Readings for Sunday, May 3 Fourth Sunday of Easter

First Reading The promise is made to all.

Acts 2:14a, 36-41

Psalm 23

Gospel

"The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want."

Second Reading

Jesus bore our sins upon the cross.

John 10:1–10

1 Peter 2:20b-25

Jesus is the gate for the sheep.

The image of sheep dominates the readings today. The early church was just a fledgling flock when Peter's testimony inspired thousands to "repent and be baptized." Later, Peter commends the sheep for returning to the care of the shepherd after they had gone astray. In the Gospel, Jesus begins the story of the Good Shepherd. "The sheep hear his voice," he says, and follow him. Let us listen for his voice in today's readings.

AeroBreath Ventilator Developed by Parish Member's Father

engineering development to aid in the world's fight against COVID-19. He has developed a simple, low-cost ventilator with the capabilities needed to make a difference and save lives right now. Earth Day



Happy Earth Day! Back in 1969, peace activist John McConnell proposed the idea to celebrate a day each year to honor the earth. The first Earth Day was celebrated on March 21, 1970 and later moved to April 22. Today is the 50th anniversary of Earth Day.

Earth Day is celebrated throughout the world and is a great reminder to take care of this precious gift that God bestowed upon us.

Another anniversary will be celebrated on May 24th: the 5th anniversary of Pope Francis' amazing encyclical on the environment: Laudato Si. These two anniversaries have a lot in common: they are about humanity coming together to take care of each other and to also take care of our common home: Mother Earth.

Many of us had great plans for Earth Day's 50th anniversary, but those plans had to be pushed aside while we shelter in place due to Covid-19. But, alas, climate change has not paused during the pandemic. It is still real; in fact many would argue that it is perhaps a dress rehearsal for the catastrophes that will be upon us if we ignore climate change much longer.

The good news is that we can come together and make the appropriate course corrections. We are doing the impossible by almost universally sheltering in place, practicing social distancing, and good hygiene. Suddenly governments are able to find the money that was not there to deal with the Covid emergency.

So it's clear that we can address climate change. The question remains, however, whether we will take it seriously before it is too late.

Saint of the Month

The Fruit of the Holy Spirit for April is **JOY**

Joy is a God given gladness that doesn't change if good or bad things happen in my day. Joy comes from being with God and I can be joyful even in unhappy moments.

It is a lasting kind of happiness that can only be realized when we put God at the center of our lives and if we believe that we will live our eternal life with Him.

St Zita Feast Day: April 27

St. Zita was born into a poor but holy Christian family. Her older sister became a Cistercian nun and her uncle Graziano was a hermit whom the local people regarded as



a saint. Zita herself always tried to do God's will obediently whenever it was pointed out to her by her mother. At the age of twelve Zita became a housekeeper in the house of a rich weaver in Lucca, Italy, eight miles from her home at Monte Sagrati. As things turned out, she stayed with that family for the last forty-eight years of her life. She found time every day to attend Mass and to recite many prayers, as well as to carry out her household duties so perfectly that the other servants were jealous of her. Indeed, her work was part of her religion! She used to say: "a servant is not holy if she is not busy; lazy people of our position is fake holiness." At first, her employers were upset by her generous gifts of food to the poor, but in time, they were completely won over by her patience and goodness and she became a very close friend. St. Zita was given a free reign over her working schedule and busied herself with visits to the sick and those in prison. Word spread rapidly in Lucca of her good deeds and the heavenly visions that appeared to her. She was sought out by the important people, and at her death in 1278 the people acclaimed her as a saint. She is the patroness of domestic workers.
