

From The Rabbi

What We Can Learn from a Sheet of Matzah

It's Matzah Time! Whether you prefer Manischewitz, Yehuda or Osem, the time has come to stock up on our favorite humble unleavened bread. While much of our efforts during the week of Passover go into figuring out how to transform matzah into more tempting culinary creations, we have an opportunity to learn from, perhaps even be inspired by, matzah in its plain form.

The commandments to eat matzah and to refrain from eating leavened bread appear in multiple places in the Torah. The first mentions are in Exodus 12. In preparation for the Israelites' liberation from slavery they are given the instructions for observing Pesach. These include the sacrificial lamb, eating matzah, and refraining from eating hametz for seven days. The matzah becomes the symbol for the Israelites' hasty exit from Egypt, and their lowly status prior to redemption.

Over the generations our Torah commentators have offered additional lessons to help us make meaning from the commandments to eat matzah and to refrain from eating hametz during Pesach. Here are a few that I find particularly meaningful:

Hurrying to do Mitzvot: Where the text of Exodus 12:17 urges "You must be vigilant regarding the matzot," Rashi explains that this vigilance is so that they do not come to be leavened. He quotes Rabbi Yoshiah who suggests we do not read the Hebrew as "matzot," but actually as "mitzvot"! (There is some room to play with the Hebrew because the consonants are the same). Just as we do not allow the matzah to leaven, so we do not allow a mitzvah to leaven. Rather if the opportunity comes to you, do it immediately.

Rabbi Yoshiah reminds us that we should not delay in doing what is right, especially when directly presented with the opportunity.

Acknowledging What We Can't Control: Although there is much that as Jews we are obligated to do, spending a week without eating hametz helps us to accept that we are not fully in control. HaEmek HaDavar explains the commandment in Exodus 13:3 "You shall not eat chametz" as teaching us that "Matzah does not benefit from the stratagems of human hands, to rise the dough any more than bread and water- which were created by the Blessed One." In other words we do not add to the basic ingredients of matzah, and we are compelled to be nourished by the result. We remember that there are times in life when we must live within the limits with which we are presented.

Our Responsibility Towards Others: The matzah represents the lowest point for the Israelites, and the incredible feats that God performs to free them from bondage. Rabbi Judith Hauptman teaches that matzah is the symbol of our past experience, and a reminder for today. She writes "We celebrate our own freedom by rededicating ourselves to free others who are still enslaved. This is the great moral lesson of Passover. And it is triggered by looking at the flatbread on the seder table and letting it jog our memory." Unlike the slice of toast on our plates throughout the year matzah demands moral action.

I hope these teachings enrich and inspire your Chag HaMatzot. Wishing you a Chag Kasher v'Sameach!

From the President

Whenever I'm in the building I notice the many acts of kindness. There are people who hold open the doors. People who help others find prayer books or pages. Those who help pull out and push in chairs, help fold talleism, hang up coats, get coffee, offer seats next to them, read to our little ones, and those who do so much more. Being kind is contagious. It makes me happy to see this contagion spreading through the congregation.

We share pride that our building is welcoming to all with its universal design and our Kesher Committee's extraordinary efforts in outreach. Now each of us needs to be sure we are really being warm and welcoming. Let me share a story. When my family was very new to Western New York we went to a Shabbat dinner at a different shul. We approached a table and asked if we could join them and were told that the seats were saved. The same thing happened at the next table. Feeling hurt and unsure, we found an empty table and sat with our backs to the room. Soon the table filled in with a family with older children

including a little boy. They were warm and welcoming. We felt included in the community.



Fast forward more than 40 years. Our then about to leave for college teen at that dinner table had grown up and took a job with Jewish Family Services in Denver. She was given a booklet to read and was told that the information therein was her guidebook to doing her job. It contained the recent population study of their community. Finishing the booklet, she noticed the name of the author and wrote to him to ask if he was the same person as that little boy at a Shabbat dinner in Niagara Falls a long time ago. Yes, that little boy grew up to became an expert on Jewish populations. They have now reconnected, each in a new role but each remembering that long ago meeting. As the International President of Women's League, Julia Loeb says "the stranger is the friend you haven't met yet." Please help us make those strangers who come to our events feel welcome.

I've often been amused that our calendar has us buying baking supplies to make hamantaschen and other goodies to share with family and friends for Purim, just to turn around a few short weeks later to clean all chametz from our homes to prepare for Pesach. We juggle our Jewish calendar with the secular one, hoping that school breaks will coincide with our holidays, hoping the weather is good for us to travel or for guests to arrive. We live in divided worlds; our Jewish world and our secular one. Whichever foot you are standing on in our two worlds Larry joins me is wishing you a sweet and special Pesach.

Dear Friends:

During the next few weeks our attention turns in particular to two important mitzvot: providing for the poor, and getting rid of all hametz. As for hametz, I suggest these three standard methods:

- 1. Use up as much as possible, especially *hametz she-b'ayin*, "things that look like hametz," e.g. pasta, bread, cakes, cereal. All *hametz she-b'ayin* must be gone from your house before Pesach.
- 2. Give away whatever you can not (or will not) consume. Unopened packages may be contributed to the TBT Food Barrel before Thursday, April 18th; opened packages may be given to non-Jewish friends and neighbors.
- 3. If you own hametz products that "do not look like" hametz and you can not afford to give them away (whiskey, for example), you may fill out the form below, and I will serve as your Transfer Agent to execute a contract to:
 - 1. Sell (transfer legal title of) said foods to a non-Jew (as of Monday morning, April 22, 2024) and
 - Rent cabinet storage space in your home to the same non-Jew, so s/he does not have to physically move it off your premises before Pesach.
 - If the non-Jew wants to back out of the deal after Pesach, I will arrange for title to revert to you after the holiday.

This is also the season for collecting and distributing Ma'ot Hittim, money to help the poor buy Passover food and supplies. Members of our community are counting on your generosity.
