Happening This Week

Now Showing in the Williams Gallery: Laura Wilder is a Roycroft Renaissance Artisan who's certified as a Master Artisan based on the high quality of her design and hand-craftsmanship. She creates a separate hand-carving and hand-printing for each color in her block prints. The serigraphs are made by hand-painting a separate stencil on a fine screen for each color, and forcing the ink through the open parts of the stencil and onto the paper with a squeegee. Both methods are a laborious adventure, and Laura has written several posts about the process on her website, www.laurawilder.com. Laura's work has won many awards and prestigious commissions and is on exhibit at more than a dozen shows per year, in many galleries and shops nationwide. Thematically, her art explores what her distant cousin, Laura Ingalls Wilder, called "the sweet, simple things of life," especially the beautiful light effects in nature. Laura is especially happy to be exhibiting at our church, which has been her spiritual home since 1964. The opening reception for Laura Wilder's art show is this **Friday, October 27, 6:00-8:00pm**. The show ends December 4.

Another Green Tip from Your Environmental Climate Task Force

It's been really warm lately, but cold air will get here eventually. This is a great time to check the air pressure in your tires. Cooler temperatures will lower tire pressure as air density increases, and that lowers fuel efficiency. So check your tires and make sure they're properly inflated. Remember to Reuse, Repurpose and Recycle.
