SONOMA COUNTY REDUCING RISK. PROMOTING FOREST HEALTH.

The North Bay Forest Improvement Program (NBFIP) provides critical funding to treat wildfire hazards on private properties throughout the region, with a focus on serving disadvantaged communities. The program supports planning and implementation and provides financial incentives to landowners to reduce risks of wildfire and promote forest health.

Resource Conservation Districts (RCDs) in Mendocino, Napa and Sonoma Counties have partnered with Conservation Works and the Clear Lake Environmental Research Center (CLERC) to form the NBFIP to help private non-industrial small-parcel forestland owners (between 5 and 5,000 acres) implement noncommercial forest improvement activities such as thinning, planting, pruning, and fuel hazard reduction.
