In late January ten Sisters of Social Service were delighted to participate in the **15th International World Youth Day** in **Panama City, Panamá**. The week-long event was held in Cinta Costera where 64 acres of lush coastline land connects many diverse ecosystems and forms a peninsula that reaches out into the Panama Bay. The people of *Penonome* were warm and welcoming to nearly 600,000 visitors convening from all over the world, and made everyone feel like they were an integral part of local celebrations and religious rituals. Youth and other attendees represented more than 155 countries from around the globe, and activities brought together the worldwide Catholic community.

SSS Sisters received hundreds of young people at the vocation fair and answered questions about their ministries and lives as a Woman Religious, as well as supported the spiritual lives of those present. Below are some pictures and reflections from the incredible experiences our sisters had.

Images and tributes to the recently canonized and beloved Saint Oscar Romero were plentiful, and paid tribute to the late priest and his tenacious and tireless advocacy for those living in poverty.

How did World Youth Day begin?

“In 1984 at the close of the Holy Year of Redemption, over 300,000 young people from around the world responded to the invitation of His Holiness John Paul II for an International Jubilee of youth on Palm Sunday in St. Peter’s square.

Looking out to the crowds who answered his invitation he said, **“What a fantastic spectacle is presented on this stage by your gathering here today! Who claimed that today’s youth have lost their sense of values? Is it really true that they cannot be counted on?”**

It was at this gathering that the Holy Father entrusted to the youth what is now known as the World Youth Day Cross, to be carried throughout the world as a symbol of the love of Christ for humanity.”
