



From the Rabbi

"Upon the righteous and upon the pious, upon the elders of Your people the house of Israel and upon the remnant of their scholars, upon the righteous converts

and upon us - may Your compassion be aroused, O Lord our God..."

-From the Blessing for the Righteous in the Amidah for weekdays

Recently, I was asked to serve on a Beit Din for conversion in nearby Toronto. Sitting there with my rabbinic colleagues, it was my responsibility to examine the sincerity of individuals who came before the court desiring to join the ranks of the Jewish people.

And as I heard the candidates there relate the stories of their personal spiritual journey, I couldn't help but be moved by their excitement and by the new discoveries, novelty, they were constantly finding in Judaism. I couldn't help but think of the first "righteous convert" to Judaism singled out in the Torah according to our sages – Yitro, Moshe Rabbeinu's father-in-law.

In the next few weeks as we relive in the weekly Torah portion our Exodus from Egypt and Revelation at Sinai, we will once again read this year the Torah portion named for Yitro the outsider who came to join Israel under the protective wings of the Divine Presence. His Torah portion opens with the words "Yitro priest of Midian Moshe's father-in-law heard all that God had done for Moshe and Israel His nation." There is no one opinion among our sages on exactly what he heard. Some among them say that Yitro had heard about the war with Amalek mentioned at the end of the preceeding Torah portion. Others contend that he heard about the splitting of the Red Sea. There is even one opinion that Yitro had heard about the giving of the Torah even though it isn't given until the next following chapter in

Parashat Yitro (a classic instance of the phenomenon "There is no early or late in the Torah," that at times the Torah will change the chronological sequence of events in its narration in order to emphasize or teach a specific point).

However, the sages are all in agreement that "as a result of what he heard Yitro converted to Judaism (Zevachim 116a)." As a result of what he heard, Yitro cast his lot with the Jewish people's destiny. Moreover one can infer from this Talmudic passage that even if the events in our Torah passage are out of time sequence, all concur that Yitro was never present at Sinai. Yitro was so close to that decisive moment in our people's history - the giving of the Torah at Mt. Sinai, the 10 commandments- and he missed it. Chapter 18 of Exodus opens with Yitro arriving in the desert at the place where Moshe "encamped - the mountain of God," and concludes with Yitro departing from there, going his own way. He was in the shadow of Sinai but he didn't remain for the following chapter where in chapter 19 the Jewish people experience God's divine presence accompanied by lightning and thunder at Sinai. He just missed it, but was almost there at one of the greatest moments in human history. What a great loss on his part. But on second thought, perhaps it wasn't such a great loss.

Yitro is a paradigm of piety for the ages. He comes to Torah and Mitzvot out of choice, of his own free will, and is truly worthy of praise and of the Torah portion named after him. Never viewing any of the wonders and miracles that the children of Israel saw, he was nevertheless convinced of the rightness of the path he chose for himself. The sage of ancient Israel Rabbi Shimon Ben Lakish most likely had Yitro in mind when he taught: "The proselyte who enters the ranks of Israel is more precious in God's sight than the entire children of Israel who stood before the Holy One at Sinai; For if they had not seen the lighting and the thunder, the mountains trembling or the shofar trumpeting at Sinaithey would never have been willing to accept the Torah.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

December 20th marked the end of my year of saying Kaddish for my father. While Kaddish is supposed to be eleven months, a leap month last year pushed it close to twelve. I am not by any means the most observant Jew. However, saying Kaddish for my father was something I knew I had to do and wanted to do. As a child, I saw my dad attend minyan every morning and evening to say Kaddish for his father. Even on our winter vacation in Miami Beach, he got up every morning to go to a local shul. It was important to him, and it therefore became important to me as well. As he battled cancer in his mid 70s, he once remarked that he wouldn't have anyone say Kaddish for him. At the time, with the demands of a young family, I couldn't assure him I would. Thankfully, he lived another fifteen years. He lived long enough for me to be an empty nester and no longer responsible for getting kids ready for school. As a bonus, we had just moved into our new building on North Forest Road, less than a half mile from where I work. Getting to minyan every morning was no longer a challenge.

Originally, I thought I was saying Kaddish for him. It didn't take long to figure out that I was really saying it for myself. Nowhere in the prayer is death or dying mentioned. The prayer is a proclamation of the greatness of God. By reciting it, we are showing that even though our faith is

being tested by the death of a loved one, we still affirm our faith in God. For me, it helped me focus on that even with a loss, we are obligated to live life and enjoy what God has given us. When I first started, there were congregants that were almost finished with their year of Kaddish. As the year progressed, other congregants lost parents and joined us at minyan. It was comforting having others standing for this prayer and knowing they were going through the same thing I was. Even though there was no sitting in a circle and sharing our feelings, it was a support group nonetheless.

Over the past year I have said the Mourner's Kaddish easily over a thousand times. Every time I closed my eyes and relived a memory of my dad in my head. Some were funny (actually, most were, as he was quite a funny guy), and some were sad. Doing this for almost a year helped me transition from a world where I had a dad, to a world where he is gone.

For anyone going through a loss, I would encourage you to give saying Kaddish a try. If not every day, then once a week or once a month. To everyone else not in mourning – being in attendance for minyan gives those in need the ability to say Kaddish. Our daily minyan is a great way to experience community on a smaller, more personal level. Please consider participating in this vital part of the fabric of TBT.

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

However, the proselyte who has never even seen one of these wonders, willingly joins himself to the Holy One, accepting the kingdom of Heaven. There can be no one more dear to God than this!" (Midrash Tanchuma, Lech Lecha 6)

And Rabbi Shimon Ben Lakish was also not the only one among our sages who was enthused by Yitro's deeds. In Yitro's Torah portion it is further written: "Yitro rejoiced over all the good that God had shown Israel when He delivered them from the Egyptians. Yitro said: 'Blessed be God (Baruch Hashem) who delivered you from the Egyptians' (Exodus18:9-10)." Yitro the priest of Midian was happy for the Jewish people, in no way begrudging when he said "Baruch Hashem." And from those two words Rabbi Shimon Ben Lakish's colleague, Rabbi Yochanan concluded that one is duty bound to say a blessing over a miracle when in a place that God did miraculous deeds for His people Israel (Berachot 54a). We learn that we must say a blessing over miracles from the example of a man who never experienced that miracle and who wasn't even Jewish at the time! What's more, there were among the sages who in reaction to Yitro's proclaiming of

"Baruch Hashem" vehemently criticized the Jewish people for their own lax. It was taught in Sanhedrin 94a in the name of Rabbi Papayis: "It is a disgrace to both Moshe and the entire 60 myriads of the camp of Israel who never spoke of God using the word 'baruch' until Yitro appeared on the scene and said 'Baruch Hashem'!"

Unfortunately, in our day these words of rebuke to the Jewish people then are still quite relevant today. But rather than be a disgrace to those who never uttered 'baruch', today it is a disgrace that there are those among us who while constantly having the words 'Baruch Hashem' on their lips, without hesitation badger and cast aspersions on those who would follow in the footsteps of Yitro the priest of Midian, who truly wish to join us in God's sheltering presence. They have forgotten whose example we follow when we bless God for the many miracles He has given our people. And they have forgotten what God told us will be at the end of days in the messianic era, that "likewise from them [the nations of the world] I will take individuals to be priests and levites declares God (Isaiah 66:21). Priests like Yitro the priest of Midian, who teach us how and why we should say 'Baruch Hashem' every day.
