Verdis L. Robinson is a civic consultant, public historian, and an aspirant for the UU ministry. He is currently an Associate for the Kettering Foundation as a specialist in the democratic mission of community colleges. He was a tenured assistant professor of history and African American studies at Monroe Community College (MCC). Verdis was the founder of the Rochester Neighborhood Oral History Project that created a walking tour of the community most impacted by the 1964 Race Riots.

Verdis holds a B.M. in Voice Performance from Boston University, a B.S. cum laude and M.A. in History from SUNY College at Brockport, and an M.A. in African American Studies from SUNY University at Buffalo. He is currently the Lenora Montgomery Scholar at Meadville Lombard Theological School in Chicago.
