

New Life at Easter



On Easter morning, about a dozen red tulips bloomed at my front door. We aren't sure what the previous owner of our house planted in the many little patches of garden, so this was a nice surprise. Easter always comes with surprise. Flowers decorate the church. Candy shows up in Easter baskets, after many weeks in the grocery store. Part of our surprise at Easter is that it doesn't fall neatly in our plans. Most of us have to look up when Easter falls each year. This is because it is tied to date of Passover. The formula we use to determine Easter is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox. There is even an obscure section in our Prayer Book that will help you figure this out. It makes great reading when the sermon is a little boring. (This is a pro tip from a lifelong acolyte.)

In our modern world, there are few of us who are tied to the cycles of the earth. Few of us pay attention to the movement of the stars or the moon. We do not depend upon the slow changes of the earth for our livelihood. Our days are plotted by the work week. Perhaps we follow an academic schedule, or quarterly reports, the due dates of the tax schedule. These cycles are all about producing outcomes at predictable times. We are measured and evaluated by cycles of buying and selling. We are valued by whatever profit we furnish.

Our true lives are more organic. We don't just produce, we belong. We are valuable because of who we are not because of what we can make or do. We are remembered and defined through our relationships with others, and we in turn define our friends and family in the same way. Easter is a celebration of the new life God is creating. We are invited to look beyond the world we think we know and appreciate the miraculous world God is creating all around us. There is far more to the universe than we can understand. Sometimes our best response is to simply be in awe.

We can also hold the lives of others with reverence and joy. We can appreciate the many people who have journeyed with us, and we can hold wonder for people who are strangers to us. God is working in their lives as well. The world is full of people who are living and loving and trying to make sense of all the complexities of life. What we think we make and accumulate is of less importance than how we dwell with others. We can marvel at our neighbors even if we do not always understand them. God has chosen to love us despite ourselves. Perhaps the best way to understand this is not through what we deserve, but by wondering how God makes life out of earth and water and sunlight. In just this sort of mysterious way God changes us as well.

In our April meeting, along with our regular business, the Vestry took time to share gleanings from the various ECCT Spring Training sessions we attended, ranging from marketing strategies to ideas for supporting our LGBTQ population to tips for listening to opposing viewpoints, and so much more. We hope to get more parishioners involved in these informative and engaging sessions next spring, so keep your ear out for that opportunity in 2026!

We also discussed plans for a church clean up day, which could include various spaces inside (classrooms, library, undercroft) and out. Stay tuned for more on this!

Separate from the work of the Vestry, we have new committees and groups popping up this spring - it's exciting to see so much activity! Some folks are meeting for fun and fellowship, enjoying lunch and games with each other mid-week. Others are fitting in meetings after coffee hour to help us find our next Director of Christian Education and Formation.

After the 9:30 Palm Sunday service, a group met to discuss what “stewardship” means at St. Paul’s and how we might expand (and maybe rebrand) that word. Ideas ranged from promoting one time offertory donations with our new QR code to helping parishioners learn more about planned giving. Many of our current efforts and events - things like the thrift shop and the Harvest Fair - are anchors of our fundraising, and we thought about how we can expand on the great things we are already doing. Lastly, we discussed the importance of pledging, which, as Greg reminded us, is less about helping the church plan for the next year’s budget and more about helping each one of us give with prayerful intention. We hope you had a meaningful Lent and Holy Week and continue to find joy and wonder in the miracle of the Easter season.




