#### JOIN US TO HEAR FROM SAN DIEGO POLICE COMMUNITY RELATIOS OFFICERS ON KEEPING EL CERRITO SAFE

Please join us to hear from San Diego Police Community Relations Officers, Terry Hoskins and John Steffen to find out up-to-date information on crime in our neighborhood and surrounding neighborhoods.

Recent newspaper articles reported some big increases in crime rates in the area, so we decided to hear from the source.

Terry Hoskins is with the Mid-City Divison, which includes both sides of El Cajon Blvd and El Cerrito south of the Blvd. John Steffen is with the Eastern Divion which includes El Cerrito north of the Blvd.

Officer Steffen also covers College Area East and Officer Hoskins covers Talmadge, neighboring communities with reported significant crime increases.

These officers will provide us with good information on the crime in our area, the increases reported in neiighboring areas and what we can do to help with crime in El Cerrito.

John Royal and Brian Helmich with Talmadge Neighborhood watch will tell us what their group is doing to fight crime.

A lot of keeping El Cerrito the great place that it is depends on us being aware and proactive. Join us to hear the latest and learn what we can do.

This meeting is an opportunity to discuss and hear from leaders, agencies and communities on selecting a site in District 9 for a storage facility for the homeless.

Please plan on attending this meeting. It is important to provide facilities for the homeless population to be able to store their possessions and for neighborhood safety to have these facilities placed at well thought out locations.

## SUMMER IS BARBEQUE & FIRE TIME BE SAFE WITH YOUR FIRES

#### **NEVER LEAVE YOUR FIRE UNATTENDED**

**GRILL SAFETY** - Place your grill as far from the house, other structures and trees as possible to avoid any potential damage caused by the heat. Never just fire up your grill. First check the connection between the propane tank and fuel line and make sure there's nothing flammable on the burners. Keep the flames under control. Have a water-filled squirt bottle on hand to spray flames threatening to get out of control or close the lid of the barbeque to cut the oxygen and put the fire out. Before disposing of coals, pour water over them until the fire is out.

**CAMP AND BEACH FIRES** - Let's keep camp and beach fires safe. Build a camp or beach fire only in the designated places, away from dry shrubs and grass, dry leaves or low branches that can catch fire. It is best to use existing fire pits. Keep an eye on the fire and don't let it get out of control. Always have something you can use to douse out a fire within reach. Always put out the fire when you are leaving by pouring water over it and spreading some dirt on top. Never leave the fire unattended. Someone should always be watching the fire.

**FIRE PITS.** Gathering around the outdoor fire pit is great. Keep it fun and safe. When setting up a fire pit, make sure it is at least 10 feet away from any structure or combustible surface. Before you light the fire be sure to check the weather forecast. If it is windy, do not fire up the pit.



## BE PREPARED FOR ANYTHING! GET YOUR EMERGENCY PLAN IN ORDER

The chance of wildfires are making many people feel vulnerable again. The best solution is to be prepared to survive.

Get your family or household members together to discuss how to prepare and respond to the types of emergencies that are most likely to happen where you live, learn, work and play. Identify responsibilities for each member of your household and how you will work together as a team. Practice as many elements of your plan as possible. Have a communication plan.

One of the tips that is stressed each and every time for preparedness is to be sure every person in the house has a pair of sturdy, comfortable emergency shoes and socks ready to be put on. This means that everyone should have a pair by the bed, a pair in the car, a pair at work and school. Socks will help prevent getting blisters if walking much.

- **1 Get a Kit -** Learn the essential supplies to put in your family's first aid and survival kits. Be sure to plan for pets.
- \*\*\*Do not forget a plan to have your medications.
- **2 Make a Plan -** Plan effectively for you and your family in case of an emergency.
- **3 Be Informed -** Understand which disasters are likely in our area and what to know to stay safe.

## BE PET PREPARED FOR NATURAL DIASTERS



A big part of being ready for an emergency for many us requires including our pets in our disaster planning.

The County of San Diego Department of Animal Services recommends that we prepare, practice and update a disaster plan with the following considerations to help reduce the risk of harm to pets and livestock:

- Maintain a pet emergency kit with sufficient supplies for each pet. (The following recommended items are typically available at pet supply stores or from your veterinarian.)
- A leash, harness, or pet carrier (large enough for your pet to stand and turn around in), and a muzzle for any dog known to be aggressive or defensive around people or other animals. Also include a stake and tieout for each dog.
- A properly fitting leather or nylon collar with a securely affixed license tag (for dogs) & ID tag (listing your address and phone number).
- Dogs and cats should wear a collar & tag at all times, whether or not they normally go outdoors, and all animals should have some type of identification.
- Microchip your pet for permanent identification, and keep your information current with the microchip company and your local animal shelter database.
- Transportable containers with at least a week's supply of water and (preferably dry) pet food, and a stable, unbreakable water bowl or dispenser and sturdy food bowl or feeder.

- Include a manually operated can opener & plastic can lid for canned food.
- A copy of current veterinary records, including rabies & wellness vaccination certificates, and at least a week's worth of any needed medicines & supplies in a waterproof container. (Proof of current vaccinations may be required by boarding facilities).
- A pet first aid guide and supplies, including wound cleaning, dressing, and bandaging material.
- Supplies to collect and dispose of pet wastes, e.g., plastic bags, scooper, cat litter, etc.
- Several recent photographs of your pet kept in a waterproof container in case your animal gets lost.
- Be prepared to quickly evacuate your home if you become aware of any unreasonable risk of harm that is likely to endanger your neighborhood; don't wait until the "last minute".

**NEVER** leave your pet chained outside and, if you evacuate your home, **DON'T LEAVE YOUR PETS**, you may not be able to return to care for them for an extended period time.

Structural damage to your home or animal enclosure may could enable your pet to escape, or permit other animals, pests, or the elements to enter and endanger the pet.

Start a buddy system with people in your neighborhood who will check on your animals in case you're away from home during an emergency. Consider including authorization in your veterinarian's file for your "buddy" to request emergency veterinary treatment for your animal(s) in your absence.
