Who were the Celts?

- A group of separate nations with a shared culture
- Prominent in Europe through the 1000 years BCE

If you are of European descent, you will have some Celtic DNA. As we look into their faith and lives, if you have African, Latin, or Native American descent, let us know what rings bells for you.

- Advanced culture, but routed by the Romans, and pushed to the fringes
- Fierce warriors, became fierce (but peaceful) followers of Christ
- Family and tribe central
- Their culture was very open to the gospel and in ways that ring bells for us
 - Lovers of beauty, symbol, the power of the word and story

The Celts as Christians —

- Never a separate church saw themselves as loyal members of the one church based in Rome
- Heavily influenced by other 'fringers,' especially the Desert Fathers and Mothers
- Warriors daring all for God, but without the violence. Martyrdoms Red, Green, and White

How they speak to me and many in C21:

- A lifestyle that weaves together all the strains of the faith, taking us much closer to the church of the apostles.
- Because the Celts believed God is revealed in creation as well as scripture, concern for the environment was hard-wired into their faith.
- Many, though not all, treated women as full partners in life and ministry.
- Their evangelism was peaceful and based on the attraction of whole, caring lives.
- They were held and nurtured in committed communities very different from the Roman 'parish' system we still have today, 500 years after the Reformation. 'Parish' here means that the local church revolves around a fixed sanctuary and a pastor/priest/minister.
- They were very wise in 'baptizing' parts of their culture that gibed with the gospel, and discarding what didn't. We who are inspired by them are likewise not New Age pagans.
- A Way of Life that frames my efforts to live every day in the Way of Jesus.
- Kindred spirits who, though separated by distance, have become my 'tribe.'

Session 2 — A Theology to Dance

Books: "Living the Celtic Way" Bradley
"Anam Cara" O'Donohue

First, what we must NOT do at any cost:

We must not worship old things as substitutes for eternal things, as Richard Rohr has said.

So, what can we take forward with us, drawing 'Water from an Ancient Well?'

"Say Friend and Enter"

- To enter their faith, and dance.

This is a theology that needs to be danced.

It is not about what to believe, but how to believe;

not about creeds, but contemplation;

not about searching for God,

but acknowledging God is closer than our own breath;

not about what makes me feel fulfilled,

but what opens the door of my heart to God;

not about a direct path, but the infinity and patterns of the Celtic knot.

- A rich and whole theology.

Holistic, creation-friendly.

Embraces all the strands of Christian faith.

Weaves together love of creation with love of God's Word written and made human.

- Life as Journey.

"Live life as a Pilgrimage from which we shall not return."

Venturing out vs. stability.

Seeking your "Place of Resurrection."

- Lively, image-laden worship.

Taken from popular tradition, though it is not clear how far back that goes. Found in new prayers and hymns, eg. The Wild Goose Group (Iona).

Worship at the High Crosses; 'Forest Church.'

- Intentional Discipleship

Church, family, society, school no longer support living daily as disciples. We need a Way of Life that we can easily apply in our lives.

Monastic values — "Monks on Main Street, Nuns on the Net."

- Following a Way of Life

Like a good physical fitness plan for the spirit.

Challenging, but flexible and adaptable, and one we can grow into.

Once internalized, our Way simplifies and focuses our life every day.

- Communities rather than Churches.

'Villages of God' or 'Colonies of Heaven.'

Rome's model for the local church was the Empire's Civil Service;

the Celts started from what they knew: the extended family.

We need a way to rebirth the Celtic Monastic Communities.

Hospitality a core value.

"The fire is burning bright on the hearth, draw in as near as you are ready to come."

From which follows:

- Non-Threatening Evangelism (Hunter)

"Radical Welcome, Changing Lives."

Evangelism of deep hospitality, humbly serving the people, and caring presence and witness.

Iona and Lindisfarne - isolated, but on main travel routes.

Parables of contemplative and community; prayer and action; mission and retreat

Often sought out those on the margins of society.

"Believe, Belong, Behave" now becoming "Behave, Belong, Believe."

- A Soulfriend.

A mature Christian friend to whom I open up my life.

Vital: to have a soulfriend is the only absolute requirement to join the Community of Aidan and Hilda.

The Sponsor in a 12-step program is somewhat similar

5 Simple Lifestyle Free us from all that Clutters

Simple living affects all our life, not just money
It asks different things of each of us
Our attitude is colored by social pressure,
and by our childhood experience

6 Care for Creation Cherish through us your Creation
"This we know: We did not weave the web of life,
we are part of it." (?Chief Seattle)

"If you trample on the earth
the earth will trample on you!" (Columbanus)
Not pantheism, but *Panentheism*

7 Heal Wounded People and Places

Heal through us what is Wounded

We are called to be healers, but we cannot heal others until we are on the Way to healing ourselves

Our first Mission Statement: "For the Healing of the Land"

When founding a community, the Celts often prayed there for 40 days to drive out any evil

8 Be Open to God's Spirit

Blow us to the Places on the Edge

The Spirit is not given to us to help in our mission;
we are called to help her in hers
Being open to prophecy, healing, and other such gifts is
part of the genesis of CA&H

To the Celts, being part of the Body of Christ was not a cute image, but reality

Ubuntu — I am because we are

Aim for unity and love before doctrine

10 Mission

Reach out through us

with Jesus and with Justice

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for shalom,
for they shall be filled."

The final goal is not all saved, but all creation made whole
