"I know that helped sustain us. It really did."

Her work writing for White Horse Tales, the regular periodical penned by residents, has helped Bonnie get to know an even broader number of residents. She's impressed by the talented team putting this publication together, and values the chance to interview people and learn their stories. Her reaction afterward is often, "I can't believe those people did all that," Bonnie observes. "There's some really amazing people with amazing backgrounds."
