The **Georgetown County Library System** continues Phase 5 of their 7-phase re-opening strategy, **library hours are Monday-Friday**, **10 AM-6 PM AND Saturdays**, **10 AM-2 PM**.

Browsing (30 minutes in the adult and young adult and children stacks), curbside book delivery *and* limited access to circulation desks plus limited access to the adult computer area!

- Patrons can receive Circulation Desk assistance, and faxing and copying services are available.
- Thirty (30) minute sessions are available for computers in the adult computer area.
- Patrons (including children three years of age and older) must wear a face covering if they enter the building. The Library has a limited number to give out.
- Curbside book delivery is still available.

April Featured Artist at Waccamaw Library: Dan Kraus. Stop by and enjoy an exhibit by multimedia artist Dan Kraus, who explores our local landscape with graphite, oil, watercolor, pastel, colored pencil and clay. His focus expands to include still life, landscape, portraiture, and even the occasional non-objective piece. Upon retiring from a career in engineering about five years ago, Dan moved from Delaware to his wife's home state of South Carolina. He regularly volunteers at Brookgreen Gardens and enjoys nearly every outdoor activity involving water. He paints low country scenes en plein air with other local artists, sculpts commissioned portrait reliefs from photo reference, and enters juried exhibitions.

April Featured Photographer at Waccamaw Library: Jenion Tyson.

Photographer, master gardener, and Georgetown native Jenion Tyson will share his unique "Bug's Eye View" of South Carolina flora. Begun as an exploratory series prior to the arrival of Hurricane Florence, the photographs depict small, often overlooked, flowering plants common to South Carolina yards. Tyson enlarges the view of these plants to new, nearly unrecognizable perspectives showcasing a fascinating, underappreciated plant life that the viewer may come to realize can be found in their own backyard. Though the plant subjects he chooses to highlight, such as dodder, milkweed, and wild garlic, are often considered weeds by gardeners, in these photographs they are elevated as desirable and beautiful plants in their own right. The exhibit features macro photographs displayed alongside short essays written by the artist about the various plant species. Tyson began to take nature photography seriously in 2013 when he won the weekly photo contest in *The Post and Courier* newspaper. Since then, he has been a beekeeper, bird watcher and nature enthusiast. He was an accepted artist at the ArtFields competition in 2017 and 2018, and won two honorable mentions in the Coastal Carolina Fair Photography Show.

Professor of English at Francis Marion University, Edwins has published a chapbook *Play* (2016) and poems in several journals, including *Calyx*, Quarterday Review, Zone 3, and Whale Road Review, and in various anthologies. Dr. Edwins has received poetry awards from the Poetry Super Highway and the South Carolina Academy of Authors and is a Pushcart Prize nominee. She serves as a board member on SC Humanities and the South Carolina Academy of Authors and is Poet Laureate of the Pee Dee region of South Carolina. For his part, Ed Madden earned a B.S. in Biblical Studies from the Institute for Christian Studies and a Ph.D. in Literature from the University of Texas at Austin. His recent poetry collections include Ark (2016), Nest (2014), and Prodigal: Variations (2011). Dr. Madden is Professor of English and Director of the Women's and Gender Studies Program at the University of South Carolina, where he teaches Irish literature and creative writing. In 2019, Madden was named an Academy of American Poets Laureate and he currently serves as Poet Laureate of Columbia. First stop will be the lone cabin at Alderly/ Oryzantia, once owned by Joseph and Theodosia Burr Alston. Next will be a stop at Strawberry Village where the one room schoolhouse that educated many children over time is located, and lastly is a stop at Friendfield Village.
