

## Joyce M. Cameron to retire after 14 years with Providence

If there has been a project at a Providence Health Care ministry done in the last decade, chances are Joyce M. Cameron had something to do with it. As chief philanthropy officer, Joyce led a team in raising more than \$50 million for Providence Health Care Foundation.

Joyce will retire in April after 14 years with Providence. Colleen Fox, a former philanthropy officer with the foundation, moved into the Chief Philanthropy role in January.

"I'm ending my career at the highest peak I could have ever dreamed of," Joyce said. "I've been very fortunate to work here. I love Providence."

Joyce has been fundraising in the Spokane community for more than three decades. She's worked with the YWCA, Northwest Museum of Arts and Culture and American Red Cross to name a few. She was called to Providence in 2006 and enthusiastically accepted. The list of projects she has completed during her service here is extensive – from fundraising for the mobile mammography coach to various improvements to departments. She helped establish the Andrew Rypien Hospital Based School Program, has granted more than \$2 million in patient assistance and helped implement the No One Dies Alone program. She said her biggest accomplishment though has been streamlining six different foundations into one.

"I think the thing I'm most proud of was in 2012 when we came together and formed Providence Health Care Foundation," Joyce said. "That was monumental for all of us at Providence and this area because from that point we've raised more money each year. We just have amazing donors who are really committed to Providence and really committed to giving money to our organization."
