FROM THE DESK OF THE RABBI

Old Lessons on Fighting New Anti-Semitism

When I talk with many of you, it is clear that the outbreak in anti-Semitism we have seen over the last couple years is near the forefront of your minds. There are, of course, reasons to be concerned. The violence and rhetoric we are seeing in America is unlike anything most of us have witnessed in our lifetimes. While we may have personally experienced anti-Semitism (such as being barred from membership in certain clubs, jokes made about us, or membership quotas at universities), few of us have directly seen the outright attacks and violence that have been going on.

Though we may not have seen it, we should also not forget that this is not a new phenomenon. Besides Nazi Germany, the closest parallel to our experience comes from a story we read and celebrate this month, the book of Esther and the story of Purim—which, not coincidentally, also may provide us some insight as to how to deal with the hatred we experience.

In the story, the wicked Haman (feel free to insert your boos and loud noises here) convinces King Ahashverosh to do something about the Jewish people. He says, "There is a certain people, scattered and dispersed among the other peoples in all the provinces of your realm, whose laws are different from those of any other people and who do not obey the king's laws; and it is not in Your Majesty's interest to tolerate them" (Esther 3:8). This argument echoes those made against Jews for the last couple hundred years: they are different from us; they obey their laws, not ours; they are not loyal to us, only to themselves and/or to Israel. If it wasn't in our Bible, it sounds like it could've come out of Enlightenment Europe, Soviet Russia, or any Nazi or neo-Nazi rally.

But we all know the end of the story: thanks to Queen Esther and Mordecai, on the same day that Haman had planned to attack the Jews, the tables were turned and the Jews fought back. Haman was killed on the very gallows he had planned to hang Mordecai on. Yet, how we get to that point is maybe as significant as the end result. When Esther first became queen, she hid her religion, following Mordecai's advice. Even after Mordecai encouraged her to reveal herself, she was still hesitant. It was only when she told the king that she was Jewish that her and her people were saved.

Esther's example should be instructive for us today, as well. As long as we hide who we are—whether by putting walls up around our community or walls around ourselves—we will never be able to defeat those who want to hurt us. In fact, it seems as long as Esther did so, the position of the Jews was weakened. It is only when she was open with the king that and used the relationships and friends that she had that Haman was defeated.

No, our own Jewish pride will not destroy anti-Semtism. But neither will walling ourselves off. The best weapon we have in this battle is our own *hutzpah*, our own audacity to have faith and commitment to our ideals under any circumstances and not be shy or hesitant about displaying it. In other words—our best weapon is to be ourselves. The hope of anti-Semites is that by making us afraid, we'll go away or become like them. We defeat them by refusing to do so.

As we celebrate our ancestors' being saved from the threat of destruction, may we take courage—and wisdom—about how we can deal with threats in our own time. And may we all have Esther's bravery to not let the threats of the world engulf us and instead rise above them to be who we are and who we want to be: proud Jews.

David Makovsky is the Ziegler distinguished fellow at The Washington Institute and director of the <u>Project on Arab-Israel</u> <u>Relations</u>. He is also an adjunct professor in Middle East studies at Johns Hopkins University's Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS). In 2013-2014, he worked in the Office of the U.S. Secretary of State, serving as a senior advisor to the Special Envoy for Israeli-Palestinian Negotiations.

Author of numerous Washington Institute monographs and essays on issues related to the Middle East Peace Process and the Arab-Israeli conflict, he is also coauthor, with Dennis Ross, of <u>Be Strong and of</u> <u>Good Courage: How Israel's Most Important Leaders Shaped Its</u> <u>Destiny</u> (PublicAffairs) and the 2009 Washington Post bestseller <u>Myths, Illusions, and Peace: Finding a New Direction for America in</u> <u>the Middle East</u> (Viking/Penguin). He is the host of the podcast <u>Decision Points: The U.S.-Israel Relationship</u>a, which features interviews with authors, scholars, and practitioners on key moments in the history of U.S.-Israel relations from the Balfour Declaration to hi-

tech cooperation today. His 2011 <u>maps on alternative territorial solutions to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict</u> were reprinted by the *New York Times* in the paper's first interactive treatment of an op-ed.

Before joining The Washington Institute, Mr. Makovsky was an award-winning journalist who covered the peace process from 1989 to 2000. He is the former executive editor of the *Jerusalem Post*, was diplomatic correspondent for Israel's leading daily, *Haaretz*, and is a former contributing editor to *U.S. News and World Report*. He was awarded the National Press Club's 1994 Edwin M. Hood Award for Diplomatic Correspondence for a cover story on PLO finances that he cowrote for the magazine.

A native of St. Louis, Missouri, Mr. Makovsky received a bachelor's degree from Columbia University and a master's degree in Middle East studies from Harvard University.

Beyond gragger and hamentaschen

My mother always gives us a gift for Purim, this is the custom she grew up with in Tanger (Morrocco). My mother in law in Jerusalem has the custom of putting a huge, long, and special Challah on the table for the Purim meal. Over the years, I had the privilege of celebrating Purim with people from different origins and different Purim traditions. Whether it is the Mishloah Manot we give, the food we eat, or the way we react when the name of the villain Haman is said (*boooooo!!*), here is a sample of different old and current Purim traditions from around the world:

In France: The original graggers were stones! Children used to take smooth stones, write or engrave Haman's name on them, and strike them together during the Megillah reading whenever Haman's name was mentioned.

In Italy: The youngsters would divide into two camps and throw nuts at each other. The adults rode through the streets of the town on horseback with cypress branches in their hands. They placed an effigy of Haman in a high place, and surrounded it to the sound of trumpets.

In England: Congregants would write the name of Haman on a paper and erase it when his name was read.

In Egypt: The young men rode through the Jewish street on horsebacks, camels, and donkeys, in memory of the verse "and they brought him on horseback through the street of the city."

In Germany: On Purim eve, torches containing gunpowder were ignited. During the Megillah reading, the gunpowder exploded with a deafening noise.

In Uzbekistan: The ground would usually be covered with snow at Purim time. Next to the synagogue, a large snow-Haman was built and surrounded by a fire made of wood, rags and paper. They stood and watched until Haman melted, singing until it had completely disappeared.

In Afghanistan: The synagogue carpets were taken up and the congregants trampled underneath them, in case Haman was hiding there! Grooms sent their brides mishloach manot with sweets like halva and pastries.

In Russian and Poland: Jews ate koilitch, long challah loaves made sweet with raisins or candy. The twisted ropes were meant to evoke Haman's ultimate demise

In Morocco: Jews baked challahs called Ojos de Haman (translation: Haman's eyes) which included almonds and two unpeeled hard-boiled eggs. They also sent each other gifts, including jewelry and perfumes (A tradition my mother continues today).

In Bulgaria: Jews cooked Caveos di Aman, or Haman's Hair, a dish made of stringy pasta representing the Purim villain's hair. The recipe includes olives and hard-boiled eggs, both traditional foods of mourning. Our children might be familiar with hamantaschen and groggers, which can make Purim a great opportunity for virtual travel. No gun powder, snow Haman, or camel ride for us in Savannah, but we can have the children look for smooth stones to write Haman's name on while we grown-ups try to cook a Ojos or Caveos di Aman dish to serve with that gorgeous Koilitch Challah.
