Camp Program

FOR ANY CANCELLATIONS MADE AFTER APRIL 15TH, 2017, THE COUNCIL OFFICE MUST BE NOTIFIED TO ASSESS THE CANCELATION FEE OF \$100 A HEAD & REFUND.

ANY OVERPAYMENT OF CAMP FEES WILL BE DOCUMENTED AT CHECK-IN. A CHECK FOR THE OVERPAYMENT WILL BE MAILED FROM THE COUNCIL OFFICE. WE ARE NOT PERMITTED TO ISSUE REFUNDS FROM CAMP.

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IF CLASS MINIMUMS ARE NOT MET OR A CLASS FILLS REMARKABLY QUICKLY, THE CAMP DIRECTOR AND PROGRAM DIRECTOR RESERVE THE RIGHT TO CANCEL OR ADD A PARTICULAR SESSION TO ALLOW FOR THE MOST EFFECTIVE USE OF THE CAMP STAFF AND FACILITIES.





Campsite Reservation

At Camp Edgewood, there are several options for camping accommodations. We offer you the opportunity to camp in your own tent, sleep in an Adirondack, or try out one of our screened cabins. Cabins and Adirondacks are available on a first come first serve basis within your site (based on when your troop reservation). Please request your campsite preference when completing the Troop Registration Form, and we will do our best to accommodate you.

Scouts with Physical Disabilities have the option of using Campsite 14, which is a fully accessible Campsite for those in need. Scouts with disabilities, along with their Troop, will be given priority access to Campsite 14 when campsites are assigned.

Provisional Camping is a program designed for the Scout who can never get enough of the camp experience! Scouts who attend camp without their Troop will be adopted by another Troop and will fall into one of their patrols for the week.

Your Scouts can choose from a variety of merit badge courses and personal development activities to customize their week of fun!

Merit Badge Courses

Scouts should begin planning and preparing for their merit badge courses many weeks before coming to camp. Many merit badges are easy to earn in a few days at camp, although others take a lot of work both in and out of camp.

Scouts can typically take any merit badge, yet our experience shows that some of the classes tend to be more academic and difficult for our less mature and seasoned campers. We strongly encourage you to help your newer Scouts choose a schedule that will ensure they can succeed!

We are eager to work with your Scouts on their completion of merit badge requirements. However, we abide by the BSA policy on requirements; we will not amend a requirement. Just because a boy comes to camp and is registered in a class does not mean he will automatically complete the merit badge. A Scout's individual actions and responsibility are the predominant factor in whether or not he completes requirements.

Your Scouts may be assigned homework to do in their campsites each night. It is recommended that each Scout have a current merit badge book for any course they are taking. Supplies are available in the Council Office or Camp Trading Post.

Personal Development Courses

These classes are aimed at Older Scouts. It is our belief that Camp and the Scouting program are essential development aspects that can impact a young man's life. With that in mind and the Aims and Methods of Scouting close to our heart planning was has been done to aid Older Scout in their next steps of life and their Scouting adventure.

ONLINE CLASS SCHEDULING

Online Class Scheduling

You will register for merit badge classes and personal development programs using our online class scheduling module. It is important that you prepare in advance for your class scheduling. The online module is a “real-time” system, and you will get the most out of it by completing your unit’s entire schedule at one time. Be sure to have a program session at a troop meeting to discuss available classes, then have the Scouts decide on a schedule based on their interests and advancement needs. You will need to provide them with copies of the class schedule and program descriptions. Many classes will fill up quickly, so it is important to complete your class scheduling as early and completely as possible.

Class scheduling will begin March 15th, 2017. You will receive authorization to begin class scheduling when it is available as long as the Council Office has received the Troop Deposit and a total of 50% of all other fees due.

Instructions

Early Winter 2017: Make your reservation and pay the \$100.00 deposit. (The earlier the better as space fills quickly)

March 2017: Set aside at least one troop meeting to review Summer Camp programs and to have Scouts select their desired class schedule. Use the Schedule Worksheet to help collect your Scout’s selections.

By March 15th 2017: Have Summer Camp Deposit and 50% Troop Fees paid.

Before May 2017: Collect and make your final payment of fees (**Balance Due**) by **May 31th , 2017** to avoid late fees.

When the class registration opens up in March, you will be able to log in to your Troop’s registration and use the online class scheduling module to register Scouts in classes. Be aware that courses are first-come, first-served, and our online module is “real-time”. Class capacities are rarely expanded, so register early! Print your unit’s schedule from the online scheduling module. Review each Scout’s schedule with them and be sure to check online for open spots in classes and to make last minute scheduling changes. Our staff will also send you a copy of your Troop’s class schedules for a final review a week or so before you arrive.



Last minute changes: Class schedules can be changed online up to five days before your arrival at camp. Our staff will be available after opening campfire to help with last-minute changes as available.

IMPORTANT NOTE: After you enter your class selections, please make sure to save the reservation, log out, and log back in to make sure the classes are entered correctly.



Course Guide

The next few pages contain information on our camp programs for 2017. Our curriculum has been developed through a unique collaboration of Scoutmasters, Camp staff, and our council's camping and advancement committees. We are proud of the variety of programs we are able to offer, and with the highest quality found in Scouting!

Summer Camp is primarily about fun! Too often, younger Scouts create an aggressive class schedule focused on advancement. Please encourage your Scouts to take a variety of classes and work with your Scouts to help create appropriate schedules that mix advancement with adventure and fun. We believe that camp is about outdoor adventure and challenge; a Scout only enrolled in academic classes is missing out.

Many of our programs have age-appropriate suggestions and some have required minimum ages. We encourage you to use these guidelines when Scouts are creating their class schedules.

Important Info about Prerequisites and Items Not Covered in Class

You will find that some of our class offerings include prerequisites or requirements that will not be completed at camp. In some cases, a merit badge must already have been earned prior to Camp. We do not permit Scouts to take these classes concurrently and these prerequisites must be complete before camp starts. Other requirements will not be covered in class as they are not able to be completed at camp for a particular reason (for example: requires documentation and/or observation for longer than a week, requires task to be done at home, etc.). Scouts may:

- Bring proof of completion on these requirements to class for the instructor to review

OR

- The troop may review these items with Scouts at a later time to complete the merit badge

The following course guide is tentative and minor changes could be made as we make final plans. Any updates will be made available in time to prepare for online class scheduling in October.

Occasionally, we may offer additional courses or sections, when skilled instruction is available. If any of your leaders are able to instruct a unique merit badge course not currently listed as being offered, please let us know!

Brownsea First Year Camper

Brownsea is our first-year Scout program and has been designed to give Scouts the greatest opportunity to learn basic Boy Scouting skills. The Scouts will work on Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class requirements. This program is run through the full day and skills have been coupled with the Camping, Hiking, Backpacking, Pioneering, First Aid, Scouting Heritage, and Swimming Merit Badges to advance learning and create a program specifically designed to help transition scouts from their Webelos mentality. Through engaging activities participants who will learn to return to their units and advance Scouting utilizing the proper techniques to take charge of their own learning and event planning at the unit level.

All Valiant 11 will be registered in Brownsea but leave camp after Lunch Thursday due to the restriction of three camping nights.

Mafeking

Named after the South African village Baden-Powel helped save during the Second Boer Wars Mafeking is our answer to the second year or early cross over camper. Scouts will work on advancement requirements while also working toward the orienteering, wilderness survival, and fishing merit badges.



Adventure Trail

Named after the Rockwell Painting Adventure Trail is designed for scouts who are currently in or wish to seek a Patrol Leader, Senior Patrol Leader, Troop Guide, Instructor, Quartermaster, Camp Staff, or Junior Assistant Scoutmaster related position of responsibility. This class is one a boy may take as many class sessions as they would like as an individualized development plan will be made with each participant. Those enrolled will be given the opportunity to aid a Brownsea Patrol's Staff Guide and have leadership training from camp administrators so they can become reenergized.

Personal Development Courses

- **Venturing: Scouting “fastest growing program”**

Older scouts wanting new challenges will benefit from this session about Scouting's **COED** program for 14-20 year olds. They will learn how learning and achieving mean nothing until you've developed skills to the point you can teach them to others.

- **College Selection and Applications**

Many students feel that the future is a ways off but in this lesson they will learn they can start looking ahead today. Topics include how to approach their search, planning to finance their education, and how scouting experiences can prep them for classes in school or even lead to decisions on potential majors they want to look at.

- **Resume and Cover Letter Writing**

“You can't get a job without experience and you can't get experience without a job.” To get both you need to be able to know how to present yourself with the proper forms of information on your background and why you want to work at a company.

- **Trail to Eagle**

First Class, Star, and Life scouts will review the Eagle Scout service project; how to prepare the application, ace the board of review, and strategies to stay on track to plan for the completion of the Eagle Scout rank.

- **LNT, Hornaday, & STEM**

Scouts will benefit from this class that will work to prepare them to seek recognitions other than advancement and build badges to larger accomplishments.



Certification Courses

- **BSA Lifeguard**

Through completion of this course individuals will be certified as BSA Lifeguards and may arrange with the Aquatics Director to complete the Red Cross equivalencies.

- **BSA Aquatic Supervision– Swimming and Water Rescue**

Training for BSA Swimming & Water Rescue provides BSA leaders with information and skills to prevent, recognize, and respond to swimming emergencies during unit swimming activities. It expands the awareness instruction provided by Safe Swim Defense training. Persons completing the training should be better able to assess their preparation to supervise unit swimming events. The BSA recommends that at least one person with this training is present to assist with supervision whenever a unit swims at a location that does not provide lifeguards.

Although the training is consistent with training provided professional lifeguards, the Swimming & Water Rescue course is not a lifeguard training course and is not a substitute for BSA Lifeguard training . On the other hand, this course addresses important information that may not be covered in generic lifeguard training programs such as: preventative measures, including the buddy system and swim classification tests; how to set up a safe swim area in diverse situations; the use of non-standard rescue equipment; and emergency action plans in remote settings. Therefore, BSA leaders with lifeguard training from other agencies are encouraged to complete this course prior to supervising unit swim activities in remote settings.

- **BSA Aquatic Supervision– Paddle Craft Safety**

Safety Afloat awareness training provides guidelines for safe float trips and is required of unit leaders, but does not provide the skill training mandated by those guidelines. BSA Paddle Craft Safety expands Safety Afloat training to include the skills, as well as the knowledge, needed for a unit leader to confidently supervise canoeing or kayaking excursions on flat water. Persons completing the training should be better able to assess their preparation to supervise paddle craft activities.

Order of the Arrow

Purpose

The purpose of the Order of the Arrow is fourfold:

1. To recognize those Scout campers who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives
2. To develop and maintain camping traditions and spirit
3. To promote Scout camping
4. To crystallize the Scout habit of helpfulness into a life purpose of leadership in cheerful service to others

History

The Order of the Arrow (OA) was founded by Dr. E. Urner Goodman and Carroll A. Edson in 1915 at the Treasure Island Camp of the Philadelphia Council, Boy Scouts of America. It became an official program experiment in 1922 and was approved as part of the Scouting program in 1934. In 1948 the OA, recognized as the BSA's national brotherhood of honor campers, became an official part of the national camping program of the Boy Scouts of America. Today, the OA is recognized as Scouting's National Honor Society.

Membership

The OA has more than 181,000 members located in lodges affiliated with more than 310 BSA local councils.

Eligibility

To become a member, a youth must be a registered member of a Boy Scout troop and hold First Class rank. The youth must have experienced 15 days and nights of camping during the two years before his election. The 15 days and nights must include one, but no more than one, long-term camp consisting of six consecutive days and five nights of resident camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of the Boy Scouts of America. The balance of the camping must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps. Scouts are elected to the Order by fellow troop members, following approval by the Scoutmaster.

Ordeal

During the experience, candidates must undergo a series of challenges designed to test their courage and determination to uphold the ideals of scouting which the Order of the Arrow is based on.

Brotherhood Membership

After 10 months of service and fulfilling certain requirements, a member may take part in the Brotherhood ceremony, which places further emphasis on the ideals of Scouting and the Order. Completion of this ceremony signifies full membership in the OA.

Vigil Honor

After two years of service as a Brotherhood member, and with the approval of the national OA Committee, a Scout may be recognized with the Vigil Honor for outstanding service to Scouting and the community.

Call Out Ceremony

This year at Summer Camp, the Order of the Arrow Quelqueshoe Lodge 166 will be conducting a call-out ceremony at the closing campfire to recognize those scouts and scouters who have been elected to become members of the lodge. 

Lost and Found

Lost and found items will be turned in at the trading post. **Leaders should encourage Scouts to mark their belongings with name and troop number.** Lost and found items will be kept for one week after being collected, then donated to a local charity.

Quartermaster

Units may pick up latrine supplies and cleaning equipment as needed. Scout leaders may also pick up tools for special camp projects. The troop is responsible for the return of all items checked out in clean, working order, prior to departure from camp. The Camp Ranger and Quartermaster will be able to supply the needed supplies to you upon request.

Fishing

Fish may be caught and released back into the lake. Fishing in the lake on Camp Edgewood property does not require a fishing license.



Emergency Procedures

This outline is designed to familiarize any camp visitor or employee with the plan on emergency procedures. This will cover possible situations, protective measures, and how situations will be handled. Some situations could include:

- Missing Persons
- Fire, Tornado, Windstorms
- Epidemic or Mass Illness
- Serious Accident or Fatality
- Excessive Heat or Humidity

In the event of an emergency, use the following procedures:

- When the siren is sounded, you will hear one of the following:

- Intermittent Blasts (not continuous):

When intermittent blasts of the siren are heard, all Scouts and Adult Leaders should report immediately to the flagpole. Staff members will then serve as runners and go to each campsite that members are not accounted for. Scout leaders should take a head count and report any missing person to the staff runner. Instructions will be given at that time.

- One Continuous Blast:

When one continuous blast of the siren is heard, it indicates that dangerous weather conditions are imminent and that everyone should take cover in a ditch or appropriate tornado shelter. The central bathhouses and the interior of the dining hall are the best shelters to use during hazardous weather.

- In the event of **High Temperature** and **High Humidity**, everyone should drink plenty of fluids. Each person should drink as much as four (4) quarts of water a day. Even those in excellent physical condition should avoid strenuous exercise during these times.
- In the event of **High Humidity even at Low Temperature**, the camp health officer will remind Scouts and leaders at each meal to continue drinking water.
- In the event of **Freezing Temperature** the camp administration and health officer will make schedule and other changes as needed.
- In the event of **Lightning**, all outdoor activities will halt and all participants will move to the nearest shelter (not a tree). When the storm passes, Scouts will be advised by the area director as to their next step.
- In the event of a **Chemical Spill**, the Fire Department and Sheriff's Office will be notified.

The "all-clear" signal is the ringing of the camp bell normal camp activities will then be resumed



General Camp Rules

At Edgewood, the foremost rules for personal and group behavior are the ideals found in Scouting. Scouts and Leaders should follow the Scout Oath, Scout Law, and Outdoor Code for all behaviors.

Beyond these ideals, the following rules are enforced at the Camp Edgewood:

- Fireworks are prohibited.
- Throwing rocks is forbidden.
- **All cars must be parked in the camp parking lot unless designated by the Camp Director or Camp Ranger.**
- Alcoholic beverages and illicit substances are prohibited.
- Use of tobacco products is forbidden.
- No fixed-blade sheath knives.
- No firearms or any kind of ammunition may be kept in the possession of any Scout or adult.
- No pets or other animals should be brought to camp (registered service animals permitted).
- No aerosol cans in campsites.
- All white gas lanterns, propane lanterns, stoves, etc. are to be filled and stored only by adults. Fuel must be secured and locked away.
- Closed-toed shoes must be worn at all times. Sandals may only be worn at the waterfront and at the showers.
- All campers and visitors must sign-in/sign-out at the camp office.
- Two-deep leadership is required at all times for youth. BSA Youth Protection guidelines must be practiced; leaders and parents must be trained.
- No thru traffic in program areas.
- No running on trails, bridges, or stairways.
- Bicycles are not permitted.
- **No one may ride in the back of a truck or trailer;** seat belts must be worn by anyone in a moving vehicle.
- Speed limit in camp is 5 mph. Pedestrians always have the right of way.
- No extension cords are allowed unless designated by the Camp Director or Camp Ranger.
- No fires or open flames are allowed in tents, adirondacks, cabins, or any other camp structure.
- Anyone leaving camp must sign-out at camp office.

Uniform in Camp

The BSA Field Uniform is worn each evening at flag , dinner, by the unit raising the morning flag, and at opening and closing campfires. Units that do not have activity uniforms should also wear the field uniform at flag raising. Uniform must always be worn buttoned up and tucked in. Activity uniforms are appropriate for the remainder of the day. Shirts must be worn at all times.

Leaving During Camp

Scouts and adults should have no reason to leave camp except for an emergency. If a Scout must leave camp for an emergency, they must be under the supervision of a qualified adult. Please sign out at the camp office prior to leaving and sign back in upon return.

Smoking

Camp Edgewood is a tobacco-free facility. Adults with tobacco habits may use the secluded area of the parking lot. Use in any other area will result in dismissal from the property.

Damage to Camp Facilities

All campsites and equipment will be inspected upon check-in and check-out. Any damages will be assessed and documented by the Camp Staff and a report given to the Camp Management. Damages may include lost equipment, defacing tents/ buildings, or ecological damages. Please conduct a thorough check-in inspection with your Troop Guide. Sample charges for damage are as follows:

Personal weapons and ammunition are not allowed on the Camp Edgewood. No hunting arrows, ammunition, or rocket engines may be brought on the property.

What Scouts Should Bring

- Scout Field and Activity Uniform
- Medical form including insurance information and parents signature
- Extra clothing– socks, underwear, shoes, etc.
- Rain Gear
- Sleeping bag or bedding
- Soap, comb, toothbrush, towel, and other personal items
- Scout Handbook, pens & pencils, notebooks and merit badge books

Some scouts may find it useful to print a workbook for each class they are taking but should at least have something to write on and write with.
- Money for crafts, Trading post items and snacks (\$40 recommended)
- Other items such as camera, compass, pack, flashlight, insect repellant, sunblock, water bottle
- Swimming gear

Our average afternoon highs average low 90s and it cools to mid 70's at night.

***Personal electronics fall under Troop Policy. Please do not use them in classes, unless instructed , and we highly encourage all Scouts to earn their Cyber Chip before camp if they are bringing electronic devices.**

* Final review of checklist.

* Collect and review medical forms for signatures and insurance information.

* Complete troop roster for check-in with unit insurance policy number.

* Conduct pre-camp health screening within 72 hours of departure.



Medical Forms

Every person who attends camp must submit a complete and signed the most current version of the BSA Medical Form. All parts, including the physicians approval, are mandatory for anyone who is staying in camp longer than 3 days, or participating in any high adventure activities. These forms are due at the time of arrival into camp; please do not mail these forms into camp prior to arrival. We encourage you to turn in copies of these forms to camp and keep the originals.

Dietary Needs

Review your youth and adult medical forms in advance of leaving for camp. Give special attention to dietary restrictions. Our dining hall staff will be glad to see what they can do to help accommodate these needs if at all possible but, we must know as far in advance as possible to help prepare.

Please contact the camp team as soon as possible if any of your Scouts or adults have special dietary restrictions.

Pre-Camp Screenings

All units are required to complete a pre-health screening within 72– hours of arriving at camp (form on pg...). This form must be turned in immediately upon check in and participants as indicated must be left at home. This screening may be done all at once or over the phone via the Scout parents so long as an accurate temperature can be obtained. Adults attending camp need to also be included in the screening.

Arrival Screenings

Upon arrival one adult leaver will be required to complete a brief health screening with their unit and sign the arrival screening form. Individuals who are symptomatic will be quarantined.

Outbreak Procedure

In the event of an outbreak, participants with an illness will receive care in a quarantined environment. Others in their campsite will be immediately re-screened for fever/ other symptoms.

Hospital or Doctor Visit

In the event that a Scout requires medical attention from a physician or hospital the following procedure will be followed:

1. It is the responsibility of the unit leadership to provide transportation for members of their unit requiring non-emergency attention. Staff is not available to assist with transportation.
2. At least one adult leaders from the unit will accompany the Scout requiring medical services and must obtain the Scout's medical form before leaving camp property. A minimum of 2 people is required; you may be accompanied by adults from other units or off-duty staff or another youth in your unit.
3. Parents or guardians will be notified immediately by the Camp Director or unit leader of any serious illness or injury. Parents who will not be at home while Scouts is at camp must advise adult leaders of contact information in the case of emergency.
4. The Camp Medical Officer must clear all cases requiring outside medical care.
5. The troop is responsible for providing proof of insurance upon arrival at the doctor's office or hospital, or pay cash for services provided.



Arrival Times

Check– In Time is Sunday 1:00pm– 4:00pm. Upon prior arrangement with the Camp Director troops may request a Saturday arrival. Troops arriving before Sunday afternoon registration and/ or staying past Saturday morning check out will be charged \$5.00 per person. Troops arriving early or staying late will be responsible for their own two-deep leadership, medical staff, and extras meals.

Sunday Check-In Procedures

All units must go directly to the Camp Office upon arrive, please do not go to your campsite.

Each unit will be assigned a troop guide when they arrive that will assist you through the check in procedure.

Please have the following items ready when you arrive:

- Pre– Health Screening Forms
- Medical Forms for all Scouts and adults
- Final payment for any outstanding fees

1. Check-In

Your unit will be greeted upon arrival at the camp and met by the Camp Staff. You will turn in your pre-health screening form and conduct an arrival health screening.

2. Troop Photo

Troop photos will be taken during the tour, please ensure that all Scouts and adults are in complete uniforms. The unit may bring a thumb drive to receive a copy from Office Staff.

3. Medical Check-In, Business Office, and Program Packet

Turn in all medical forms and review them with the health officer, reconcile the unit's account to pay any outstanding fees, and receive a program packet before leaving Office.

4. Camp Tour and Campsite Inspection

Scouts and adults will complete a camp tour with their troop guide. They will proceed to the campsite and complete the Campsite inventory. The camp tour will include visits to all program areas, and facilities.

5. Adult Leader/ SPL Orientation Meetings

Sunday 7:00pm in the Leaders Lounge one adult and Program Building one youth representative from each unit is required to attend. The session will include a review of the schedule and program updates.

Checking–Out

Check out is Saturday by 10:00am; all troops must be out of their campsites and the parking lot by this time – unless prior arrangements have been made with the Camp Director.

1. Troop Guides will arrive post breakfast to assist with check– out and inspect campsites
2. All trash must be removed from sites and placed in dumpsters.
3. After campsite inspection has been completed, an adult leader must report to the camp office to complete check– out and pick up medical forms. **Medical Forms left at camp will be taken to Council Office to be mailed back.**

-Units wishing to leave after campfire Friday may do so after consulting their guide and the office.

SCOUT RELEASE FROM CAMP REQUEST

INSTRUCTIONS

Scouts desiring to leave camp prior to the troop's departure or not as part of the troop must have a release signed by their parents and approved by the troop leader. Scouts will normally be permitted to leave only when accompanied by their parents. The form below must be used in handling all such departures. In an emergency, it may not be possible for a parent or parents to sign the release. In that situation sufficient information must be recorded attesting to the telephone call or means of communication by which word arrived asking for the release of the scout. This information should document the person from whom the call was received, verify telephone confirmation of the parent asking for release of the Scout and give detailed reasons for the requested release.
