

Compline: A Night Service for Healing St. John's by the Campus Episcopal Church

June 2, 2021 – The First Book of Common Prayer

The first book of Common Prayer came into use on the Day of Pentecost, June 9, 1549. From this book descended all subsequent editions and revisions of the Book in the Churches of the Anglican Communion. Prepared by a Commission, its format, substance and style was primarily the work of Thomas Cramner, Archbishop of Canterbury, 1533-1556. Principle sources: medieval Latin service books of the Sarum Rite, enrichments from the Greek liturgies, ancient Gallican Rites, vernacular German forms prepared by Luther, and a revised Latin liturgy of the reforming Archbishop Hermann of Cologne. The Psalter and biblical passages were from the English "Great Bible" authorized by King Henry VIII in 1539. The Litany was taken from the Great English form issued as early as 1544. The originality of the Prayer Book lay in its simplification of the complicated liturgical usages of the medieval Church, so that it was suitable for use by the laity as well as by the clergy. It is a book that is a manual for common worship as well as a primary source for personal spirituality. It is truly a book that all the people can claim as their own. It is not just a book of the clergy. It is a book that comes alive in the world in our prayer and in our lives. *(from Holy Women, Holy Men: Celebrating the Saints)*

Our weekly Compline has enriched our prayer together and strengthened our faith. It reminds us that we pray always and everywhere, not just on Sunday. Give thanks for this prayer and for each other.

The Approach

Peter said to them, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him." And he testified with many other argument and exhorted them, saying, "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation." So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers.

Reader 11:

Jesus said to the Samaritan woman at the well of Jacob: "Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father seeks such as these to worship him. God is Spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth."

Reader 5: Grant, O God, that your holy and life-giving Spirit may so move every human heart and especially the hearts of the people of this land, that barriers which divide us may crumble, suspicions disappear, and hatreds cease; that our divisions being healed we may live in justice and peace.

Lord, in your Mercy:

Reader 6: **Hear our prayer.**

Reader 5: O God, you have bound us together in a common life. Help us, in the midst of our struggles for justice and truth, to confront one another without hatred or bitterness, and to work together with mutual forbearance and respect.

Reader 5: **Hear our prayer.**

Reader 6: Almighty and most merciful God, we remember before you all poor and neglected persons whom it would be easy for us to forget: the homeless and the destitute, the old and the sick, and all who have none to care for them. Help us to heal those who are broken in body or spirit, and to turn their sorrow into joy.

Lord, in your Mercy:

Reader 6: **Hear our prayer.**

Reader 7: Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work, or watch, or weep this night, and give your angels charge over those who sleep. Tend the sick, Lord Christ; give rest to the weary, bless the dying, soothe the suffering, pity the afflicted, shield the joyous; and all for your love's sake.

Lord, in your Mercy:

Reader 8: Hear our prayer.

Reader 4:

O God of unchangeable power and eternal light: Look favorably on your whole Church, that wonderful and sacred mystery; by the effectual working of your providence, carry out in tranquility the plan of salvation; let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to their perfection by him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Reader 1: God of the present moment,

God who in Jesus stills the storm and soothes the frantic heart;

Bring hope and courage to us as we wait in uncertainty.

Bring hope that you will make us the equal of whatever lies ahead.

Bring courage to endure what cannot be avoided,

for your will is health and wholeness;

You are God, and we need You. Amen. (p. 747, NZ Book of Common Prayer)

Reader 12: Lord, it is night.

The night is for stillness.

Let us be still in the presence of God.

It is night after a long day.

What has been done has been done;

what has not been done has not been done;

let it be.

The night is dark.

Let our fears of the darkness of the world and of our own lives rest in you.

The night is quiet.

Let the quietness of your peace enfold us,

all dear to us,

and all who have no peace.

The night heralds the dawn.

Let us look expectantly to a new day,

new joys,

new possibilities.

In your name we pray. Amen.

Reader 3: God be in my mouth, and in my speaking;

Reader 4: God be in my heart, and in my thinking.

Reader 5: God be at my end, and at my departing.

To God the Redeemer,
 who loves us and by dying and rising pioneered the way of freedom.
To God the Sanctifier,
 who spreads the divine love in our hearts,
