The Indiana University School of Medicine seeks a visionary academic leader as Department Chair of Ophthalmology. The successful candidate will have a strong background in academic leadership across the tripartite clinical, education, and research missions. Additional qualifications include a national reputation in Ophthalmology, a record of scholarship in the discipline, and documented success of leading strategic initiatives. The administrative expectations include leadership of the faculty, staff, and learners such as programmatic oversight, faculty recruitment, and fiscal responsibilities.

The Indiana University Department of Ophthalmology was founded in 1908. In the spring of 2007, the Department of Ophthalmology announced the gift of \$30 million dollars from Eugene and Marilyn Glick for the creation of the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Eye Institute (\$20 million) and creation of a research endowment (\$10 million). Opened in 2011, the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Eye Institute is a four story 77,000 square foot building that provides research, clinical, education and administrative space. Housed within the clinical research facilities on the second floor of the Glick Eye Institute is the Glaucoma Research and Diagnostic Center (GRDC). The GRDC represents the most complete laboratory in the world for evaluating ocular hemodynamics and metabolism. The department operates clinics at <u>Eskenazi</u> <u>Health</u> and <u>IU Health</u>.

The Indiana University School of Medicine (IUSM) is the only allopathic medical school in the state and a national leader and innovator in medical education, research, and clinical care. IUSM educates nearly 1,600 medical and graduate degree students on nine campuses in Indiana. In 2014-2015, IUSM faculty were awarded 1,571 research grants, totaling more than \$300 million.

IUSM is located in Indianapolis, the 14th largest city in the nation and the state capital. Forbes magazine recently listed Indianapolis as one of the 10 best downtowns in the country. The cost of living is below the national average despite tremendous growth. The city enjoys a healthy arts community, with internationally recognized symphony, opera, and ballet companies and excellent museums, including the world's largest children's museum. It is home to professional football, men's and women's basketball, baseball, soccer, and hockey teams.
