St. Bede's Annual Parish Meeting Minutes - January 28, 2024

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 11:57 am by the The Very Rev'd S.Chadwick Vaughn, Rector.

Opening Prayer

The Rev'd Raymond Walker, III, Priest Associate, led the opening prayer.

Appointment of Clerk for the Annual Meeting

Cathe Echterhoff was appointed as recording clerk of the Annual Parish Meeting.

Approval of Minutes from 2023 Annual Parish Meeting

Minutes of the 2023 Annual Parish Meeting were reviewed and approved as written.

Presentation and Election of New Vestry Members

Chad shared that the Vestry is moving to change the language of the bylaws regarding the number of Vestry members. Previously there were 4 new members each year. This year there are 3. The Vestry Slate for 2024 was presented. The candidates are: Jim Handsfield, Paul Martin and Miriam Needham. The 2024 Vestry slate was accepted.

Comments from the Senior Warden

Orisha Parsons, the Senior Warden, thanked the off-going members of the Vestry, Judah Sali, Maggie Kottke, Barbara Helms and Nina Daniel. She also welcomed the new members. She stated that the Youth have been very active and had great field trips. Orisha appreciates those who are willing to worship and serve at St. Bede's. Orisha will continue as Senior Warden in 2024.

Stewardship Update

Chad recognized the Stewardship Chairs, Cheryl and Fred Murphy. This past year we exceeded our pledged amount. The pledge goal for 2024 is \$460,000. Currently \$428,000 has been received in pledges from 74 people.

Report from the Treasurer

Chad provided the Treasurer's Report. He stated Will Mizell is retiring as treasurer and head usher. Nigel Poland is the new treasurer, and Jim Helms is the new head usher. Chad recognized Will for his service to St. Bede's. In 2023 Income had a deficit of \$11,419, mostly from non-pledged income. Expenses were close to budget. The balance on the Surplus/Loss Fund after the 2023 deficit is posted is \$26,045. Chad shared that the balance on the Diocesan Mortgage Loan is \$94,400. It is on track to be paid off in 2027-2028.

Recap of 2024 Financials

We ended 2024 with a **\$6,280 deficit**. The primary reason for the deficit was due to actual non-pledge gifts being below what was budgeted along with a few pledges that were not paid in full. Other factors included increases in certain utility expenses and other increased operational expenses.

Highlights of **Revenue section**:

- We collected around 99% of pledges \$455,000 of \$460,000 pledged.
- Christmas and Easter Offerings of \$3,945 were \$925 less than budgeted.
- Building use income was \$3,200 more than budgeted.
- Interest income on church accounts was \$2,064 more than budgeted.

Highlights of **Expense section**:

- Overall expenses were \$1,798 under budget.
- Most all ministry and operational areas were at or under budget for 2024. Those areas that were slightly over budget were generally related to higher operating and administrative costs.

Items of note from the **Balance Sheet and Funds** (as of 12/31/2024):

- **Diocesan Loan** In January 2016 we borrowed \$275,000 from the Diocesan Foundation to pay off the mortgage loan from United Community Bank. The Diocesan Foundation Loan is a 15 year, 3% interest loan and will be paid off no later than December of 2030 (earlier with further principal reduction gifts).
 - The current loan balance is \$74,000 (was \$94,400 on 12/31/2023).
- **Bentley Loan** In January 2016 we also borrowed \$30,000 from ourselves (i.e., the Bentley Fund) to pay off the mortgage from UCB. The terms of the loan are the same as the Diocesan Loan, so we are paying ourselves interest at 3%.
 - The current loan balance is \$5,233.
- The balance of the Capital Improvement & Replacement Fund is \$36,945. We accrue \$667/month (\$8,004/year) to have a "set aside" fund for large capital maintenance expenses, i.e., major roof work, replacement of HVAC units, etc.
- The balance of the Annual Surplus/Loss Fund is \$16,040 (after the 2024 deficit is posted). From time to time the Vestry may decide to fund projects using this fund or elect to keep it to absorb potential year-end losses.
- The balance of the Bentley Fund is \$80,571.
- The balance of the Organ Maintenance Fund is \$8,666. These are funds reserved for anticipation of future major maintenance on the organ.
- The balance of the St. Bede's Endowment Fund was \$225,475 on 12/31/2024 (was \$203,947 on 12/31/2023)

Endowment

Summary of 2024 Actions:

- Pat Pickett was approved by the Vestry as chairman for 2024. Nigel Poland and Muriel Diguette were elected to three-year terms on the committee
- The Morning Star Society donor recognition plaque was installed in the Commons. Please see Rob or Chad if you wish to join the Morning Star Society by remembering St. Bede's in your estate planning or by making a donation to the endowment and have your name added to our list of "stars."
- The Vestry approved the request for the church to receive a quarterly distribution of "Available Endowment Funds" from the Episcopal Church Foundation. This procedure will begin in 2025.
- The committee discussed asking the Vestry to reallocate some of the funds currently held in the "Bentley Fund" into the Endowment. This was tabled until 2025.
- Rob Townes was elected by the committee to be chair in 2025; Muriel Diguette was
 elected to be secretary. Paul Werner was approved to replace Pat Pickett on the
 committee for a three-year term. These designations were approved by the Vestry.

The committee will entertain requests for disbursements from the Endowment for various church projects during the first quarter of 2025. Forms will be available.

At the end of December, 31 2024 (the last statement from the Diocesan Endowment Fund), **The corpus of the St. Bede's Endowment was \$180,492** with the overall **Endowment Fund balance as being \$225,475**. (was \$203,947 on 12/31/2023)

Facilities and Property

In 2024, the Building and Grounds group accomplished several activities. Continued maintenance on the building structure and systems included replacement of damaged ceiling tiles, re-lamping of fluorescent fixtures in the commons area, bathrooms and sacristy, updating and inspection of the kitchen hood fire protection system, and various maintenance tasks and repairs to HVAC units. In addition, we requested and received vendor quotations for replacement of the roofing systems over the Commons, Parish Hall and Kitchen. Those roofing systems, both flat and shingled, are over 25 years old and in need of replacement. We are pleased to report that the Vestry has approved a contract for roof replacement that should begin in early 2025. Grounds work has included cleaning out the playground area behind the

Mission Wing, and cleaning and /or replacing signage at the Henderson Mill and Midvale entrances. In addition, the Vestry entered an agreement with Matt Johnson of Fox Hollow Gardens LLC to provide a landscaping plan and routine maintenance of the grounds. Kelly Landscapes continues to provide grass cutting and leaf cleanup. Finally, Jerry Simmons, our Sexton, continues to provide twice a week services to clean and maintain our interior spaces.

Flower Guild

The Flower Guild faithfully plans and executes altar and Commons arrangements for Sunday worship, special occasions, funerals, and holidays as well as small offerings for shut-ins at Christmas and Easter. Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, & Acolytes

The St. Bede's Liturgical Ministry provides support for the 10 am Sunday liturgy and Eucharist. The ministry provides readers for the lesson, psalm, and intercession, as well as Eucharistic Ministers and crucifers.

There are four Liturgical Teams to provide this support, one team for each of the first four Sundays each month. For those months with a fifth Sunday, a call is made to the entire ministry to fill the needs of that 5th Sunday service. The Liturgical Ministry also provides support for special services, such as Easter and Christmas, by making a similar call for ministry volunteers.

A Liturgical Ministry Training Guide is being developed. The first draft of the guide is in clergy review and the final guide should be available by the 2nd quarter of 2025. This guide is intended to help with consistency in executing the duties of individual ministry roles each Sunday and provide instruction on how to perform those duties. The guide will support members of the Liturgical Ministry "being on the same page." Video training guides are being considered.

Presently there are sufficient resources (people) to provide support for our regular 10 am worship, however, there are not enough to prevent team members having to serve every Sunday on the team they are assigned. Several teams do not enough ministry members to allow the rotation of duties within the team for their Sunday. Invitations to the join the Liturgical Ministry will be included in the Sunday announcements once a month.

Music continues to play an active and important role in the liturgical life of St. Bede's, and I am grateful for a singing congregation that is appreciative and supportive of good music. Those who participate in the music program and offer their musical gifts contribute greatly to the life of a healthy parish, as does the network of moral support from the families of those who share their gifts.

I repeat my annual appeal for more participation in musical opportunities at St. Bede's. The choir is open to anyone at any time and is in great need of new membership. All musicians and those with an interest in music are welcome, regardless of previous experience. Just speak to John Whitt or any choir member about becoming part of our music program. We are a supportive community within a community and have a good and rewarding time together preparing for worship at St. Bede's.

If you have instrumental experience but haven't sung, you may be a better singer than you think. If you've ever sung in a choir, in school or church, consider joining ours. We want to get to know you and welcome you into our community. If you're not a singer, but perhaps play an instrument, make yourself known. We don't know who you are if you don't tell us!

Concerts and Musical Outreach

We are fortunate to have a relationship with the Amethyst Baroque Ensemble, a local early music group who present two to three concerts during the year and will continue to make St. Bede's its Atlanta home. Programs have been well received and well attended, bringing in people from the community as well as within the parish. We continue to explore other concert and performance opportunities, seeking opportunities to raise our visibility in the community and to make our excellent space available for a variety of musical programming.

Lauda Musicam, directed by Jody Miller, who also founded Amethyst, will also present a concert at St. Bede's this year, on February 8th at 7:00 pm. Look for more information in eNews and the website. Lauda (for short) is a full renaissance band consisting of players of unusual medieval and renaissance instruments. St. Bede's will be hosting their chamber ensemble program, which will include a number of smaller groups within the larger ensemble, featuring their particular specialties. This will be an interesting and worthwhile event.

Brian Bishop, one of our visiting choir singers and keyboard artist will also be presenting a Lenten Concert featuring the Trois Leçons de Ténèbres (3 Lessons from Tenebrae) by French baroque composer François Couperin, plus other works by Couperin and Marin Marias. He will be joined by sopranos Wanda Yang Temko and Zorica Pavlovic, with Jacob Bitinas on viola da gamba, and Brian on organ and harpsichord. The date is March 15, 2025, at 7:30 pm.

Outreach

This past year we continued to support the Clarkston Community Center in their afterschool program, continued our financial commitment to NETWorks Ministry as well as volunteering our time in the NETWorks food bank. We continued our long-time support of the Emmaus House Thanksgiving at Home program – collecting 189 Thanksgiving Meal Bags. We ingathered much needed supplies for infants and families in need through Baby Jesus Baskets. We collected over 80 pairs of diabetic socks for the Common Soles Foot Clinic at Church of the Common Ground. And we supported many other local and diocesan ministries and programs.

We have asked The Episcopal Relief and Development to disperse some of our funds to assist countries that are rebuilding after experiencing earthquakes, other natural disasters, and resettlements as a result of war and conflicts and aiding humanitarian efforts. It also has come to our attention that in 1991 an organization was established in the US for the sole purpose of aiding sick and injured children without any means of support. The (PCRF)Palestine Children's Relief Center-has brought children regardless of their religious and/or political affiliation to the US for medical care and has constructed two wings in a hospital in Ramallah for pediatric oncology patients and children suffering from cardiology issues.

The committee meets once a quarter to discuss current natural disasters, ongoing (both national and international) issues, and with the assistance of ERD, tries to allocate our limited resources to those areas that are in the most need. English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)

The English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) program began in January 2013 and is now in its 13th year. We began fall of 2024 with 136 students registering. We filled five levels (Basic, Levels 1, 2, 3, and Super Conversation) with about 90 students and were forced to leave some students on waiting lists. We are bursting at the seams so to speak! Our winter fiesta was well attended with over 100 students and family members and many from St. Bede's who support this ministry.

We continued to staff our nursery with two bilingual staff members (both related to family members who attend our Spanish language services) and others from our parish who volunteer to support this ministry. This wonderful service is invaluable in allowing many parents and families to attend ESOL.

ESOL functions with a large staff of volunteer teachers and coordinators with members of St. Bede's and other community volunteers assisting in this program. Erica and Jelani Valdez help with administrative functions and provide superb hospitality, proving refreshments after class and the opportunity for students to interact and get to know each other. Of note, over the past 12 years over 70 have taught in our ESOL program.

We continue to enjoy the updated classroom space in the Mission Wing made possible in part by a 2018 Episcopal Community Foundation Grant. This renovation has made teaching easier and the classrooms much more inviting and conducive to learning. These classrooms are multifunctional, allowing everyone using the Mission Wing to enjoy and benefit from this renovation.

Our program has been blessed with volunteers and financial support from within and outside of our St. Bede's community. Donations, large and small, combined with budgeted funds from the church make this work possible.

Adult Christian Formation

Adult Formation takes many forms at St. Bede's – from formal programs like Education for Ministry (EfM) to various book and bible study groups to Popcorn Theology & Quiet Days to the Adult Sunday Forum classes. Our 2024 Sunday Adult Formation offerings began with an Episcopal 101 Class led by Chad Vaughn and others. This class allowed for newcomers and long-timers to explore together what it means to be a Christian of the Episcopal variety. During Lent, we joined with Episcopalians around the Diocese of Atlanta as we were led through a series of meditations by Bishop Wright on the topic – "Letting Go". Various parishioners paired up to lead conversations on Bishop Wrights video meditations. In Eastertide, Raz Schreiber led us through an exploration of Understanding our Spiritual Type. This Fall, Paul Martin offered a series on understanding Celtic Spirituality. And then later in the Fall we had some fun learning about the Hymnal with John Whitt and "Hymns from a Hat". Decaon Iñaki offered a session on the Compostela de Santiago and the Spanish way of pilgrimage. We finished the year with an Advent series led by Lynnsay Buehler on using the Enneagram as a tool for better understanding ourselves and our faith. During Advent, we also had opportunities to write cards to prisoners on death row and to detainees at Stewart Detention Center. In the year ahead, we plan to offer many other opportunities to enrich our understanding of our faith. Please join us for a class, small group, quiet day, or a book or film discussion. Your voice and the sharing of your faith journey always enriches these conversations and offerings!

Healing Our Racism Book Group

The Healing Our Racism book group was formed in the Summer of 2020 is response to the heightened racial tensions. Our group has doubled in number over the past few years. We have read and discussed many books tending to the historical complexities of racism in our country, and recently we've begun to read some fiction to enrich our understanding. Children and Family Ministries

In 2024, we continued offering a "pull-out" formation time for children during 10 am worship. Children ages 3 years old through 5th grade (and younger with an adult caregiver) begin the worship time with their families and then process out early in the Liturgy of the Word, returning at the Peace, in time to celebrate the Eucharist. This allows about 20-30 minutes for a Godly Play story and some "wondering" time.

For families with young children, our "Prayground" offers an inviting space to participate in worship, and we also invite them to use the unstaffed nursery room if they need an alternate space for either a quiet break or for louder play.

With Spanish-language worship moving from 2:30 to 1:30 pm in 2024, we resumed offering Christian Formation for young children immediately following the fellowship time after 10 am worship. This class is mostly attended by children whose families attend the 1:30 service immediately after this formation time. This class is taught in English. Using Godly Play storytelling, books, and other resources, we focus on learning about what we do in church – the liturgy and the sacraments – in addition to experiencing stories about the people of God, stories about Jesus, and stories told by Jesus. At the end of the 2024-2025 program year, the children in this class will be able to participate in a celebratory communion service to acknowledge their growing in faith.

Other events, celebrations and resources offered in 2024 included:

- Illustrated Ministry micro-practices and prayers mailed weekly in the e-news and coloring pages and scripture story booklets in the Prayground,
- Evening Bilingual VBS for families with over 50 participants enjoying dinner, storytelling, music and crafts together during which we collected school supplies and money to support NETWorks Back2School Shop, and we made cards and wrote notes to ICE detainees at Stewart,
- Advent Wreath-making Workshop offered in the morning and afternoon with a home worship booklet available in English or Spanish to help families observe a holy Advent and prepare for Christmas,
- Las Posadas and Christmas Tree Decorating,
- A well-attended Christmas Eve Pageant with young children, teens, and adults who donned costumes and offered readings to help tell the Nativity story.

I am grateful for the entire St. Bede's community for supporting our ministry to families with young children through your prayers, financial support, hospitality, time, energy, and presence. Many thanks go to the awesome team of VBS volunteers who enabled us to have a wonderful week of fellowship and fun this summer celebrating the Saints and saints of the church! And finally, a special shout-out to Junior Abraham for being a faithful Godly Play co-teacher with me for many years.

Youth and Family Ministries

2024 brought great growth and opportunities for the youth program here at St. Bede's. With the change in time for our worship in Spanish to 1:30 pm, we have more young people participating in the youth program than we had over the last few years. We extended confirmation classes from six weeks to last the entire Christian education year, which in turn provided us multiple ways to connect our young people to St Bede's in ways that we couldn't before. Together the youth created over two hundred Bede's Bags to provide meals to those in need, collaborated and purchased forty-two Thanksgiving meal bags for Emmaus House, and pooled our money to create baby Jesus Baskets (and learned that babies are REALLY expensive.). We had participants join others from the Diocese at New Beginnings and will have more folks join Happening in early 2025. We have explored what it sounds, looks and feels like to be in the presence of God while going out into the world, whether it be eating at Waffle House or shooting pool in the youth room downstairs. We look forward to growing together in our faith and friendships over the coming years. And as always, continue to send peace, grace, grooviness and love into the world.

St. Bede's Ministries in Spanish

It is with deep gratitude that I greet you in the name of Dios, nuestro Padre, (God, our Father,) and report to you as the priest serving here at St. Bede's primarily with our Ministries in Spanish! While my work in this ministry is part-time, it is a great honor to serve God and neighbor in this particular way.

In 2024, we experienced much in the way of transition. As the year began Rev. Irma (Mimi) was primarily officiating our service at 2:30pm. Following Easter, we bid her farewell to offer her services to God elsewhere in the diocese as she continues as Hispanic Missioner. Since then, with your support, I have had the privilege to partner closely with Deacon Iñaki and other leaders like Carmen, Judah, Molly, Orisha and Beth to lead this ministry while fostering deeper community within our whole parish. To this end, in August we moved our worship service to 1:30pm, such that now all parishioners, including our youth and children, have greater access to St. Bede's program offerings and times of fellowship between services. Join us as we continue to create opportunities for bilingual and multicultural growth in faith and fellowship!

Most recently at Sunday afternoon worship, we have had an average of 50 in attendance; with some Sundays seeing upwards of 80 and others seeing as few as 25. What's most evident is that our community of worshippers are faithful, love God, and love each other. Here's a little about how we have gathered and celebrated throughout 2024:

BAPTISMS: More than 6 young people were baptized and their families welcomed into our community.

PRESENTATIONS: There are 2 Hispanic traditions of presentation: at 40 days, recalling the presentation of Jesus in the temple; and at 3 years, to give thanks to God and the Virgin Mary for the life of the child. We presented at least 4 children.

CONFIRMATION: We have celebrated the confirmation of at least 3 youth.

QUINCEAÑERAS: We have celebrated at least 6 quinceañeras praying with them as they move into this new season of life with God's help and the Virgin Mary's guidance.

MEMORIAL SERVICES: While I served in at least 3 funeral services, we had at least 2 services in memory.

DAY OF THE DEAD: As a whole parish we remembered those who we love that are with us no longer, and shared in this remembrance together with pictures, writings, and other tokens of our loved one's lives on a beautiful Ofrenda (Altar of Remembrance) erected under the leadership of Carmen.

LA GUADALUPANA: Our fantastic celebration of Our Lady of Guadalupe was held on Wednesday, December 11th featuring the Choir, Los Chinelos (Guerrero Dancers,) and The Mariachis, who continued to play while we gathered to eat, fellowship, and dance after. The youth did a great job offering us the representation. So many people's efforts came together to make this event a huge success as we welcomed over 100 people to our celebration. I am grateful for Deacon Iñaki's leadership as we worked with Judah, Beth, Pedro, Carmen, John, Molly, Victoria, the flower guild, and a host of folks who offered their time and talents of cooking, carrying, organizing, offering roses, cleaning and more.

LAS POSADAS: We shared in a bilingual representation and journey of the story of Jesus' birth in a stable, following the path of Mary and Joseph as they looked for a place to stay, followed by songs and treats and Christmas tree decorating! Our children dressed up, leading the path for us, well-supported by Molly with assistance from some of our youth.

BULLETINS AND MUSIC: We have transitioned our bulletins to a similar style as our morning worship while moving from occasional live music to recordings from which we can provide song books! We are grateful to John, Laura, Iñaki, Judah, and Chad for getting us settled into this new style and rhythm.

BILINGUAL WORSHIP: St. Bede's continues to celebrate a number of holy days through bilingual services, where we are able to welcome folks throughout the whole parish and their families and friends into worship together. Vacation Bible School (VBS) is also bilingual, where we have intergenerational and multicultural fun learning about our faith and enjoying fun activities and crafts.

ETC: We have welcomed visitors, gathered to eat great food and/or dance and celebrate one another, and hosted festivities like Sabor Latino. We have renewed one couple's wedding vows and celebrated the wedding of another. I have blessed homes, water, rosaries, icons, people, and the stories they carry in their hearts. I am proud of the work this ministry does and look forward to how its members continue to move this ministry forward.
