



Kulanu Religious School Code of Conduct

The most important component of our discipline policy is parental support. Please help us create the best learning environment for our children.

1. Class rules will be explained and posted in every classroom, explaining our expectations that everyone be treated with *derech eretz* and *kavod* (common courtesy and respect).
 - *Therefore behaviors such as leaving the building without permission, not attending class while in the building, physically harming another student, or damaging school property, are completely unacceptable and subject to consequences developed at the discretion of the teacher and Rabbi Roth.*
2. Teachers will develop a reward and consequence system for their classes.
3. If students violate the class rules, they may be sent to the office, and a phone call will be made to the parents.
4. If a student's behavior continues to be problematic, parents, teachers and Rabbi Roth will determine the best course of action to help the child to succeed in school.

Kulanu Religious School Dress Code

As a *makom kadosh* (holy place) devoted to the values of Torah, Temple Israel Religious School seeks to promote an atmosphere of *kavod* (respect) throughout our building. Jewish tradition emphasizes the importance of *tz'niut*, or modesty, in one's comportment and dress. In keeping with these values, Kulanu Religious School has adopted the following dress code.

During Religious School, a student's dress and appearance shall:

1. Not include items that are vulgar, obscene, or libelous, or that denigrate others on account of race, color, religion, creed, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or disability.
2. Not promote or endorse the use of alcohol, tobacco or illegal drugs and/or encourage other illegal or violent activities.
3. Be appropriate for a religious setting, including the following:
 - a. No undergarments showing.
 - b. No midriff showing.
 - c. No strapless or excessively low-cut tops, spaghetti straps, or sleeveless undershirts.
 - d. Boys must wear *kippot* at all times, and girls are encouraged to wear them.
