Participant Expectations

- **As a participant you are representing the Cornell Cooperative Extension Program of your County.**
- **You are expected to participate fully in all parts of the program.**
- **The program planned will be a full schedule. It will be necessary to be on time and to stay with the groups during tours.**
- **Be sure to report in with your chaperone on a regular basis. Report any problems, accident or illness to your chaperone. Respect and adhere to directions of all chaperones, even if it is not the one you came with. All chaperones are responsible for all of the participants.**
- **Boys and girls are not permitted in each others' hotel rooms.**
- **Alcohol, illegal drugs, and smoking of any kind is not permitted.**
- **Music and television played in hotel rooms should be kept at a level so as not to disturb other hotel guests. Talking and activities in the hall should also be at levels not disturbing to other hotel guests.**
- **Everyone is expected to adhere to the scheduled curfew.**
- **Any damage to hotel property will be the responsibility of the individual.**
- **No participants will leave the hotel or any part of the event on campus without a chaperone assigned by their county. All participants should follow reasonable directions or requests made by any chaperone for the event.**
- **Use of common sense, courtesy and respect is expected of all participants.**
- **Get the most out of the experience by participating fully and asking questions throughout the program.**

Chaperone Expectations

- **Chaperones are expected to participate fully in the program.**
- **Chaperones are ultimately responsible for participants assigned to them by their county. However, it is appropriate to offer guidance and discipline to any participants in the program in the absence of their chaperone.**
- **Chaperones should make sure their participants are in their room and quiet before retiring for the evening. Chaperones should also observe announced curfew. Chaperones are responsible for seeing that their participants are up and ready on time in the morning.**
- **Chaperones should report any problems to any member of the event committee.**

Packing List & Information for Participants

You should bring the following:

- If you have not already given an emergency medical treatment form to your chaperone, please be sure to complete it and bring it with you.
- If you have a camera or smartphone, bring it with you...it will be useful for the activities we have planned. Please don't forget to bring any cables to transfer pictures to a computer and your instruction manual as well.
- Comfortable closed toe footwear that you don't mind getting soiled as some portions of the trip are outdoors and will possibly be muddy, weather pending. Boots or cold weather footwear are recommended.
- Clothing appropriate for mid October weather.
- Casual pants, shirts and tops.
- Sweater, hooded sweatshirt, sweatshirt and/or jacket – Evening activities will be outdoors.
- Sleepwear
- Toiletries (Toothbrush, Toothpaste, Deodorant, etc...)
- Raincoat and/or umbrella
- Hand sanitizer
- Extra spending money (if you would like to purchase something from the college bookstore or carriage house)

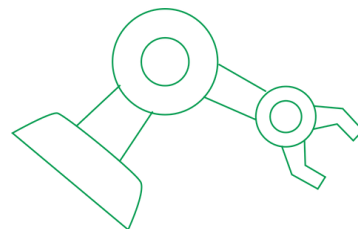
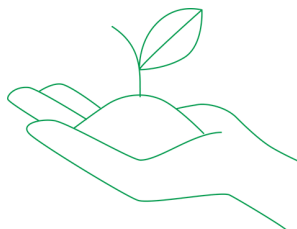

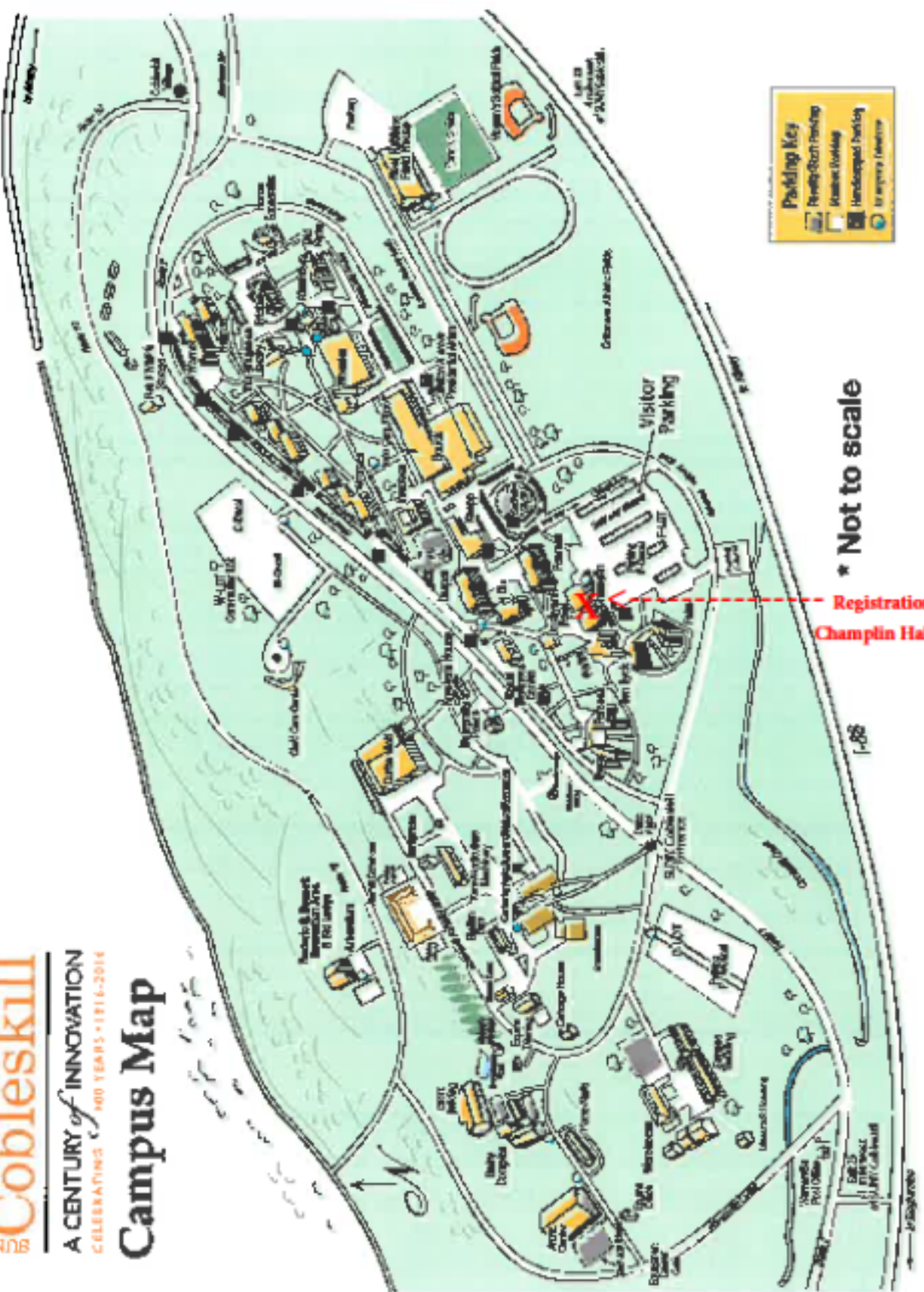

Speaking With the Vet

Learn about the experiences of a veterinarian. What do they enjoy and what attracted them to their career? Interested in becoming veterinarian? Then this tract is for you.



Hessian Hill Farm

A highly diversified 4 -generation family operation that produces sheep, hogs, cattle, chickens, horses and hay on its 350 acres. The Goblet family most recently opened a farm store located right on the farm. The farm store carries all Hessian Hill Products as well as showcasing and selling locally produced items. Hessian Hill Farm Canine Center offers dog training with private lessons and workshops. Hessian Hill Canine Country and Care offers boarding and grooming services. The Goblet Family takes great pride in opening their doors to educate the public. Farmhouse Floral Design, run by Jess Beretz got its start at Hessian Hill Farm and now operates off site as a full service wedding and event florist. Growing their own flowers during the growing season and working with other growers around the world for flowers year round.

Milk Quality Lab- SUNY Cobleskill

The Quality Milk Production Services (QMPS) serves dairy producers in New York State and across the nation from four laboratories located in Canton, Cobleskill, Geneseo and Ithaca. QMPS has developed over the years from being primarily a diagnostic program to one with a comprehensive education focus designed to offer assistance to dairy producers for mastitis monitoring, prevention and surveillance.

Schoharie Valley Farms

Once the largest carrot growing farm east of the Mississippi, Schoharie Valley Farms is now owned and managed by the Ball Family. See how diversification has helped make this farm a popular stop for local shoppers of fresh produce as well as major tourist attraction. How much does the farm store add to the operation and how did the farm survive during the rain of this past summer?

Stone House Farm

The Everett family has been farming at Stone House Farm since 1964. Tim and Patti Everett took over the farm in 1986, and have been farming there ever since. While maple syrup production has been in the family for several generations, Tim and Patti have slowly expanded their maple syrup production each year since they have been here. They started selling maple products on the farm in 1994. Currently they operate a 5,000 tap maple syrup operation with a wood-fired evaporator and serve pancake breakfasts in season.

Kelley's Farm & Garden

Take a look at the retail side of agri-business with the Kelley Family. The store has been in business for over 70 years. In 2000 it became known as Kelley's Farm & Garden where they supply animal feeds, equipment, plants, lumber and more! This tour will show participants the ins and outs of supplying these goods to their community. Youth will also receive information about how they have grown their business and what it takes to work or own a business in this field.



Fairbanks Stable

Fairbanks Stable is a Boarding and Training Stable founded in 2005. Head trainer and owner, Faye Benedict Smith, is a 4H alum from the Dutchess County, NY program, and trains horses & riders in the hunter jumper industry, as well as breeding horses for various careers. On top of training and breeding, the facility also offers full-service boarding to horse owners (including SUNY Cobleskill college students), caring for over 60 horses. Lesson students can also participate on an IEA team, and in competitions, hunter paces & foxhunts.

Dairy Processing Center

Cobleskill Dairy Processing Center: An operational Dairy Processing Plant on Campus, utilizing campus produced milk. A tour of our plant focusing on equipment usage. Samples of products made on campus. Discussion of various job opportunities and options for local farmers to develop value added products in the DPC through the Institute for rural vitality. Summary of the class topics we address in the course run in the DPC.



West Meadow Farm & Dairy

West Meadow Farm is so much more than just a farm. When owners Tom & Patricia Vaughan decided to throw their lot into upstate NY, their vision was much broader than simply milking their Jersey cattle. It was also much bigger than just making cheese from that milk. For Tom, West Meadow Farm is a way of life. It is serving plants, animals and soils with the respect they deserve. It is educating a community that has drifted nutritionally from the beaten path our ancestors forged for us. But ultimately, it is respecting Nature and the bounty she has given us.

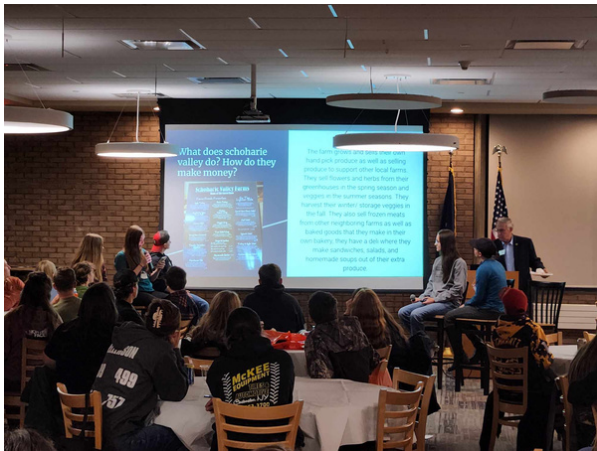
