






Academic entrepreneurship is the process of transforming the intellectual property of faculty and institutional stakeholders into commercial value for the market. The CSE educational initiatives address the entrepreneurial aspirations of faculty and others through UMD educational opportunities such as the Maryland Innovation Extension program and iCorps programming.

The CSE has a national reputation for influencing the intersection of small-scale, local manufacturing and entrepreneurship. Influence can be seen in participation with such groups as the Urban Manufacturing Alliance and The Century Foundation at their national gathering in Houston, Texas.
