## Rabbi's Message

### *A Time for Turning*

***To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven.***

*"Now is the time for turning. The leaves are beginning to turn from green to red and orange. The birds are beginning to turn and are heading once more toward the South. The animals are beginning to turn to storing their food for the winter. For leaves, birds and animals turning comes instinctively. But for us turning does not come so easily. It takes an act of will for us to make a turn. It means breaking with old habits. It means admitting that we have been wrong, and this is never easy. It means losing face; it means starting all over again; and this is always painful. It means saying: I am sorry. It means recognizing that we have the ability to change. These things are terribly hard to do. But unless we turn, we will be trapped forever in yesterday's ways. God, help us to return – from callousness to sensitivity, from hostility to love, from pettiness to purpose, from envy to contentment, from carelessness to discipline, from fear to faith. Turn us around and bring us back toward You. Revive our lives, as at the beginning. And turn us toward each other – for in isolation there is no life."*

The prayer above is one of my favorite High Holy Day readings. It is found in Gates of Repentance, the red *machzor* (High Holy Day prayer book) we used until 4 years ago, and it is also found in our new Mishkan series as well.

This prayer reminds me of the importance of the deep introspection that is required of us, really throughout the entire year, but with a special emphasis during the High Holy Days. It teaches us about the nature of *teshuva*, the act of turning and redirecting our negative thoughts and actions toward good.

I would like to add a beautiful Chasidic teaching to this prayer; the lesson comes from Rabbi Art Green.

It doesn't serve us well to spend an inordinate amount of time and energy on the pain and discomfort of the past year's transgressions. We acknowledge those behaviors and atone for them. This type of rigorous self-examination is hard; it's complicated and challenging. But directing our time and energy toward our negative acts is only part of the act of *teshuva*.

The turning and returning has a positive aspect as well. It can help us to change our lives in rich and meaningful ways, and that is something to celebrate and feel joyful about. When we turn away from our negative patterns and redirect our energy toward making our lives better, true joy and happiness can be found. Our commitment in the New Year is not only to turn from negative thoughts and actions, but to change our behavior and do what is good in this world – good for others, good for humanity, good for our own souls. The Chasidic Master reminds us to do true *teshuva* eagerly and with JOY. How blessed we are when we choose to take advantage of this opportunity as we enter a new year.

## High Holy Day Etiquette

The High Holy Days are approaching, and within a very short period of time we will have hundreds of people in our building - our own members and guests. So, a few reminders ...

- ◊ On the first day of Rosh HaShanah and on Yom Kippur we have a 9:00 am Family Service and also a 10:45 am Main Service. Each of these two services usually draws 275 people or so. The first service ends at 10:15, so there is a very short amount of time for 275 people to leave the building and 275 more people to arrive. Please remember to be considerate of others in the parking lot, carpool as much as possible, and those who live close enough - please walk or park in the adjoining neighborhoods.
- ◊ **Something new this year - rather than being given out as you enter, prayer books will be placed on each seat - please leave them on your seat at the end of the service. However, do not leave the handouts – either take them with you or return them to the greeters on your way out.**
- ◊ Because there will be so many people present, if it is important to you to sit in a particular place, please get here early enough to select your seat.
- ◊ With so many people all together, please be considerate and leave your fragrances at home (as much as possible).
- ◊ Please be an ambassador of Temple Habonim and welcome all people you see - whether you recognize them or not - as we become one family in worship for the day. We are all informal members of the Membership Committee.
- ◊ Just like last year, we will have security guards at our High Holy Day services for our safety and peace of mind. Do not be alarmed; they are here for a good purpose.

5. Our morning T'filah (worship services) will toggle between a traditional morning service, visual T'filah, Torah service, and Havdalah. The idea is to expose our students to as many worship experiences as possible to enhance their own connection to prayer.
6. Our congregation will be exploring spirituality and worship as we seek to create an outdoor sacred space for us to enjoy the great outdoors. We hope to encourage curiosity, sense of wonder, and creation during this process and look forward to sharing more with you in the coming months.






The Jewish Alliance of Greater Rhode Island will once again participate in **The March of the Living** this coming year in April, 2019. Thanks to the generosity of several donors, they will offer a significant amount of scholarship money to participating teens.

The March of the Living is a two week program where participants from around the world come together to visit Poland and Israel, learning about the Holocaust and the journey survivors undertook to safe haven. During the first week in Poland teens will tour different areas of Krakow, the Warsaw and Lodz ghettos, and concentration camps as well as spend time with survivors. On Yom Hashoah, the international day of Holocaust remembrance, teens will walk The March of the Living itself, a 3-kilometer walk from Auschwitz to Birkenau, as a tribute to all victims of the Holocaust. Teens will then travel to Israel, visiting many historical sites, and celebrate Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Israel Independence Day).

This past year one of our THB teens, Elliott Entin, participated in the March of the Living. He made a presentation about his trip to the congregation, and it was truly inspiring.

**MAZON: A Jewish Response to Hunger** (MAZON) is an American non-profit working to end hunger among people of all faiths and backgrounds in the United States and Israel.

You might have seen him on local TV news talking about the legal complexities of refugee, asylum and immigration law.



Four hundred HIAS Welcome Campaign congregations in the US will observe Refugee Shabbat, each in its own way. At Temple Habonim, we will have special prayerful reflections about welcoming the stranger as part of our regular Friday night service. We will also hear Mr. Taveras explain US law pertaining to those who seek asylum protection.

## **Selichot** **Nosching, Schmoozing, Praying** **& Hope for the Jewish People** **Saturday, September 1, 2018 – 7:00pm**

The word *selichot* means forgiveness.

On the Saturday night before the High Holy Days we begin to prepare our souls for the serious introspection required of us on Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur.

We do this in community; we come together with people we already know and new people we will soon meet and get to know better.

We *schmooze*, we *nosch*, we pray, and this year we will be inspired by watching a new film entitled "Raise the Roof."

Inspired by images of the magnificent wooden synagogues of 18th century Poland, the last of which were destroyed by the Nazis, artists Rick & Laura Brown of Handhouse Studio set out to reconstruct a replica of the stunning, mural-covered Gwozdziec synagogue.

Working with a team of 300 artisans and students from around the world, using only period hand tools and techniques, the Browns finally realized their dream.

In 2014, the reconstruction of the Gwozdziec synagogue roof was unveiled as the centerpiece of the new POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews in Warsaw. This film tells the story of this remarkable 10-year project against the backdrop of the 1,000-year history of Jews in Poland.

"Raise the Roof" is a film about so much that matters: history, The Holocaust, collective memory, freedom of religion, sacred places, scholarly research, education, community, architecture, art, and craft ... the possibility of resurrection and redemption, and, of triumph over tragedy.

"Raise the Roof" is interesting, informative, uplifting and hopeful.

Once again, we are very grateful to the students of Lunch & Learn, who will provide snacks and refreshments as we connect with friends old and new before our service and evening program.
