

NEW YEAR with NEW OPPORTUNITIES



1. \$100 1891 TN, Fr. 378, **RARER THAN THE WATERMELON-Open Back \$100**. Nearly 3 times scarcer than its iconic 1890 Watermelon predecessor. Only 13pcs known; 5 of which are locked in institutions. Professional restoration is confined to the margin and enhances the overall aesthetics of this rarity which is 1 of only 8 available to collectors. The highest grade known of the few Fr. 378s is a VF 35 which last sold just shy of \$300k nearly a decade ago. The most recent sale was a VF 25 with noticeable restorations that brought roughly \$170k in 2023. High-res images of both sides available online. PMG Fine 12 \$99,500. 2. \$20 1886 Silver Cert, Fr. 313. **Daniel Manning Diamond Back**. A rare note with only 19 serials listed in the census. Three of those pieces can be found at the FRB of Chicago, the Smithsonian, and the ANA Museum. That leaves only a paltry 16 for collectors to fight over. This exact Manning last appeared for auction in 2018 when it realized \$13,200. It is certainly a clean example with the appearance of a slightly higher grade. These traits, along with its rarity, led it to be picked for the plate note on page 106 of the Chambliss-Hessler reference. There are minor repairs, but they were skillfully executed. A great note that is destined for another great collection at an opportunity less than its previous owner paid. PCGS Very Fine 25, det. \$12,450



3. \$100 1864 **Compound Interest Treasury Note**, Fr. 193b. Only six in private hands—this is the 3rd finest with no others in this grade. The finest known is an EF40 that brought \$180k in a SBG sale in 2018. This note screams VF all day with superb margins, cherry red seal and serials, and most importantly, the bronze overprint remains gold and has neither oxidized to green nor eroded through to the back. PMG notes “minor restoration,” but that was accomplished discreetly and is difficult to find without scrutiny. A key opportunity to acquire this great rarity. 4. \$5/\$10 1934-D FRN, Fr. 1960-J, **Double Denomination**. A trophy of the highest caliber, this note features the five dollar denomination on the face with the back showcasing a well-centered ten dollar denomination. PMG Ch Unc 64EPPQ \$37,500

5. \$10/\$5 1928-A FRN, **Double Denomination**. As these remain the undisputed King of Errors, this variety is the King of Kings. A mere twelve notes were released and later sold as part of the Grinnell collection during the 1940s. Of the original twelve, three remain untraceable. Each of the other three varieties of small size double denoms much larger populations. Adding to the allure, this is from the first issue of small size notes; early enough that a numeral appears in the district seal. A note absent from even the most advanced collections of errors, small size bills, or assemblages of the Richmond district. Generously margined for an issue where most carry a razor-thin right or left margin. This boasts all the hallmarks of a Very Choice New 64, leaving us to wonder about the ultra conservative grade. 6. \$20/\$10 1974 FRN **Double Denomination**. Featuring a face impression of a \$20 and the back of a \$10; this fabled error type has long been the cornerstone of some of the greatest error collections ever assembled. Tracing its lineage back to a shipment delivered to the Houston-area in 1978, a number were able to escape into circulation before an intervention at the hands of the FRB of Dallas saw the majority of that shipment confiscated and destroyed. The few that are available are unable to fulfill the often demand from collectors who have the means to pursue such an item. Undoubtedly destined for an elite collection. PCGS EF 45. \$38.5k

CANCELED PLATE NOTE —rarer than the double denom—



Having spent the last half-century as a researcher, author, and industry expert of US Paper Money Errors, it means something when Dr. Frederick J. Bart says, "This is unlike anything I've seen before." This oversized note was printed from canceled plates with four large green "Xs" on the back and four large black "Xs" on the face. The note is devoid of the overprint. Although mere conjecture and speculation, the most educated assertion one can arrive at, barring additional input and/or correction from the BEP, is that another portion of the plate cylinder was severely damaged causing the press operator to cancel all plates with four "Xs" on each side prior printing the sheet and presumed subsequent destruction of the entire plate cylinder rendering it unusable for additional printings.

While Double Denominations are undoubtedly revered as the "King of Errors" the census on the \$5/ \$10 1934-D FRNs totals around 3 dozen and carries a strong five-figure price tag with many bringing around or above \$50k. 36 pieces reported for more than \$50k or just a few pieces known for less than \$10k?

Seems like an easy decision, but the choice is yours.

7. \$5 1988 FRN **Canceled Plate Note**. Shown above. PMG Ch Unc 63EPO. \$6995

8. \$5 1988 FRN **Canceled Plate Note**. Same incredible story as above, but offered considerably cheaper clocking in just one point lower with a comment of trimmed on the back as the bottom margin received a less than ideal cut with blades hitting a sliver of the design along the left before offering an attractive and even ending to the bottom margin. One point lower; a lot cheaper. PMG Unc 62. \$5995

9. \$1 2021 **Star Pack**. 100 consecutive stars in original BEP Strap. Gem. \$345

10. \$2 1963 **Legal Tender Pack**. Fully-original pack of 100 consecutive red seal deuces from the final series of small size legal tenders. This pack has been preserved in pristine condition and received a deserving grade one point shy of Gem with unquestionable originality and the coveted Premium Paper Quality designation. PCGS Ch Unc 64PPQ. \$2995

11. \$2 2017-A **Star Pack**. 100 consecutive stars in original BEP Strap. Gem. \$625

12. \$5 1950-C **Original Pack - ONLY ONE KNOWN!** As early \$5 packs were seldom saved, few remain available from the early years of small size and small head notes. We buy and sell hundreds of packs each year, and in our 50 years of business, we've never had one of these. After reviewing the census data; there are no others known making this pack unique! Census shows exactly 3 notes graded in the Gem+ realm; three PMG 67EPQs...the last which sold for \$216 in a Stacks Bowers sale. Not surprisingly, stars bring even more. The pack in this lot has one star note according to the PCGS label which lists serial number range: L02804301-400C. Delivered for less than \$60 per note. PCGS Gem Unc 66PPQ. \$5995

17. **Ascending Ladder - M 23456789 F** - \$20 2013 FRN. Hugely margined and pack fresh Atlanta \$20 features an appealing "up ladder" serial number. PMG Superb Gem 67 EPQ. \$2495

18. **Serial Number One—BK 00000001 B**. \$10 1999 FRN. Big Head Design is very scarce for SNs; this note presents several points above its assigned grade. PCGS EF 40. \$5250

19. **Solid 1 - B 11111111 M**. \$1 1999 FRN. Teetering on the cusp of Gem with full-originality and eye-popping embossing visible through the encapsulation. PCGS Ch Unc 64PPQ. \$2250

20. **Solid 1 - MB 11111111 F**. \$20 2013 FRN. Spectacular serial on scarce colored twenty. PMG AU 53EPQ. \$2995

21. **Solid 1 - MK 11111111 B**. \$50 2013 FRN. Scarce colorized fifty that has strong eye-appeal for the grade. PMG EF 45. \$3795

22. **Solid 2 - MJ 22222222 A**. \$50 2013 FRN. Colorized fifty with attractive even margins that looks AU+. PCGS Ch VF 35. \$3795



23. **Solid 8 - ML 88888888 H**. \$5 2013 FRN. Colorized and problem-free with spectacular eye-appeal. PCGS Ch VF 35. \$3495
