



At Suburban Hospital, we are continuously monitoring and assessing the effects of this pandemic on our community and local resources. It is very important that our neighbors and community are well informed to make healthy and safe decisions for themselves and families. Below we will share resources for COVID-19 Testing & Screening, Suburban Hospital Health and Wellness Resources, and Ways to Help:

COVID-19 Testing & Screening

- **Testing is currently limited and not everyone needs a test. Your medical provider will advise you on what you should do if you are concerned.** If you think you are ill and need medical care, you should first contact your medical provider. Additionally, call ahead before going so the provider can take precautions when you arrive. Testing guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) change frequently. You may want to visit [their site](#) for updates on their guidance about who should be tested.
- If you do not have health insurance, **the Maryland Health Connection has extended the COVID-19 [Special Enrollment Period](#) to June 15 for uninsured Marylanders who need health coverage.** Visit [MarylandHealthConnection.gov](#) or download the “Enroll MHC” mobile app. Request or select “Coronavirus Emergency Special Enrollment Period.” Free help is available by calling 1-855-642-8572 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays. Deaf and hard of hearing use Relay. Help is available in more than 200 languages. The deadline has also been extended to July 15 for uninsured tax filers to take advantage of the [Easy Enrollment Program](#) by checking the box by on their state tax returns to find out their eligibility for free or low-cost health insurance.
- **When should I come to the hospital?**
 - **You should only come in to the hospital if you are experiencing severe breathing difficulties or potentially life-threatening symptoms.** Ask yourself the following questions: Prior to being aware of COVID-19, would my symptoms have prompted me to seek medical attention? If “No...”, then please stay home and call your primary care physician. If “Yes...”, or if you are instructed by your care provider, please go to your nearest Urgent Care, Emergency Provider, or dial 911.
 - All 6 Montgomery County hospitals have expanded their triage capabilities; If you are sick with flu-like symptoms and go to an emergency room, you may be screened for COVID-19 and testing will be performed only if risk factors have been met.
 - **If your symptoms are mild, please stay home if you feel sick.** To help reduce the spread of COVID-19, it is best to practice social distancing
