Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Amelia Bloomer, Sojourner Truth, and Harriet Ross Tubman
(Liberators and Prophets, +1902, +1894, +1883, +1913)

Elizabeth Cady Stanton (1815-1902) dedicated her life to righting the wrongs perpetrated upon women by the Church and society. She and 4 other women organized the first Women's Rights Convention at Seneca Falls, New York, July 19-20, 1848 – an event that set her political and religious agenda for the next 50 years. In 1881, the Revised Version of the Bible was published by a committee that included no women scholars. She founded her own committee to write a commentary on Scripture, and applying Greek she had learned from her minister, focused on passages used to oppress and discriminate against women. She attended Trinity Episcopal Church in Seneca Falls with her friend Amelia Bloomer, and preached hundreds of homilies and political speeches in pulpits throughout the nation. She was experienced as a holy presence and a liberator – and never lost her sense of humor. In a note to her friend Susan B. Anthony, she said: "Do not feel depressed, my dear friend, what is good in us is immortal, and if the sore trials we have endured are sifting out pride and selfishness, we shall not have suffered in vain."

Amelia Jenks Bloomer (1818-1894) as a young woman joined in the temperance, anti-slavery and women's rights movements. She never intended to make dress reform a major platform in women's struggle for justice. But women in her day wore waist-cinching corsets, even when pregnant, resulting in severe health problems. She published in her newspaper (*The Lily*) a picture of herself in loose-fitting Turkish trousers, and began wearing them publicly. Clergy, from their pulpits, attacked women who wore them. Her popularity soared as she engaged clergy in public debate. [Thus was born the first "bloomers".] Of women's right to freedom she said, "the same power that brought the slave out of bondage will, in His own good time and way, bring about the emancipation of woman, and make her the equal in power and dominion that she was in the beginning." Later in life, in Council Bluffs, IA, she worked to establish churches, libraries, and school houses. She provided hospitality for traveling clergy of all denominations, and for temperance lecturers and reformers. Trinity Church at Seneca Falls, NY, where she was baptized records her as a "faithful Christian missionary all her life."

Sojourner Truth, "Miriam of the Later Exodus" (1797-8 to 1883): Her name was Isabella, a child born to slaves owned by a wealthy Dutchman in New York. She was a slave for the first 28 years of her life, sold many times. She fled slavery with the help of Quaker friends, and joined Mother Zion African Methodist Episcopal Church at the time the African-Americans were denied the right to worship with white members of St. George's Church in Philadelphia. Going by the name of Belle she became a street-corner evangelist in poverty-stricken areas of New York City. She focused her work on a homeless shelter for women. When she was 46, she went to Long Island and Connecticut. When she stopped along the way to ask for a drink of water, she was asked her name. "My name is Sojourner". When asked her last name, she thought of all her masters' names she had carried through life. Then the thought came: "The only master I have now is God, and His name is Truth." She became a traveling preacher, asking to speak at white religious meetings. She never learned to read or write, but quoted the Bible extensively from memory in her sermons. She became part of the abolitionist and women's rights speakers' network. She gave a speech entitled "Ain't I a Woman" that is often referenced today refuting the preaching of the time that said that God created women to be weak and blacks to be a subservient race.

Harriet Ross Tubman, "Moses of her People" (1820-1913) was born to slaves on a plantation in Maryland. The births of slaves were recorded under property, not as persons with names. Slave families lived in fear of their children being sold off at any time. Harriet suffered beatings and a severe injury, but grew up strong and defiant, refusing to appear happy and smiling to her owners. She turned to religion to cope with the brutality and oppression. Her favorite Bible story was about Moses who led the slaves to freedom – slaves prayed for a Moses of their own. When she was about 24, she escaped to Canada, but could not forget those she left behind. She worked with the Quakers, and made at least

19 trips back to Maryland between 1851 and 1861, freeing over 300 people by leading them into Canada. There was a \$40,000 reward for her capture. Guided by God through omens, dreams, warning, she claimed her struggle against slavery had been commanded by God. She foresaw the Civil War in a vision. When it began, she joined the Union Army, serving as a cook and nurse, caring for both Confederate and Union soldiers. She served as a spy and scout. She led 300 black troops on a raid which freed over 750 slaves, making her the first American woman to lead troops into military action. In 1858 she moved to upstate New York and opened her home to African-American orphans and helpless old people. She was illiterate, but founded a school for African-American children. She joined the fight for women's rights, and worked with Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony, but also supported African-American women in their efforts to found their own organizations to address equality, work, and education.

These four women stand in history as examples of the power of so many who believe in justice and the dignity of every human person. Where do you see them alive in today's world? Let us give thanks for all who work in their own way to bring the vision of justice for all, and for the peacemakers who look to make God's dream for this world more of a reality. Reader 7: Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work, or watch, or weep this night, and give your angels charge over those who sleep. Tend the sick, Lord Christ; give rest to the weary, bless the dying, soothe the suffering, pity the afflicted, shield the joyous; and all for your love's sake.

God of grace and mercy:

Reader 8: Hear our prayer.

Reader 8: We give thanks for birthdays this week in our parish of Norman Rudi (7/22), Dan Nutini (7/22), Craig Forney (7/25), Derek Olsen (7/26), Miles Nutini (7/28). We pray for the candidates for the next Bishop of the Diocese of Iowa: Jennifer+, Betsey+ and Elizabeth+. Guide and protect each one of them in the coming days. Give us all discerning minds and hearts, and may your Spirit guide all those who will cast electing ballots. We give thanks for the 18 years of Spirit-led service by Bishop Alan and Donna. And we ask for your blessing on our Rector Amma Kim, assisting priest Mary Jane+, our postulant for the diaconate, Greta; and our ministry intern, Chad.

God of grace and mercy:

Reader 9: Hear our prayer.

Amen.

Reader 11: God of the present moment,

God who in Jesus stills the storm and soothes the frantic heart;

Bring hope and courage to us as we wait in uncertainty.

Bring hope that you will make us the equal of whatever lies ahead.

Bring courage to endure what cannot be avoided,

for your will is health and wholeness;

You are God, and we need You. Amen. (p. 747, *NZ Book of Common Prayer*)
