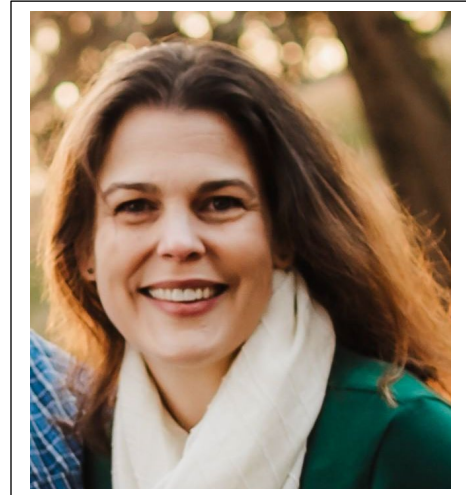
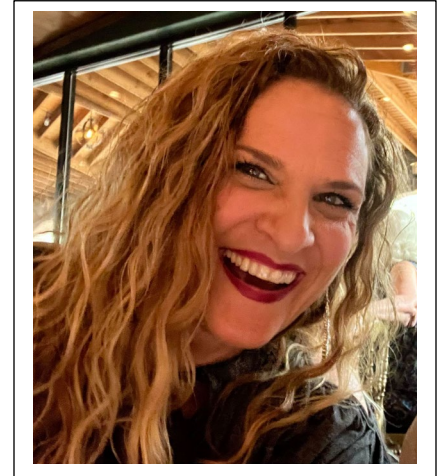

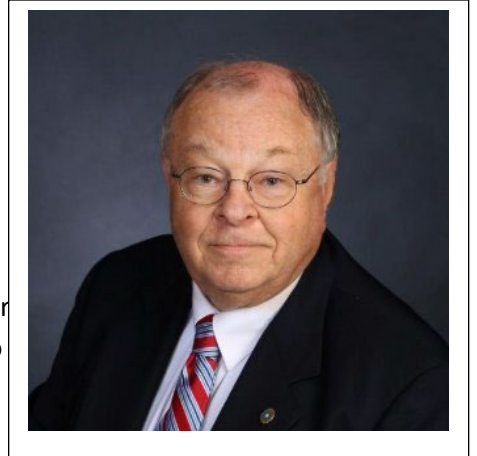
Returning Delegates
