

# How to Register



Registration Opens February 28, 2018 8:00 A.M.

#### Returning Families:

If you previously registered online for SPEF Summer School, a SPEF Camp or SPEF Afterschool classes, use the same account to register for Summer School 2018. When Registration opens on February 28, go to <a href="https://www.SPEF4kids.org">www.SPEF4kids.org</a> and click on the link to 'Online Enrollment'. Log back in to your account, update Household, Medical information and your student's grade, then register your student in classes. Contact the SPEF office well in advance of registration if you can't log back in to your account. You reset your own password.

#### New Families to SPEF Programs:

If you are a new family to SPEF's Programs, you are welcome to Create your Family Account now, so you are ready when Registration opens on February 28.

Go to <a href="https://www.SPEF4kids.org">www.SPEF4kids.org</a> and click on the link to 'Online Enrollment'.

- Use the 'New user sign-up option'.
- Once logged in, click on the 'Manage People and Household Information' button at the bottom of the page to edit Parent & Household details and Add children living in the household.
- Save your Changes, then you are ready to go for future programs such as Summer School, Summer Camps & Afterschool classes.
- Once Registration opens you will be asked to confirm and save your Household information, update your student's grade, complete Medical Information and register your student.

#### **General Notes:**

- Students should register based on the grade level they will be entering in the Fall of 2018.
- Don't register for two classes in the same period.
- Students may not stay for brunch unless they are enrolled in both a 1st and 2nd period class.
- You are welcome to log back in and add classes.

# Enrichment, Proficiency & Preparation Classes

The South Pasadena Educational Foundation (SPEF) offers tuition-based enrichment, proficiency and preparation classes. Refer to course description for cost information. The cost of materials is figured into the price of each class. To support students needing assistance to reach State and District standards, SPEF offers Proficiency and Credit Recovery classes to SPUSD students at a reduced price.

# Credit/College Recovery Classes

SPEF offers Credit Recovery Classes to students that attend SPUSD at a lower rate than advanced credit classes. If you don't see the Credit Recovery class your student needs, contact the SPEF Office at 626.441.5810 ext. 1163.

- For SPUSD students, the cost of Credit Recovery classes is \$180 for a 1 period class or \$360 for a 2 period class. Please select the SPUSD option when registering. SPUSD enrollment will be verified.
- For Non-SPUSD out of district students, the cost of recovery will be \$280 for a 1 period class or \$500 for a 2 period class. Please select the Non-SPUSD option.
- Depending on registration, some classes may be offered as an online curriculum - attendance at Summer School is required to access online curriculum.

# Non-SPUSD or Auditing Students

- Before registering, it is the responsibility of Non-SPUSD students to confirm their home school will accept credit earned for their SPEF Summer School course.
- Non-SPUSD students are able to request that transcripts be sent to their home schools.
- Students are able to audit a class. All class fees apply.
- Select the Transcript and/or Audit options when you register.

# Incoming SPHS 9th Graders

For Current 8<sup>th</sup> Grade students at SPMS entering SPHS in Fall 2018, we encourage you to attend the 8th Grade Parent Night Part I on January 24, and Part II on February 21 before registering in Summer School. Counselors and Principals will talk about Courses, Math Progressions and Pathways, and answer questions about Summer School classes. Even though Registration opens on February 28, Summer School at the High School level is different to what you might remember at Elementary and Intermediate Schools in that we can add classes, such as Health, if we have demand. For example, it is not uncommon to have 6 or more Health classes each summer.

#### Payment

Payment in full or commitment to a payment plan is expected at the time of registration. There are various payment options at registration check-out.

- Pay in Full by Credit Card.
- Pay by Installment using a Credit Card. By registering in a class and electing to pay by installment, you authorize SPEF to run your credit card on the dates for your chosen installment plan. The earlier you sign up, the more installment options are available to you when you check-out, as follows:

#### Sign up by March 9th:

Deposit + 3 installments on April 6, May 4 and June 1. Sign up by March 23<sup>rd</sup>:

Deposit + 2 installments on April 20 and May 18. Sign up by April 20<sup>th</sup>:

Deposit + balance on May 18.

- Deposit: The deposit per class is \$75. Deposits are nonrefundable.
- Please contact the SPEF office if you need to update your credit card information between installments.
- Pay by Cash or Check: If you want to pay by cash or check, payment must be received at the SPEF Office within 48 hours of registration, or your student risks being dropped from their classes. You can select this payment option at check-out until May 31st.
- After May 31<sup>st</sup>, to complete your registration, payment must be made in full by credit card. If you need to arrange an alternative method of payment after this date, please contact the SPEF Office. Your registration is not complete until you have put in place a plan to pay in full.
- Registration is open until the start of Summer School: You are still welcome to register your student or add classes after June 2nd, however you will need to pay in full at the time of registration.
- If you have any questions regarding payment contact the SPEF office.

## Changes and Refunds

SPEF offers Summer School classes based on confirmed Registration. Changes to your student's registration affect SPEF scheduling and material purchase decisions. By registering in a class with SPEF, you are confirming that you have read and understand SPEF's change and refund policies.

- Refund Policy: If you need to drop your student from Summer school, a refund of all payments minus the \$75 per class deposit will be made until May 11<sup>th</sup>. No Refunds will be given after May 11<sup>th</sup>.
- Change Policy: You can add classes to your student's schedule from your account, but you can't change your student's classes. Changes must be done by SPEF. A \$25 fee will be charged each time SPEF needs to make a change to a student's schedule. Fees arising from a schedule change must be paid at the time of the request.
- A \$25 fee will be charged for every class you need to drop because you signed your student up for multiple classes in a period.
- Requests for changes and refunds must be submitted to SPEF in writing, either using the Registration Change Form, available at <a href="https://www.SPEF4kids.org">www.SPEF4kids.org</a> or by emailing details to <a href="mailto:registration@SPEF4kids.org">registration@SPEF4kids.org</a>.
- Classes Cancelled by SPEF: In May SPEF makes decisions about whether a class needs to be cancelled for low enrollment. If SPEF cancels a class, SPEF will contact you to help pick a new class for your student, or arrange a refund of all payments. SPEF reserves the right to cancel classes, change teacher assignments, or make other decisions pertaining to class registration and schedule for whatever reasons deemed necessary.
- Refunds will be processed within ten working days upon receipt of a Registration Change Form at the SPEF Office, or receipt of an email detailing changes needed at registration@SPEF4kids.org. Refunds will be issued in the original form of payment. SPEF's refund and change policy is uniformly applied. Only a parent or guardian can request a refund.
- If a student is suspended, he/she will be sent home for the day. If that same student is suspended a second time, he/she will be dismissed from the remainder of the summer program without refund.

#### **Full Classes**

SPEF will make every effort to provide additional classes. Unfortunately, it is not always possible to meet the demand for a particular class when the class becomes full. # Attendance & Textbook Policy

Attendance rules are not flexible and must be adhered to. In order to satisfy class requirements, students must be present and on time each day.

- Attendance will be taken at the start of each period.
- Missing 1 period is equivalent to 1 absence.
- Missing 1 full day, 2 period, 10-unit class is equivalent to 2 absences.
- 3 tardies are equivalent to 1 absence.
- Students who acquire more than 3 absences (either 3 absences plus 1 tardy or 4 absences) in a class will be dropped with a failing grade.
- The final day to drop a class without a "drop/fail" on record will be Wednesday, June 20, 2018, by 2:00 p.m. Complete a Registration Change Form and submit it to the SPHS Summer School office. If you plan to Audit, complete the Audit form and submit to the SPHS Summer School office.
- Absences should be reported to the school site on the SPHS attendance line (626) 441-5820 ext. 2909.
- Each student is responsible for textbooks issued to them during Summer School. Students must pay for all books damaged, destroyed, tampered with, or not returned to the textbook room by 1pm Friday, July 20, 2018. Failure to return books or pay obligations may result in withholding of grades/transcripts.

#### **Illness and Medical Appointments**

- Illness and medical appointments are absences.
- Assigning make-up work for illness will be at the discretion of the teacher and the administration.

# First Day of School

We will email your student's classroom and teacher information at the close of business on June 13. Print this in preparation for the first day. We will also have the same information at the SPEF office on June 14 & 15, or at the school site on the first day of school. Once you have this information, your student can go straight to their classroom and avoid the line at the office.

#### Summer School Office

- The South Pasadena Education Foundation runs the Summer School program.
- Prior to the start of Summer School, any adjustments to student schedules must be made at the SPEF office.
- Once school begins, changes should be made at the SPHS Summer School Office.

#### Cafeteria

Brunch and a la carte offerings similar to those available during the school year will be served from 10:30-10:50 daily.

- The cost for High School Summer School students is \$3.50.
- The PIN your student has from the regular school year will work during the summer.
- If you need a PIN, contact Michelle Curry at 626-441 5820 x2950, download the Lunch form from www.SPEF4kids.org or go to www.SPUSD.net and click on the Food Services link.
- Please do not leave this to the last minute. Food Service needs to receive this application by June 1st, or your student will need to use cash instead of a PIN.
- Vending machines are also available on campus.

## Just So You Know

- 1. High School Summer School is open to students who have completed 8<sup>th</sup> grade.
- 2. Students must have met the prerequisites detailed in the class description to register for a class.
- 3. Students will not be able to choose their teacher.
- 4. Summer School instruction is compressed into an extremely short time frame. Each Summer School day is roughly equivalent to one week of instruction during the regular school year.
- 5. Classes will be covering extensive course material daily and homework will be assigned.
- 6. <u>Summer School classes require a serious</u> <u>commitment.</u> Policies for attendance and credit will be followed uniformly.

#### **CLASSES FOR ADVANCED CREDIT**

#### ADVANCED COMPUTER TECHNOLOGY

In this hybrid learning environment-based course, students will develop skill sets used in the world of Google. In Google Office they will learn to create folders, documents, presentations, spreadsheets, forms, and drawings. Students will build a site to house their documents in a personal e-portfolio. This course will also cover more advanced skills such as Flash-based animation, Photoshop-based digital photography manipulation, blogging, and various selected Web tools-based skills ranging from Prezi-based presentations to Symbaloo-based cataloguing of websites. Students earn elective credit towards high school graduation.

\$280 Elective Credit 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P2 5 Units

#### **BIOLOGY 1/2**

Some of the major themes in biology are science as an investigation and inquiry, historical changes of organisms, genetic continuity, regulation and homeostasis, and biological basis of behavior. Several of the topics studied, such as photosynthesis and genetics, will be closely related to basic chemical processes. This course satisfies graduation requirements as a life science course. This course meets the UC/CSU "D" – Laboratory Science requirement. Since this is an accelerated course, there is a pre-requisite "B" grade or better for the most recent science and math courses completed by the student.

\$500 UC/CSU "D" Lab Science 10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 - 2 10 Units

#### **DIGITAL MEDIA**

This course introduces students to the art and language of film and video production. Students are required to learn specialized vocabulary and use it to express themselves clearly in their writing about film and video. The course will focus on film and television history, criticism, analysis of video and film, and shooting and editing techniques, such as stop-motion animation fundamentals. We will create our own short films using video cameras and digital and linear editing systems.

\$280 | HS Practical Arts Elective Credit | 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> | P1 | 5 Units

#### DRIVER'S EDUCATION

This class is offered in a twelve day session. Driver's Education is designed to develop knowledge of the provisions of the Vehicle Code and other California laws relating to the operation of motor vehicles and personal responsibility in traffic. This course will acquaint students with driving techniques and strategies that prepare them to become safe, responsible drivers, including knowledge of the dangers involved in consuming alcohol or drugs in connection with the operation of a motor vehicle. This course meets the requirement of the Department of Motor Vehicles of 30 hours of instruction. Upon completion of this course, the student will receive DMV form #387 (Certificate of Completion of Classroom Driver Education - valid for one year from date of issuance) to allow them to take the DMV written exam to obtain a learner's permit. If a student reaches the minimum age of 15.5 while the certificate is still valid, they may use the certificate to apply for a learner's permit. Students who pass this course may be able to secure a driver's license prior to their 18th birthday. Classes will run June 18 – July 5.

\$150 Elective Credit / DMV Cert. 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 P2 2.5 Units

#### **ECONOMICS**

Economics is the study of our efforts to satisfy unlimited wants with limited resources. Students learn about supply and demand, economic systems, the free enterprise systems, competition, income and spending, the gross national product, money, banking and the Federal Reserve System, as well as other concepts in economics. This course satisfies one semester of the senior Social Studies requirement for high school graduation. UC/CSU Approved for "G" College Prep Elective.

\$280 UC/CSU "G" Coll. Prep Elective 12<sup>th</sup> P1 P2 5 Units

#### **GRAPHIC DESIGN 1-8**

This course provides students with the opportunity to develop the creative skills with computers to design artwork for commercial purposes. Topics will include basic design, graphic design history, terminology, typography, layouts, marketing, printing techniques, creative processes, portfolio preparation, and job acquisition skills. Projects will include business cards, t-shirts, promotional materials (i.e. brochures, posters, newsletters and packaging). UC/CSU Approved for "F" VAPA.

\$500 UC/CSU "F" VAPA 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 - 2 10 Units

#### **CLASSES FOR ADVANCED CREDIT**

#### HEALTH

This one-semester course meets the state requirement in health and the high school graduation requirement for Health Education. Instruction is given in drug abuse, the dangers of alcohol and tobacco, and first aid. Infectious and chronic diseases, their causes, prevention and possible cures, are also studied. We offer multiple sections of Health with identical curriculum. If your student would like to complete CPR/First Aid certificate training during this class, please select and pay for this option when registering.

\$280 HS Graduation Requirement 9th-12th P1 P2 5 Units

#### **MODERN WORLD HISTORY 1/2**

This course is a study of the major events of the world in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Various concepts such as imperialism, the industrial revolution and nationalism are examined in a contemporary context. Students need to be English-proficient in order to keep up with the accelerated pace of this course. This course satisfies one year of the sophomore Social Studies requirement for high school graduation. UC/CSU Approved for "A" History/Social Science.

\$500 UC/CSU "A" History/Social Sci. 10<sup>th</sup> P1 - 2 10 Units

#### **PAINTING & DRAWING 1**

This one-year course introduces students to the Elements of Art and Principles of Design while developing their drawing skills and painting techniques. Studio experiences in the classroom will give students opportunities to experience a variety of media (pencil, pen, ink, pastel, watercolor, and tempera paint) while developing students' individual style, creative problem solving skills, and self-expression. Students will demonstrate their ability to respond, analyze and interpret their own artwork and the work of others through discussions, critiques, and reflective writing. Topics covered are contour drawing, shading 3-dimensional forms, color theory, observation drawing, perspective, and portraiture.

\$500 UC/CSU "F" VAPA 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 - 2 10 Units

#### **PHOTOGRAPHY 1/2**

Photography 1/2 is an introductory black/white and digital photography course. This course will provide students with opportunities to extend their knowledge and skills in the field of photography. This course will familiarize the student with photographic equipment, materials methods, and processes. The students will also be introduced to computer technology and digital photography as a technical, creative, and expressive medium. Ideally, students have their own digital camera, preferably an SLR. Field trips include the L.A. Arboretum and Pasadena. UC/CSU Approved for "F" VAPA.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION

In this one-semester course the emphasis is development of physical fitness, skills, sportsmanship, responsibility, and self-discipline. The program contains a variety of activities, some of which are basketball, volleyball, swimming, and weight training. All classes are co-educational, serving both boys and girls. All students must pass at least 5 out of 6 physical fitness tests in addition to satisfactorily completing four full semesters of PE and/or sports in order to meet the high school graduation requirement. Register in this class if your student needs to take the Physical Fitness Test (PFT). SPUSD students please note, all 9th grade students are required to be in PE in fall and spring semesters.

\$280 HS Graduation Requirement 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 5 Units

#### **PSYCHOLOGY**

This course is designed to give students an overview of fundamental personality theory as it relates to them in today's environment. This course also includes an in-depth look at values clarification concepts, the concepts of environment vs. heredity, and the study of several theories in the domain of emotions and stress. This course meets the CSU/UC A-G requirements as an elective.

\$280 UC/CSU A-G Elective Credit 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 5 Units

#### STAGE PRODUCTION

This course teaches students the execution of stage productions. Students will design and build sets, design lighting systems and learn how to place sound equipment to enhance a production. This year we will help on the Shrek Jr. and Mary Poppins Jr. shows at the SPHS auditorium. This class meets the SPHS Practical Arts graduation requirement.

\$280 HS Practical Arts Elective Credit 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P2 5 Units

#### SPEF 2018 SUMMER HIGH PROGRAMS CATALOG

#### **CLASSES FOR ADVANCED CREDIT**

#### **UNITED STATES HISTORY 1/2**

United States History starts with a review of the nation's beginnings and its growth as an industrial and world power. The historical study of political, social and economic events is concentrated in the 20th century. The class will involve extensive reading and writing and use of various forms of technology. Reading of the textbook, primary documents, supplemental readings from literature, newspapers, as well as other sources will be covered. This course satisfies one year of the junior Social Studies requirement for high school graduation. UC/CSU Approved for "A" History/Social Science.

\$500 UC/CSU "A" History/Social Sci. 11th P1 - 2 10 Units

#### **US GOVERNMENT (CIVICS)**

This is a basic course in political science in which students study the federal form of government, and examine the executive, legislative, and judicial branches. State and local government structures and processes and the political process, as it relates to election suffrage, and pressure groups, is also studied. This course satisfies one semester of the senior Social Studies requirement for high school graduation. UC/CSU Approved for "A" History/Social Science.

\$280 UC/CSU "A" History/Social Sci. | 12<sup>th</sup> | P1 | P2 | 5 Units

#### **CLASSES FOR PROFICIENCY & PREPARATION**

#### ACADEMIC DECATHLON

This class is an enrichment seminar course designed to help SPHS students prepare for the upcoming 2018-2019 Academic Decathlon competitive season, and is offered for those that want to be challenged above and beyond their regular school work. Subjects include Art History, Music Theory, Microeconomics and Macroeconomics, Social Science and Language & Literature. Enrollment in this class does not mean you will be on the Academic Decathlon team; however, it will help you determine if you would like to be on the team. To ensure this is the class for you, please email Mr. Valcorza at ovalcorza@spusd.net.

\$225 No Elective Credit 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P2 5 Units

#### **ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT FOR HUMANITIES**

This course is intended for both second language learners and native-born students raised in second-language environments who need assistance in understanding the structure of the English sentence. Students will cover four humanities areas including music, art, drama, and literature. Language skills such as grammar, writing, paraphrasing, pronunciation analysis and vocabulary development will be emphasized within written assignments and reflective journal writings. Successful completion of this course is the gateway to reclassification when students take the ELPAC test in Spring. Students will be given guidelines as to which skills need to be improved in order to be reclassified.

\$225 Elective Credit 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 5 Units

#### INTERNSHIP SUMMER PROGRAM

<u>Prerequisites</u>: Students must have completed two workshops covering job skills and cover letters, resumes and interview skills, and have applied, interviewed for, and accepted an internship. The course will allow students to complete their 60 hours of work at one of the participating businesses or organizations offering internships. Upon satisfactory completion of the internship, students will earn five hours of practical arts elective credit towards high school graduation. You will be contacted with more information once you register.

\$225 HS Practical Arts Elective Credit 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> (P1) 5 Units

#### **CLASSES FOR PROFICIENCY & PREPARATION**

#### MATH PREPARATION

#### Prep. for Math I or Math I+

This class is prep. for the first course in the high school mathematics sequence. Students will review and build on key middle school content such as linear, quadratic, and exponential equations and inequalities. Students will preview functions and descriptive statistics and how to use their learning to model mathematics in the world around them. This is ideal for the student who will be enrolled in Math I or Math I+ (+ means accelerated) in the Fall. Earn elective credit towards high school graduation. Pass/Fail grading will apply.

\$280 Elective Credit 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 P2 5 Units

#### Prep. for Math II

This class is prep. for the second course in the high school mathematics sequence. This course will help familiarize your student with Math II standards, including extending their understanding of linear, quadratic and exponential functions using symbolic reasoning and manipulation. Students earn elective credit towards high school graduation. Pass/Fail grading will apply.

\$280 Elective Credit 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P1 5 Units

#### Prep for Math III

This class is prep. for the third course in the high school mathematics sequence. This course will help familiarize your student with Math III standards, including extending their understanding of polynomial, rational, radical, exponential, logarithmic, and trigonometric functions analytically, graphically and numerically. Students earn elective credit towards high school graduation. Pass/Fail grading will apply.

\$280 Elective Credit 10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> P2 5 Units

#### MATH TRANSITION

#### Transition from Math I to Math II+

## **CREDIT/COLLEGE RECOVERY CLASSES**

Credit/College Recovery Classes are for students who earned a "D" or "F" grade. "D" grades are adequate for High School graduation but are not recognized by colleges. Students who earned a "D" grade during the school year receive no units upon passing but can show an improved grade on their transcript. Students who received an "F" grade receive 5 units per semester upon passing. Credit/College Recovery Classes are offered to SPUSD students at a low cost of \$180 for 5 unit classes and \$360 for 10 unit classes. The Fee for Non-SPUSD students is \$280/\$500. Depending on registration, some classes may be offered as an online curriculum - attendance at Summer School is required to access online curriculum.
