Placing Black Girls At Promise

- **For African American adolescents to develop into individuals actively engaged in optimal personal and collective development, they must be placed “at promise” as opposed to “at risk” in order to become contributing members of their families, schools, communities, and the broader society.**

Goals of the Black Girl Think Tank

- To build in each girl the understanding that she is the locus of her own control.
- To promote self-sufficiency when experiences of daily trauma affects the power of her voice.
 - To make good choices
 - Improve decision-making
 - Control impulses
 - Boost self-esteem and self-image

- Relationship with Siblings, Peers, Parents/Caregivers

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BGTT is a Circle Model of Leadership

- Inspires creativity and critical thinking
- Designed to increase responsibility and accountability to each other
- Builds community and respect
- Enhances leadership skills and promotes self-confidence
- Opportunity to work together for successful outcomes
- Teaches how to create action and sustain change
- Effective conflict management and consensus building

Creating a Black Girl Think Tank

- **Best recruitment age:** 12 years to 19 years old
- **Must be designed as a safe space**
- - critically analyze and dialogue about the quality- of- life issues of Black girls in their communities and in their schools.
- **Facilitate girls to give voice to their concerns**
- - by developing critical thinking skills,
- - learning to communicate across barriers
- - building community with each other over class, family relationships, backgrounds and life experiences.

Creating a Black Girl Think Tank

- Each **Cohort of 12-15 girls**, life cycle of participation is at least two years.
- - **First Year:** focuses on dialogue among the girls
 - the exploration of sociological, economic, racial and psychological issues that impact how girls see themselves.
- - **Second Year:** prioritizing those issues
 - selecting an area to develop into a social change project.

Creating a Black Girl Think Tank

- Girls are taught **small group facilitation skills**
- - community engagement dialogue tools are used to demonstrate deliberative democracy in action.
- - explore their own voice by sharing opinions that come from the core of their own value system.
- - practice active listening, using principles of inclusion, and the acceptance of diverse and differing ideas and experiences.
- - developing action steps to create community-based social change projects and programs.

What Our Girls Have Told Us

- Adultification of Black girls/Being seen as more mature than we are
- Our feelings are dismissed. Its assumed we are ok even when we are not.
- Not comfortable in my own body. Too much shame. Always sexualized.
- Living that Strong Black Woman stereotype
- Anxiety and Depression – cant talk about it anywhere too much stigma
- Colorism and Textureism /Beauty standards inside the Black community

What Our Girls Have Told Us (cont'd)

- Academic competition in White spaces, always having to prove myself
- Schools do not care about Black girls
- Sexual Assault and Sexual Trafficking are always present
- Black mothers need to talk with their daughters by listening, first.
- Black girls are fetish-ized by boys. Misogyny.
- Black girls can't get a break!
