Upper Valley Baroque's "Journey through Italian Baroque Music"

In the 17th century, Italian musicians and composers made a monumental contribution to European music -- they invented Baroque music. The greatest of these innovators was Claudio Monteverdi (1567–1643). Monteverdi invented the opera in the early 1600's with L'Orfeo (1607). His most famous religious work is the Vespro della Beata Virgine of 1610, a revolutionary masterpiece of grand dimensions, demanding vocal and instrumental virtuosity, combining traditional forms and progressive elements. Monteverdi displays and advances all contemporary styles and uses every available structural technique, resulting in a "splendid conglomeration of diverse structure, styles, and techniques." His creativity, influence, and fame were ubiquitous; during his life he was known as "il divino Claudio" ("the divine Claudio"). His Vespers and operas are the foundation for the Italian Baroque innovations that followed, innovations that underpin all subsequent development of Western music.

The Vespers consist of thirteen glorious and diverse sections – an introduction, musical settings of five Psalms, four concerto motets based on scripture, a vocal sonata, a setting of a well-known hymn "Ave maris stella/Dei Mater alma" (Hail, star of the sea, blessed Mother of God), and ending with a glorious setting of the "Magnificat". The Vespers was composed as Monteverdi's audition piece for the job as maestro di capella at St. Marc's Basilica in Venice. He pulled out all the stops to win the job, and as a result, the world received the great gift of his Vespers. Incidentally, he was granted the position in 1613, which he held until his death in 1643.

The Upper Valley Baroque Orchestra will be playing on strange-looking and beautiful-sounding period instruments: sackbuts, cornettos, theorbos, continuo organ, and baroque string instruments. The vocal diversity of the Choir will be on display – solos, duets, trios, choruses with up to ten vocal parts, multiple choirs, echoes from afar.
