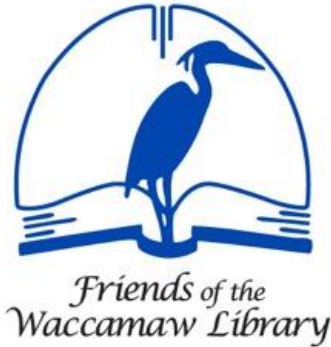

10-11 AM – Get to Know Trees (Harmony in Nature Program). Join us at

Brookgreen Gardens for Tree Walks led by Dominique Werboff, Ph.D. of Coastal Carolina University. Learn about tree anatomy, physiology, identification, and care, and how they function in landscapes and ecosystems. Whether you're a nature enthusiast seeking to deepen your understanding or simply looking for a fun and educational activity, our Tree Walks offer something for everyone. Registration is required and the program is free with garden admission. This session will include heavy walking on uneven terrain. Please wear appropriate footwear. Water is recommended. Dr. Werboff oversees the CCU Arboretum, which covers the entire 322-acre main campus of the university. This is a project that she began with her students in 2019 to protect a 1.5-acre stand of native trees, now celebrated as the Native Species Collection. Today, the campus-wide arboretum has ArbNet Level II Accreditation and is recognized as a Tree Campus by the Arbor Day Foundation. The collection includes over 2,500 trees that can be explored in person or online through the interactive tree map on the arboretum website. Free with Garden admission, www.Brookgreen.org.

2-5:30 PM – Imagine Port of Georgetown – Travel with Lee and Paul down the Waccamaw River, under the bridges, into Winyah Bay, and up the Sampit River to the Historic Port of Georgetown. Learn more about the ecology of the watershed as we discuss rivers and estuaries that are some of the most intriguing in the nation. Georgetown is the third oldest port city in SC and was an important colonial harbor, shipping "naval stores," beef, pork, indigo, and rice. While on board, our Revolutionary War and Civil War history is discussed as well as a focus on 20th century port activity which included the "world's largest lumber mill," International Paper, Liberty Steel Mill, fishing, and shrimping. 10:30-11:30 AM – An Archaeology of Food in Georgetown County at Brookgreen's Ron Daise Auditorium. Eating is a cultural universal. We eat to survive. But food is not just nutrition or deliciousness, it is history and culture. In this presentation, Dr. Jodi A. Barnes will talk about the archaeological research in Georgetown County and what it tells us about past foodways. From plant remains to animal bones and from stoneware storage jars to colonoware cooking pots, archaeological research provides information not only about what people ate, but also how they stored, prepared, or consumed foods beginning 8,000 years ago to the turn of the 20th century. Dr. Jodi A. Barnes is a Heritage Trust Archaeologist with the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources, who strives to learn about the past and share that knowledge with the public. She received her Ph.D. in Anthropology from American University in Washington, DC and her Graduate Certificate in Women and Gender Studies and B.A. in Anthropology from the University of South Carolina. Her current research ranges from the archeology of a Gullah Geechee fishing village to

the impacts of climate change on cultural heritage sites in Georgetown County. She is the editor of *The Materiality of Freedom* (2011) and she has published numerous articles in journals such as *American Anthropologist* and *Historical Archaeology*. Get acquainted with the inhabitants of the Animal Forest at Charles Towne Landing State Historic Site, in Charleston, SC – including the famous Clark the elk. The Animal Forest is home to a variety of species that inhabited South Carolina at the time when this site was a newly settled English colony. Animal Forest veterinarian Dr. Todd Heldreth discusses how zookeepers provide routine care to promote physical and mental well-being. In addition, he presents an overview of specific cases to highlight diagnostics and treatment for the animals when they are not well. Note that restroom facilities will not be available after leaving the Discovery Center.
