End of an Era in Torrey Grove

Civic Club Embraced Call to Track History of our New City

The 1980s were the era of independence for Solana Beach. After an almost three-year and sometimes rancorous campaign, a third vote to pass Proposition N for "Cityhood" passed, bringing Solana Beach independence from the County of San Diego, which seemed endlessly willing to permit development. An ongoing scheme to build a hotel on what is now Harbaugh Seaside Trails was one of many development plans that were catalysts for Citizens Intending to Incorporate, the group advocating independence.

At 7 a.m. on July 1, 1986 members of Solana Beach's first City Council and our first Mayor, Margaret Schlesinger, were sworn in. They swiftly voted to boot the County out of City affairs and approved a 45-day moratorium on new building permits. At the time, more than two dozen building permits were pending.

Recognizing the import of the era, Mayor Schlesinger also expressed her interest in forming a historical society for the new City.

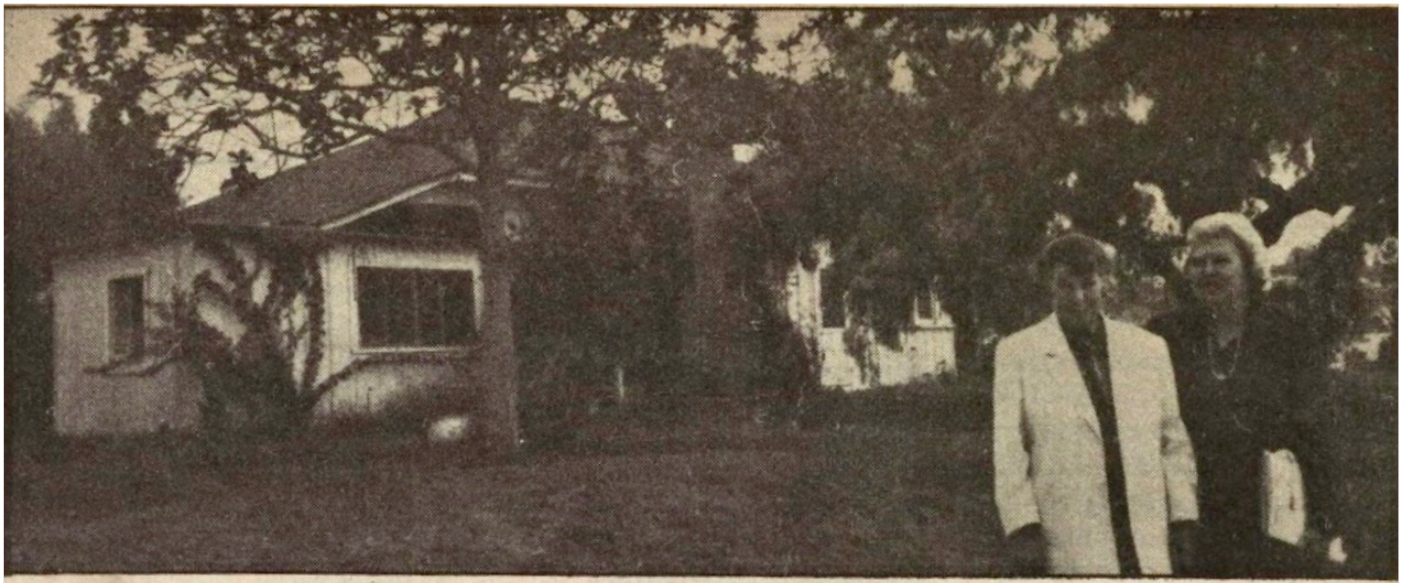
The Solana Beach Women's Civic Club had vanquished unsightly billboards, created the Plaza "centerpiece" for the new City, sponsored bicycle paths, successfully sustained landscaping along Hwy. 101, and repeatedly demonstrated their fund-raising prowess through cause-specific campaigns, annual Holiday Home Tours showcasing decor and crafts, and the Holiday Crafts Boutique. Now, they stepped up to the role of Solana Beach historians.

In the summer of 1989, the California Secretary of State approved a name change for the organization to the Solana Beach Civic & Historical Society. With the change in name and charter came a significant change in membership requirements -- for the first time, men would be invited to join. The Society's first president was Sue Evans; first male member, Eddie Lewis.

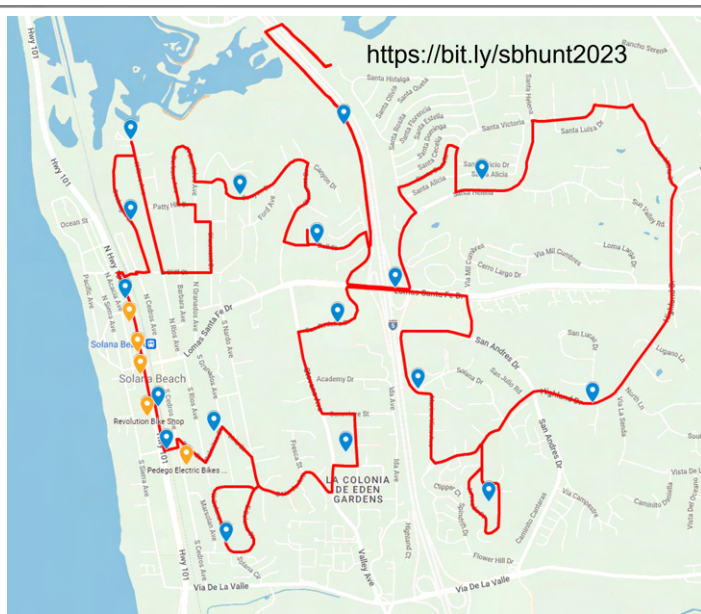


Mary Thurman, left, and Ada Scarsborough, historians for the Solana Beach Women's Civic Club, stand in front of the Stevens home built in the 1890s.

Historical Society is Born, Historical Museum in the Making . . . continued

Among new Society's first initiatives was to establish a headquarters for itself and a historical museum for the city. They already had identified the candidate -- the Stevens House, built in the 1890s on Lockwood Mesa, now Peppertree Lane. Because of a planned condo development (Del Mar Downs), the old house was slated to be moved to a temporary site near St. James Catholic Church during construction. After a lot of back and forth between the City Council and the Society -- now newly involved in local historical preservation -- agreements were reached in 1991 to move the historic home to La Colonia Park. The move cost of \$4,000 was shared by the Society and the developer of the townhomes that replaced the Stevens home. City Council allocated \$25,000 in the 1990-91 budget to pay for exterior restorations, including building a foundation and painting.

Updated "Living History" Program Welcomes Students to Heritage Museum



That new-fangled "smart TV" you see in the photo on page 1 isn't the only recent addition to our Museum -- we now have WiFi, as well!

But sack races, jump rope, hand-made ice cream and -- new this year -- hand-made tortillas might still be the favorites among the third-graders who returned to the Museum for our long-postponed Living History program.



Over two days in April, four classes of students visited our Museum to learn how early settlers to what was then called Lockwood Mesa farmed their land and kept house without running water or electricity. "It those days, each of you would have a chore to do to keep the household running," said Grandma Stevens, played by Tarey Gerardy and Rose Andrews this season. The students were fascinated by the appliances required to pump water, light stoves, and heat an iron in an era without light switches and electrical outlets.



Likewise -- in the half of the museum depicting life after running water and electricity -- the player piano, crank telephone, and manual typewriter delighted.



When pandemic restrictions closed the Museum and cancelled our annual education program, your Board brainstormed ways to continue keeping students engaged in Solana Beach history. Plan A was to expand on the long-time skit script to include more about information about the first families of La Colonia de Eden Gardens and their valuable contributions to our community. Then, videotape the play and make it accessible via our website. It's still a great plan; but, unfortunately, our Covid-era casting call was not answered.

So when Solana Vista officials said "yes" to our invitation to resume the popular field trips, Society President Michele Stribling, Museum Curator Lisa Montes and Nominations Chair JoJo Bogard put their heads together to come up with an engaging new way to tell our history -- through their own family experiences. Call it, "where do you live?"

Lisa is a fifth-generation descendent of one of the first families of La Colonia and still resides in her family home. Michele also is a native to Solana Beach; her parents bought their home in 1956 on the bluffs above the tide pools. JoJo's parents were original buyers into the Lomas Santa Fe development in 1971, where she raised her own family and still lives.

Each asked the students where *they* lived, and based on the answer, told them a little about growing up in that area of our community.

"Here in La Colonia, our families built their own houses," Lisa shared. "Down the hill from your house, that used to be the dump," Jojo told the students. "And I used to go there with my Dad," Michele added.

"What's a dump?" came one student's query.

Well, some might say it is archeology -- where history is unearthed and bright minds are inspired.

May 13 -- Free Bulky Item Pick Up by EDCO

This is your opportunity to put out trash, green waste and up to four bulky items -- such as broken appliances -- that are too large for collection bins.

Schedule a pick-up by calling (858) 350-8544. Put items at curb-side by 7 a.m. on Saturday, May 13.

Bulky yard waste will be recycled and must be bagged or bundled. Tree trimmings should be cut into 3' lengths and tied securely into bundles not greater than 18" in diameter.
