In response to the murder of George Floyd, The Society of the Sacred Heart and the United Nations released statements condemning racism and calling for accountability and justice. Excerpts from their statements follow below:

“The Society of the Sacred Heart in the United States and Canada strongly condemns the gross violation of human dignity that we, along with millions of others, witnessed in the video of George Floyd’s last minutes [...] We pledge to raise our voice in opposition to acts of racial discrimination and to fight tirelessly against the sin of racism.”

That means addressing inequality and discrimination, strengthening support for the most vulnerable and providing opportunities for everyone.”

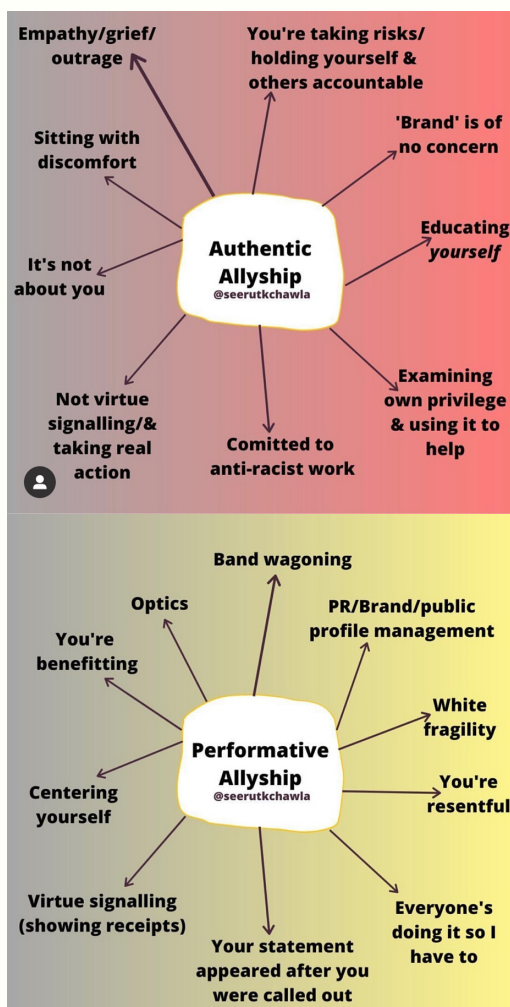
