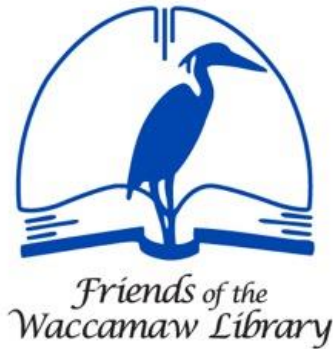

Turner has published five books, including *Riding Light: Poems*; *Coast Lines: A Poetry Anthology*; and *Hard Lines: Rough South Poetry*. 10 AM-12:30 PM – Fragments and Forms: A Collage Workshop at Brookgreen’s Learning Lab 1. Reimagine personal history through image, text, and memory in this hands-on collage workshop. Participants will create layered compositions using vintage letters, reproduced historic imagery, and personal photographs to explore family, place, and inheritance. Through guided prompts, participants will incorporate fragments of language and poetry into their work, using text as both material and meaning. The process invites reflection on what is remembered, what is carried forward, and what can be reimagined through creative practice. Participants are encouraged to bring photocopies of family photographs or documents to include in their collage. A curated selection of archival materials, paper ephemera, and text fragments will be provided. This workshop is open to all experience levels and offers an accessible approach to storytelling through visual art and poetry. Participants will leave with a completed collage and new ways of engaging with personal history. This program is part of the **Julia J. Kinnaird Poetry Program at Brookgreen Gardens**, which explores the connections between language, landscape, and memory through creative expression. In this approachable, no-sew class, participants will learn rag quilting techniques inspired by Sharon Cooper-Murray, “The Gullah Lady,” and create a 9 × 9 inch burlap piece to take home. Along the way, Cookie will share the cultural history behind this resourceful practice. All materials are provided. Participants are encouraged to bring fabric scraps or clothing with personal meaning to incorporate into their work. Torreah “Cookie” Washington is a fourth-generation needleworker and Charleston-based fiber artist known for her narrative art quilts that honor the Divine Feminine and African ancestral heritage. Born in Rabat, Morocco, and self-taught in quilting, she carries forward the legacy of the women in her family—

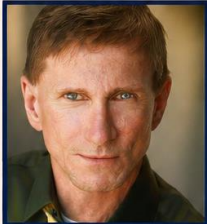

community were shaped by the Lowcountry landscape and the enduring relationship between people, land, and water. Bayard Wootten (1875–1959) was an American photographer known for her documentary images of rural life in the South during the early twentieth century. Her work focused on landscapes, architecture, and everyday life, particularly in North Carolina and South Carolina. Wootten's photographs of Sandy Island offer an important visual record of a Gullah Geechee community during a period of significant social and economic change.
