Adult Services Assistant, Waccamaw Neck Branch Library

FUNCTION & RESPONSIBILITY: At the Waccamaw Neck Branch Library, the Adult Services Assistant will provide informational and recreational public library services to a diverse customer base: He or she will function in a work environment serving not only highly-sophisticated, mature individuals with educated expectations but also individuals of all ages with more basic, pressing needs. Since the library is located in a resort area, there will additionally be many seasonal residents and vacationing visitors with varying anticipations.

Basic responsibilities will include reference assistance, readers' advisory services, collection development, computer-area supervision, technology instruction, community outreach, production of high-interest/creative displays and marketing including creation of press releases and flyers, some quality adult programming, and other similar duties as required.

The Adult Services Assistant will report to the Adult Services Librarian. Work processes will involve the utilization of standard office equipment to do research, compile statistics, and create reports. In addition to a regular weekday schedule, the work will involve some weekend and evening hours on an ongoing basis.

SKILLS REQUIRED: This employee must absolutely shine in the area of excellent customer service for a very diverse clientele. Being consistently helpful, energetic, friendly, accommodating, and outgoing in regards to all customers is a deportment absolutely necessary for the job. This person needs likewise to be a flexible and knowledgeable thinker with strong communication skills. Background in technical writing with the ability also to use software to create flyers and other publicity is preferred. Physically, this individual should also be able to lift, carry, push, pull, or move objects weighing approximately up to twenty-five pounds.

EDUCATION & EXPERIENCE The Adult Services Assistant should have a Bachelor's Degree or an equivalent level of education and experience. A valid South Carolina Driver's License is also



Today, the campus-wide arboretum has ArbNet Level II Accreditation and is recognized as a Tree Campus by the Arbor Day Foundation. The collection includes over 2,500 trees that can be explored in person or online through the interactive tree map on the arboretum website. 10:30-11:30 AM – Sandy Island to Atlantic Beach: The Coastal Conservation League engaged in a multi-year initiative alongside community partners to protect Sandy Island, the 12,000-acre island nestled between the Waccamaw and the Pee Dee rivers. The Sandy Island Project was one of multiple initiatives dedicated to Gullah cultural conservation. Becky Ryon will highlight efforts to support the residents of Sandy Island, Bucksport, Burgess, and Atlantic Beach in their fights against development and transportation projects that threaten their Gullah cultural heritage, environment, and quality of life. Becky Ryon grew up on the Gulf Coast of Florida and was fortunate to be surrounded by natural beauty. Unfortunately, like South Carolina, the diverse wildlife and habitats were constantly threatened by unrestrained development. Her childhood in Florida, young adulthood in North Carolina, and previous environmental advocacy work in Richmond with the Virginia League of Conservation Voters have instilled a limitless appreciation for the wild wonders of the Southeast and a desire to preserve them for future generations. As the North Coast Office Director at the Coastal Conservation League, Becky is working to build a more resilient South Carolina and to protect our natural resources. 11 AM-1 PM — The Moveable Feast: Stephanie Wilds (Floating Camellias: Rose Hill in Black & White) and Donna Thornton & Kay Rugh (The UnEGGspected Gift) at Pawleys Tap House & Grill. Stephanie Wilds' is a layered story, simply told but not simple. With her clear-eyed memory focused on the sweep of societal change, she travels back to the origins of her family roots in the South Carolina horse country, revisiting the traditions and expectations that accompanied life among Aiken's upper class for a child of the sixties. Young Wilds spirals through Rose Hill, the elaborate garden estate of her great aunt where ceremony and strict rules of

conduct collide with faltering fortunes, collapsing social barriers, and her artist mother's egalitarian compassion. The cross-cultural relationships between the author and the house and garden staff, as well as the surrounding community "outside the walls," are vividly etched with poignant tonal echoes of *Grey Gardens* and The Help. In ways, hers was an idyllic childhood; in others, a harsh lesson in the reality of enduring racial and economic divides. For so many sensitive souls, escaping the conflict north or west is the only respite from conditions both intolerable and irreparable. For Stephanie, years away from Rose Hill brought her the skills and vision to return and "make things right." Her painstaking restoration of the lost gardens – long in ruins and out of the family – as a hired landscaper in service with the original groundskeeper, is a triumphant march against the -isms that plague us. PLUS, a new, immediate favorite as Mother's Day approaches, **Donna Thornton's** The UnEGGspected Gift. Illustrated with heart and charm by local artist **Kay Rugh**, the story follows a laying hen who yearns to be a mother only to see each day's production whisked away, while her guinea hen neighbor – no fan of motherhood – rolls each of her potential babies out of her nest ... until the kind farmer sees where the true mothering instinct resides. \$35, www.ClassAtPawleys.com or 843.235.9600.

Ron Daise discusses Gullah Geechee culture and history as depicted through characters and scenes in Raptors in the Ricelands, his first historical novel. Set in a twenty-first century fictional community within Georgetown, SC, a story unfolds, revealing family secrets and conflicts that challenge cultural beliefs. The book is conveyed in four acts and with chapter names that follow the production stages of Carolina Gold Rice, and the program's themes are intertwined in historical accounts that include the Orangeburg Massacre; Black church life, particularly in Oconee County, SC as begun during slavery; the launch of White supremacy in Fort Mill, SC; the Reconstruction Era; and Marcus Garvey and the Universal Negro Improvement Association. Ron Daise, a St. Helena Island, SC native, is a prominent author, performer, and cultural preservationist. As Vice President for Creative Education at Brookgreen Gardens since 2004, he's received the 2019 SC Governor's Distinctive Achievement Award for his impactful contributions. Daise, along with his wife Natalie, created the "Gullah Geechee Wisdom Cards Guidebook," earning the 2017 SC African American Heritage Commission's Project Award. Former stars of Nick Jr. TV's "Gullah Gullah Island," they received the 2019 Foundation for Leadership Education Lifetime Achievement Award and other honors. Daise is a respected figure in Gullah Geechee cultural heritage, having served on the Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor Commission and presented at the United Nations. A Hampton University graduate, he actively contributes to community and educational initiatives in Georgetown, SC. Also offered May 21. Free with Garden admission, www.Brookgreen.org.
