The Approach

Reader 1: The angels of God guard us through the night, **Reader 2:** and quieten the powers of darkness.

The Spirit of God be our guide to lead us to peace and to glory.

My brothers and sisters, our help is in the name of the eternal God. who is making the heavens and the earth.

Dear God, thank you for all that is good, for our creation and for our humanity, for the stewardship you have given us of this planet earth, for the gifts of life and of one another, for your love which is unbounded and eternal. O thou, most holy and beloved, my Companion, my Guide upon the way, my bright evening star.

Reader 3: We repent the wrongs we have done:

Silence

We have wounded your love **Reader 4: O God, heal us.**

We stumble in the darkness.

Light of the world transfigure us.

We forget that we are your home. **Spirit of God, dwell in us.**

Eternal Spirit, living God, in whom we live and move and have our being, all that we are, have been, and shall be is known to you, to the very secret of our hearts and all that rises to trouble us.

Living flame burn into us, cleansing wind, blow through us, fountain of water, well up within us, that we may love and praise in deed and in truth.

The Invocation

Reader 1: Like the first disciples before the coming of God's power at Pentecost, We wait in faith, and pray.

Silence

Be with us, Holy Spirit;

Reader 2: nothing can separate us from your love.

Be with us as of old, fill us with your power,

direct all our thoughts to your goodness.

Be present, Holy Spirit;

Bring faith and healing and peace.

for your will is health and wholeness:
