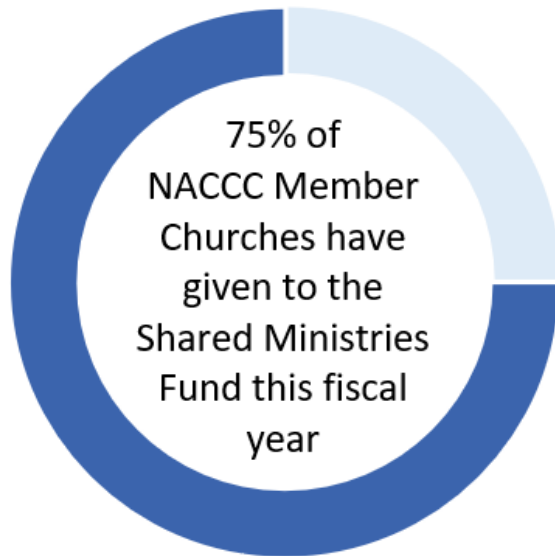

*The Racial Justice Task Team of the NACCC, in partnership with the Center for Congregational Leadership, is sponsoring a three-part webinar series that will explore the topic of racial justice in America and its implications for our Christian faith walk.*

“Racial Justice: Chronicles, Conversations, and our Christian Faith” will be held on consecutive Sunday evenings at 7 p.m. ET / 6 p.m. CT beginning March 14<sup>th</sup> and is free to attend.

- **March 14: “Chronicles”**

Brothers and sisters from within the NACCC discuss their experiences being marginalized and worse, solely because of the color of their skin.

Speakers: Rev. Lezlie Austin-Kennedy, Rev. Victor Hardy, Rev. Dr. Patrick Hunt, and Rev. Dr. Lottie Jones-Hood

- **March 21: “Conversations”**

Linda Logan, Chief Inclusion Officer at Olivet College, and Matthew Teutsch, Director of the Lillian E. Smith Center at Piedmont College, will lead a discussion on how to hold conversations about racial issues within congregations that are predominantly Caucasian and not often directly affected by such issues. The Olivet College Gospel Choir will also perform.

- **March 28: “Our Christian Faith”**

This Town-Hall-style webinar will feature members of the Racial Justice Task Team in a free-flowing discussion focusing on how racial justice issues connect with the Christian Gospel and the exercising of Christian faith in 21<sup>st</sup> century America.

### Domestic Violence: Signs and Responses

April 14, 2021

1 PM Eastern / 12 PM Central

Victims of domestic violence are more likely to disclose abuse to someone in their faith community than they are to seek help from law enforcement. As a faith leader, you can offer unconditional acceptance and spark hope where others cannot.

Did you know that two-thirds of pastors believe that domestic violence occurs in the lives of their congregants? 85% of faith leaders said they have counseled more than 6 victims of domestic abuse. 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 men have experienced domestic violence. In a congregation of 60, you could have more than a dozen women and nearly half a dozen men who are victims ... and their abusers are likely praying right next to them. 81% of pastors say they would take action to reduce domestic violence if they had more training.

Attendees will:

- learn to recognize the signs of domestic violence
- discover how to help someone in your church who is experiencing domestic violence
- consider the crisis of faith many victims face
- understand the reasons why couples counseling is not safe when there is domestic violence
- review resources and the types of services for victims in most communities.

**Jen Shtab** is the Trainer for Hillsborough County's Coordinated Community Response to Domestic Violence. Jen coordinates and presents trainings to key stakeholders working to identify and fill gaps in our existing system. She brings more than 15 years of experience in the non-profit sector and has educated 100's of audiences in the fields of domestic violence, human trafficking and sexual assault. In addition to training, Ms. Shtab has also assisted survivors through her involvement on Emergency Room Response Teams, Court Accompaniment, Hotline Advocacy and wellness programs. Jen holds a BA in Communications from Rowan University and a Master's in Leadership & Social Change from Maryland Institute of Integrative Health. She is also a Certified Health Coach through The Institute for Integrative Nutrition.

# Church Fair Share Giving

## Why Contribute?

- As an organization, our vitality is directly tied to the support our member churches provide. The NACCC exists to serve our churches and relies on financial contributions to carry out our various programs and services.
- While every congregation is unique, we strive to be valuable and relevant to all our member churches, regardless of size and needs of the church.
- Whether you see value in being a part of a national organization, utilize our networking opportunities, take advantage of our leadership resources, or rely on us to find a pastor, we ask you to contribute your Fair Share to ensure we are able to help all of our congregations for years to come.

## What is Fair Share?

- The NACCC requires each of our member churches to make an annual contribution to our Shared Ministries Fund, which directly supports our programs and services.
- FAIR SHARE refers to our suggested contribution. We do not require a membership fee, but we do expect that each church support the organization through a gift. Currently, the Fair Share we ask our churches to contribute is \$13 a member.
- Consider joining other member churches who give their "Fair Share Plus," which is a contribution of \$15 or more a member. This level of giving has a significant impact on the ability of the NACCC to help churches.

## How does the NACCC support our churches?

- Pastoral Searches
  - Aiding member churches and clergy in pastoral searches through a pastoral search process
- Financial Opportunities
  - Granting funds to churches facing challenges through the Hurting Churches Fund
  - Providing professional management for church endowments through the Congregational Investment Trust (CIT)
  - Loaning funds to member churches through the Building & Loan Fund
  - Subsidizing the cost of attendance at the Annual Meeting & Conference through the Providence Fund
  - Funding fine arts programs at member churches through the Richard Fund
- Fellowship
  - Hosting the Annual Meeting & Conference

- Facilitating regional retreats
- Ministers' Convocation
- Preparing tomorrow's leaders through National Association of Pilgrim Fellowship (NAPF) and Heritage of Pilgrim Endeavor (HOPE) programs
- Education
  - Training lay ministers through our Lay Ministry Training Program
  - Providing seminary education and financial support through the Congregational Foundation for Theological Studies (CFTS)
  - Hosting Congregational History and Polity Seminars online and in person
  - Printing, editing and distributing the *Congregationalist Magazine*
- Vetting and Supporting Missions
  - Vet and support 27 national and international missions
  - Provide financial support to 5 national and 11 international missions
  - 100% of all donations to specific missions goes directly to the mission.
- Providing Advisors for:
  - Church growth and vitality
  - Assessing your organizational structure and practices
  - Managing conflict
  - Evaluating clergy and other church staff, lay leaders, and volunteers
  - Creating a culture of stewardship in your church
  - Strategic planning

## Happy Life Children's Home, Kenya

- ◆ We need God's protection for our mission and especially the schools. We have opened schools after 9 and 1/2 months and are trying to cope with the new normal.
- ◆ For the children's health and well-being.

# John Richard Memorial Endowment

The John Richard Memorial Endowment was established by his family as a loving and living memorial. His love for music and theater performance was a large part of his talented but short life.

## About:

- The Endowment awards annual grants to National Association of Congregational Christian Churches (NACCC) Active Member Churches of 200 members or less that are planning a fine or performing arts event in their church.
- Grants will be awarded up to \$500 per church.
- All funds awarded for an event must be used by April 1, 2022.

## Requirements:

1. The event program or bulletin must include mention of the John Richard Memorial Endowment of the Congregational Foundation and the NACCC. A copy of this program or bulletin must be submitted with the final grant report.
2. The church must have 200 members or less.
3. Grant recipients must complete and submit a brief questionnaire as a final grant report within 30 days of the event for which the funds were received
